BOONE & SCENIC VALLEY MUSEUM TO OPEN SOON

A new addition to the Boone & Scenic Valley Railroad will be completed and opened in the spring of 2012. James H. Andrew, Jefferson, Iowa, has donated his extensive railroad artifact collection of the more than 3,000 items he has collected through the years.

In addition to his generous donation, Andrew has offered to cover one third of the cost of the project. The museum will be a 9,000 square foot building and will contain a theater, library, and a large area to display railroad artifacts.



BRIDGE IS BOON TO RECREATIONAL, TOURIST, AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Inspired by the area's coal mining industry, artist David B. Dahlquist designed a twisting "tunnel," formed by 41 steel frames over the High Trestle Trail Bridge between Madrid and Woodward.

The bridge looms 13 stories high above the Des Moines River. It gives majestic views of the river valley to walkers, joggers, cyclists, and nature lovers of all ages. Its beauty at night is enhanced by the steel arches with their nightly blue glow, visible to motorists on State Hwy. 210, between Madrid and Woodward.

A guide will point out and explain the highlights of the new James H. Andrew Railroad Museum, located on the grounds of the Boone and Scenic Valley Railroad, 225 – 10th Street. The tour will take place at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday. The \$8.00 charge may be paid at the door.

BOTH DAY AND NIGHT VIEWS OF THE HIGH TRESTLE TRAIL ARE SPECTACULAR

The High Trestle Trail Bridge, visible to motorists from State Hwy. 210, between Madrid and Woodward, is a half mile work of art to people walking or biking in the daytime or driving by at night.

Classmates may want to carpool and drive down to Madrid between activities on Saturday afternoon, park, and walk the half mile to the bridge, and then walk the 13 story bridge and take advantage of seeing the spectacular views of the Des Moines River Valley.
