


The by-word for the Student Council this year seemed to have been "Actions speak louder than words" for Student Council activity was abundant. The Student Council has taken its rightful place as one of the most important bodies of the school. The Student Council and its leaders have devoted much time and energy toward making Boone High a better, more progressive school.

But let's look back a bit. What caused the Student Council to become so prolific in good ideas and good actions? One of the main causes for this improvement was the new constitution drafted in May of '54. It changed the procedure of election of officers. Before the change, the homeroom itself nominated members to run for Student Council representatives. Sometimes the people nominated and elected were unwilling to serve or were lacking in interest. Therefore, the council made this change: any person wanting to be a Student Council representative gives his name to the homeroom advisor, the class then chooses their representative from this list of people who want to be in the Student Council. They are eligible for re-election. This change kept disinterested students out of the council, and it filled the council chairs with members truly interested in the council's work and members who were willing to serve.

The new constitution also set aside one period each day when the council could meet and discuss school problems. This change gave the Student Council more time to devote to school affairs.

Elections for new membership and for new officers are to be held in May each year for the first semester of the following year and in January for the second semester. One half of the homerooms are to elect representatives in May and the other half are to elect representatives in January. Each representative will serve for two semesters. This will always leave some experienced council members present after each election.

After a vigorous campaign and much speechmaking and handshaking, Denny Collis was elected Student Body President for the first semester. Other officers elected were: vice president, David Fitzsimmons; secretary, Cay Munn; treasurer, Bob Barry; and sergeant-at-arms, Daryl Murken.

Kenny Sparks proved to be another top flight president as he was elected to hold the presidential gavel the second semester. Other able officers were: vice president, Daryl Murken; Secretary, Mary Courter; treasurer, Darrell Kruse; and sergeant-at-arms, Bill Larson.






#### DOLPHIN CLUB


