# Frazier and McIntyre, Boone's 1-2 Punch


### Total 2000 Yards



Ed Frazier, a 164-pound senior half-back, captured the Boone rushing title with an eight game total of 1,039 yards ou 176 carries and a 5,57 per carry average. Frazier also finished first in the touchdowns and points scored departments. He had 96 points on 12 TDs and 24 extra points. His high for one game was 20 points. Having caught one pass for eight yards, he finished with 1,057 yards rushing and on pass receptions, Ed was a unanimous pick for the All-Central Iowa Conference football team selected by the coaching staffs of the seven member conference. He was a defensive choice. Frazier was 11th in the state in rushing and was named to the honorable mention roll by both the IDPA poll and the Des Moines Register-Tribune poll.

Paul McIntyre, Boone High's 172-pound tackle-breaking fullback, finished with 873 yards rushing. Thanks to a 340-yard effort in the final game against Grinnell last year, McIntyre gained over 1,200 yards while earning 5th team all-state honors. He failed to make the IDPA list this year and was named to the honorable mention roll. Making 11 TDs and six extra points. McIntyre finished this season with a total of 72 points. He caught eight passes for 166 yards and finished with 1,039 yards rushing and on pass receptions. McIntyre was also a unanimous pick for the All-Central Iowas football team. He repeated as a fulliback selection.



The Boone High Sophomore football team finished the 1969 grid season with a 4-3 record. Larry Briley scored Boone's first TD of the season against Perry when he went 35 yards with a pass from quarter-back Bob Anderson. Fritz Taylor caught a pass from Bob Anderson for the extra points. Jeff Hansen's two second-half touchdowns sparked Boone to a 20-8 victory over Perry. The Sophs downed Urbandale 34-8 to improve their record to 2-0. Larry Briley and Randy Ward each scored two touchdowns. Jeff Hansen ran for the other Boone TD. Coach Carroll said his team played "tough defense". Saydel snapped the Boone winning streak with a 20-12 victory. Briley and Hansen scored the TDs. The Sophs collected their second loss against Fort Dodge, 35-24. Randy Ward scored one Boone TD and Briley two. Larry Briley provided most of the heroics for Boone against St. Edmonds as he scored three second-half TDs and intercepted one pass. Boone won 32-12. Boone's record dropped to 3-3 with a 19-18 loss to Ames. Briley scored twice for Boone on 17 and 44 yard passes from Anderson. Hansen got the other Boone TD on a 54 yard run. Aided by three fumble recoveries and two interceptions, the Boone sophomores de-feated Ankeny, 28-12, to close the 1969 season.




#### Girls Beat Ogden in District Consol. Game; Complete



Who could think of a better way of ending the 1969-70 Toreadorette basketball season than by whipping Ogden, ranked 12th in the state, in the consolation game and bringing home the third trophy this season. The girls also won a runner-up trophy in the Christmas tournament at Paton-Churdan and a runner-up trophy in the sectional tournament. The Boone girls finished the season with a 15-8 record, the best for Boone High since the 1959-60 ballclub racked up a 18-5 record. The Toreadorette offensive trio of Carol Grabau, Janie Huddleston, and Marsha Lilly pumped in a season's total of 1505 points for a 65.4 scoring average. Lilly, only a sophomore, led Boone's scoring for the season with a total of 627 points (27.3 ave.), Grabau was next with 520 points (23.6 ave.), and Janie Huddleston followed with 341 points (14.8 ave.). In field goals, Lilly connected on 247 of 457 tries for 54% shooting. Grabau was next with 42% and Huddleston with 39%. Grabau led the trio in free throws hitting 60%, followed by Lilly with 58% and Huddleston with 57%. Holly Krug, praised by Coach Grider for her tremendous improvement and leadership, led the backcourt with a season's total of 175 rebounds, (7.6 ave.). Judy Peterson followed close behind with 162 (7.0 ave.) and Cheryl Bielfelt had 88 (3.8 ave.). Lilly nabbed 107 offensive rebounds, Grabau 85 and Huddleston 61. As a team, the Toreadorettes hit 45% from the field and 58% on free throws while the opponents hit 42% on field goals and 63% on free throws. Coach Grider was "surprised and happy" with the play of his Toreadorettes throughout the season. He felt the best game of the year was beating rival Ogden in the district consolation game. Another memorable game was at New Providence when the Boone gals made the following school records: a) most points in one game-102 b) most points, two teams, 185 c) most baskets in a game, 44 and d) most girls with 30 or more points, 3 (Lilly, Grabau, Huddleston). Even though he is losing three starters, the outlook for next year is encouraging to Coach Grider. The junior varsity, which compiled a 10-4 record, consisted of freshmen and sophomores, several who are potential varsity ball players. Coach Grider felt the team had a good attitude, gained confidence, tournament experience, and had an "all-round good season."

The awards come from the Goeppinger Memorial Funds. They give the students an incentive to work. Receiving one is a big help in the first step to earning a scholarship.


Not only does it give the students the desire to work harder, but the encouragement and honor to work to the best of their ability to keep up their 3.2 grade average.




#### **CHORUS**






