

Only small groups entered contest this year. There were fifteen solos and eight ensembles entered.










# **ORCHESTRA**



THE BOONE HIGH PEP CLUB inspired enthusiasm and loyalty at all athletic events throughout the 1950-1951 season.


The year's activities started off with the informal initiation of the new members. Garbed in blankets and headdresses and beating on pots and pans, the initiates made very convincing Indians.


For the first time since 1942, the Boone eleven walked off the Newton gridiron with a 21-13 victory to their credit.



# Boys' Basketball

The 1950–1951 basketball season was one of our finest in the Gale Johnson reign, proving once again that they get "bigger and better" every year under his leadership. With only three returning lettermen Boone had one of the tallest teams in its history. The reserves developed to such an extent that there was more depth than in previous years. The record this season consisted of thirteen wins and eight defeats.

The Toreadors bowed to the powerful Spencer quintet in their opener by one point and then bounced back to defeat Denison and Nevada by decisive scores.

Conference play opened with the Toreadors falling to Grinnell 53-44. Hitting their stride again the Boone quintet blasted Webster City to the tune of 51–26. Oskaloosa was the next victim as the Toreadors, led by Musser, defeated them 46–43.

Next to fall was Marshalltown, 43-35, as the Toreadors took their third game in a row. Forest City was next on the list, and before the Toreadors beat them 40-30 they had lost only one home game in the past two years.

After trailing 16-11 at the half, the Toreadors surged ahead to wallop Newton 47-36. Roland Wiley led the attack with twenty points as Boone won their fifth straight game.

Ames defeated the Toreadors 43-29. A third quarter rally fell short as several Boone regulars fouled out in a wild fourth period.

The Toreadors got back into the winning column again by defeating the Perry Bluejays 43-41 in a very close game.

Leading Grinnell 18-15 at the half, the Toreadors fell to the murky depths of defeat, 38-30. The outstanding defensive play by the Toreadors, however, held Dick Ritter to only two field goals.

Despite a last-minute rally and the fine work of Mike Huddleston, the Boone High five fell before Carroll 47-41.

Fighting all the way the Toreadors bowed to Oskaloosa 39-38 in a game that was a heartbreaker for the locals.

Returning to conference play, the local quintet rolled over Marshalltown 58-43. Bechtel, Wiley, and Musser led the scoring.

The Newton Cardinals tasted the fury of the Toreadors in being smashed 54-40. Roland Wiley played his best game of the season in dumping in twenty-two points.

Jumping to an early lead with accurate shooting of sixty per cent, the Little Cyclones gained a margin which the Toreadors were never able to overcome. Although Boone outscored Ames 14-3 in the final quarter they were never able to overtake them.

The Boone High five romped over Cedar Falls 60-52. The Fighting Toreadors opened with a seven-point lead and maintained it throughout the game.
