# 1972

We were, for the most part, still fifth graders when President Nixon made a big step in diplomacy when he made a trip to Peking, China, February 21, 1972. This was the first time they had made the U.S. welcome in their country.



In 1974 the Arab nations ended the oil embargo March 18. This put a so-called "end" to our energy crisis but the world conservationists still warn us to conserve.

Important Watergate hearings against Richard Milhouse Nixon began on May 9,

Nelson Rockefeller was nominated Vice President August 20.

Seven former whitehouse aides of President Nixon were indicted March 1, 1974 for taking part in the Watergate coverup.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that President Nixon must turn over tapes of conversations in the Whitehouse. This decision was made on July 24, the vote was 8-0 sought by Leon Jaworsky.

Mrs. Alberta King, 69, mother of slain civil rights leader, Martin Luther King, was shot and killed June 30 along with a church deacon. Marcus Chenault, 23, of Dayton, Ohio was convicted for this September 12.

On August 9, 1974 Richard M. Nixon's

resignation as President of the United States shocked the world. Gerald Ford, then Vice President, became the 37th President of the United States of America.

President Ford gave Nixon an unconditional pardon September 8.

A conditional amnesty to Vietnam era draft evaders and deserters who would be willing to work up to two years in public service jobs was proposed by President Ford on September 16, 1974.



# 1975

The South Vietnamese government surrendered to the Communist Vietcong and North Vietnamese April 30, 1975 shortly after evacuation of American troops.

U.S. unemployment reached 9.2%, the

highest point of the year.

Two assassination attempts against President Ford, by women in California, failed. Lynette Alice (Squeaky) Fromme, a Charles Manson follower, pointed a pistol at Ford September 5 in Sacramento, California, but a secret service agent grabbed the gun. Sara Jane Moore, a political activist, fired a revolver at the President September 22 in San Francisco, but a bystander, Oliver Sipple, deflected the gun.

F.B.I. agents captured Patricia Hearst, who was kidnapped February 4, 1974 in San Francisco, September 18, with others she was

indicted for bank robbery.

This was the year that we seniors were in the eighth grade. Junior high dances were the thing when everyone went with friends, but boys stood on one side and girls stood on the other, each too chicken to ask the other to dance.

# 1976

Tragedy struck Boone County in June of 1976. A tornado rampaged in a northward path through Jordan, a little town six miles east of Boone. Many in the Boone area felt the after effects of the tornado and some even viewed it. The impact was total destruction, with periods of rain to pelt the ravaged property. The town of Jordan was totally destroyed along with the grade school and the grain elevator.

It was an odd coincidence that the tornado struck on Sunday June 13. There was a series of small tornados that accompanied the main tornado. The southeastern skies become dark late in the afternoon and then changed to a gloomy green, the atmosphere became very calm and then the winds began. The tornado moved northward destroying many farms before making a ninety degree turn and heading for Gilbert.

It would be many months before the town of Jordon would be put back together again.

I also hate trying to get into my locker and when I do having to reach clear up to the top one when the kid who has the bottom locker is taller than me. And I love to swim in gym.


It is boring in study hall for a half an hour with nothing to do, and the sounds are different from the sounds I heard at Page. Here I hear sounds like cars and mopeds.

I was so excited I couln't even eat my breakfast.


The first day I was so scared because the school looked as big as a battleship, but now I know my way around.
