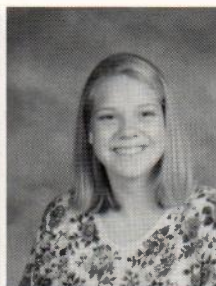
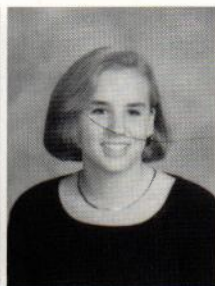
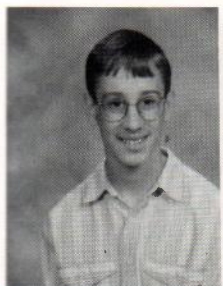
Agriculture classes also involved interesting projects. Taxidermy was introduced and horticulture projects involved

working with flower arrangements.

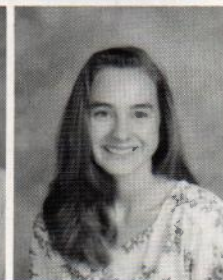
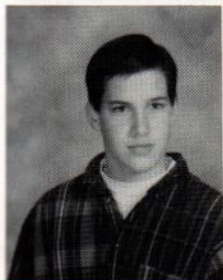
"The best part of working with the flowers was being able to give people a flower to wear right before Christmas," senior Rochelle Jones said.

Funny things also happened when working on a class project. Speech students had many minutes of "outtakes" before they had a final 4 minutes video.

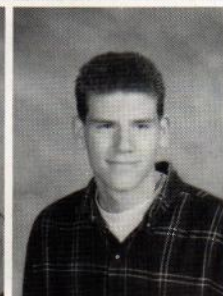
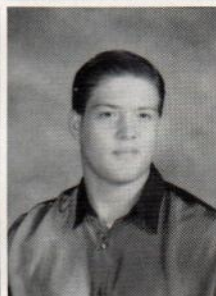
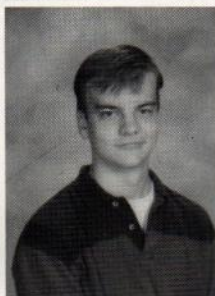
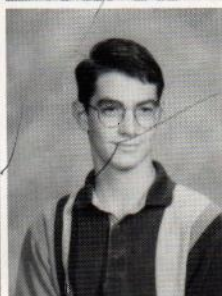
"For our physics lab, we tried to use Everclear instead of gas for our lawnmower. It blew up the mower," senior Ryan Roberts said.

extra-curricular activities and jobs.

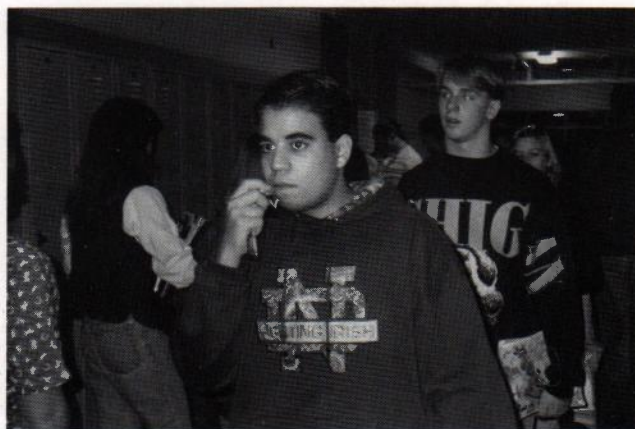
"I study until midnight or so because I have swim-

ming after school and I work until 11:00 or later," junior Erin Twiselton said.

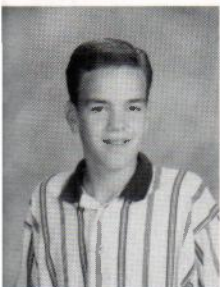
Study halls became a collection of students doing many different things. Some were frantically writing to finish assignments. Others visited or slept with no regard to getting work done.

"I don't study. I go out instead and don't worry about it," sophomore, Joby Brogden said.

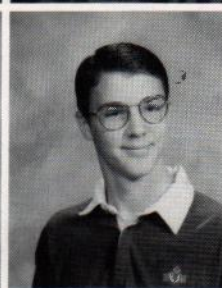
No matter what, homework caused problems. Many blamed the teachers for assigning too much without caring how much other teachers were assigning.



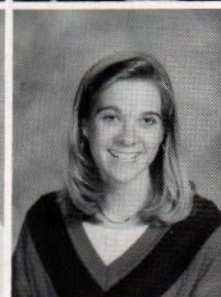
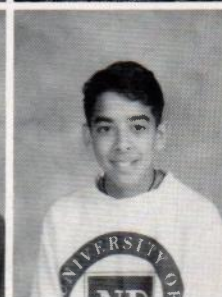
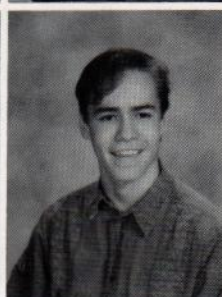
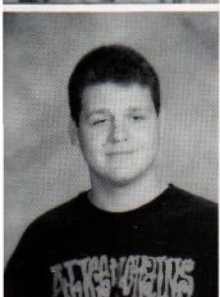

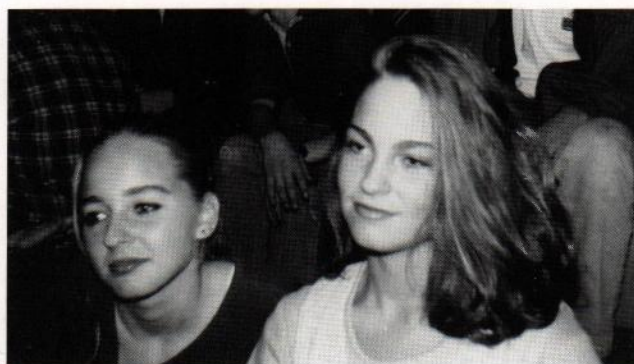
The expressions were common and heard often in the hallways of the school and almost anywhere students could be found.

thing happens to someone that should be kept quiet is all around the school in just a matter of hours," sophomore, Sarah Robinson said.

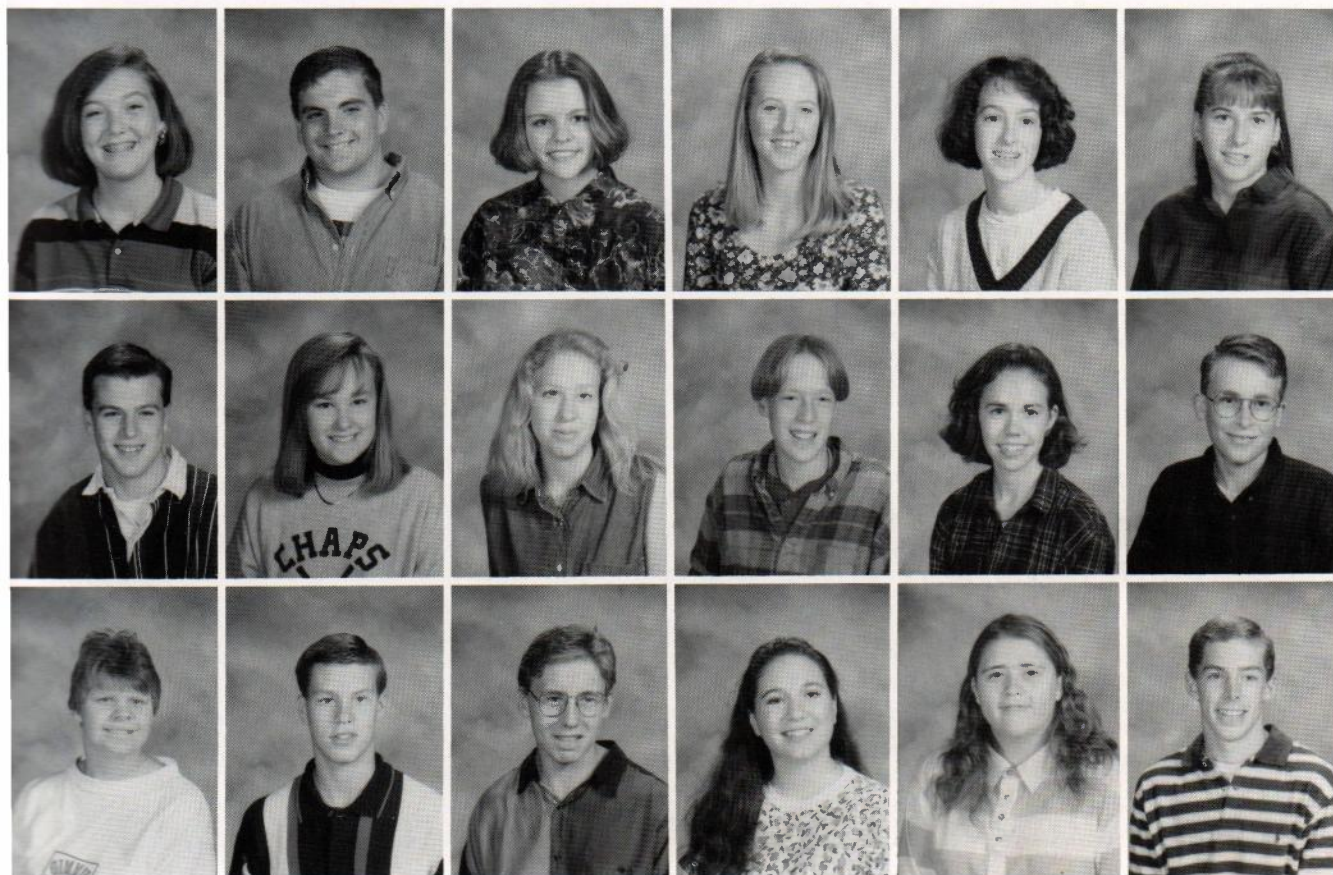


SISTERS Tina and Tonya Hughes enjoy their time at a pep assembly where they can cheer for the home crowd.

Sometimes rumors broke up friendships, and other times they just brought people closer together.

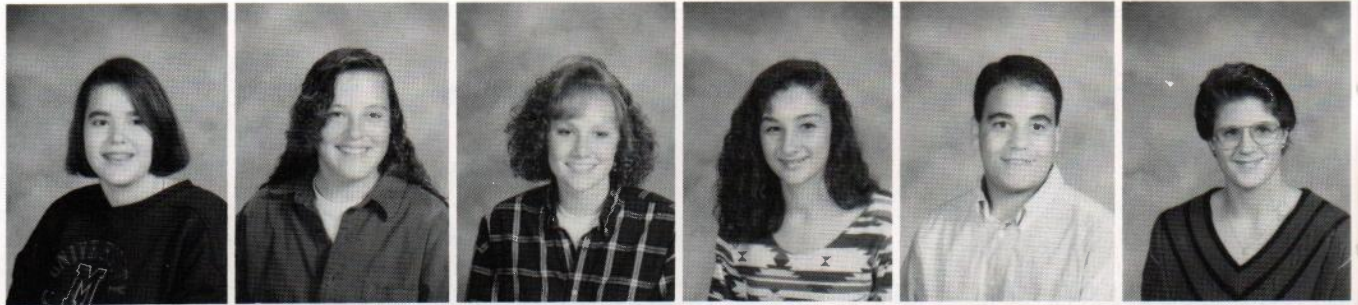

and 8th graders. Seniors, Chandra Herrstrom and David Behn encouraged students to do their best work in order to prepare

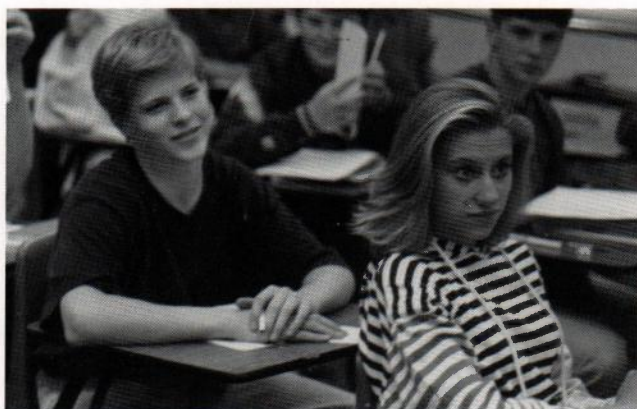
for the excellence that they would pursue in the future.

Goeppinger winner, Tiffany Grider tried to do

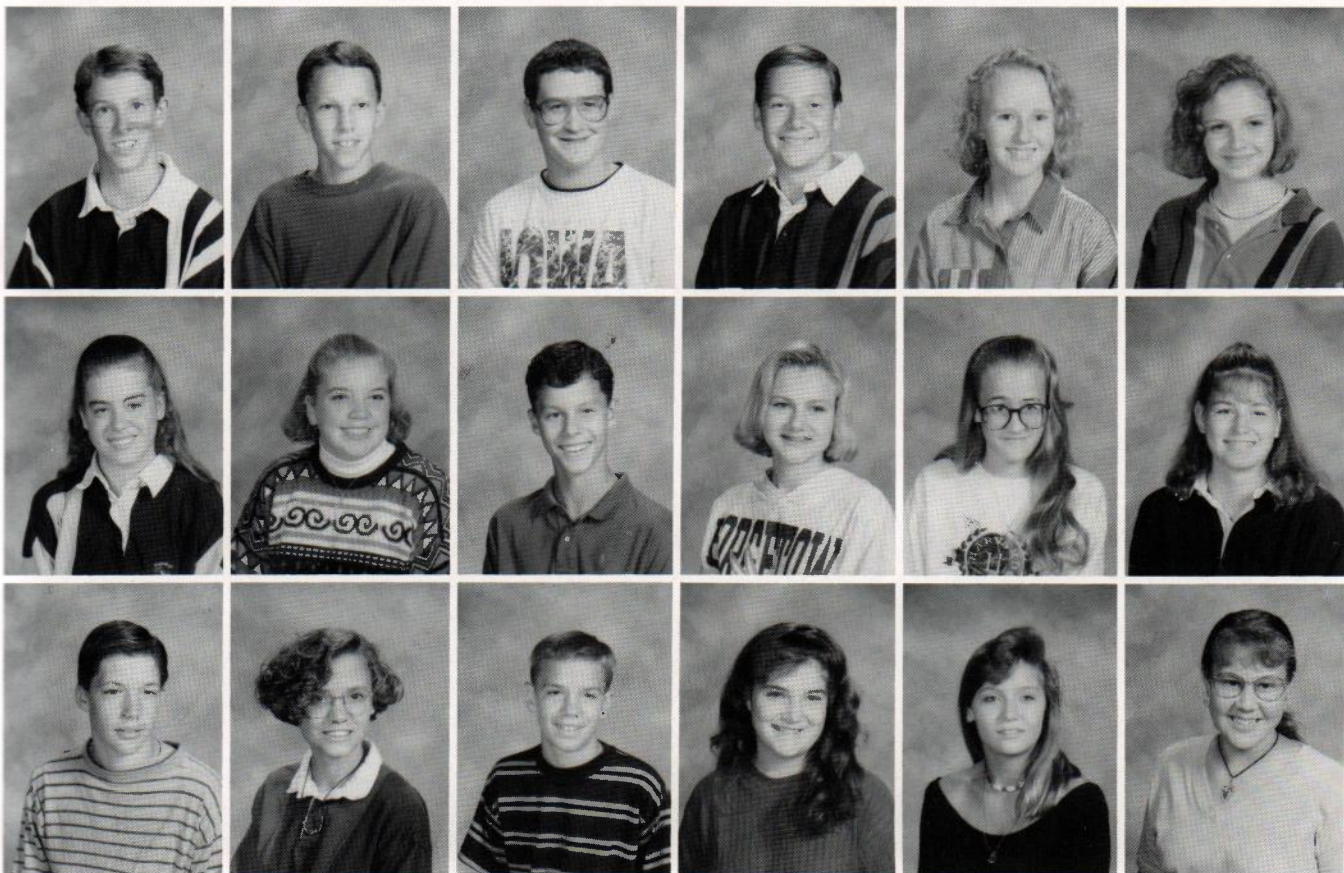
the best she could while in junior high. "I want to work hard in order to get scholarships when I go to college. Then I can choose where I want to go without having to worry about money so much," Tiffany said.

Once students started the ninth grade, a whole new era began for them. They immediately were introduced to the reality of the educational system which meant serious grading.

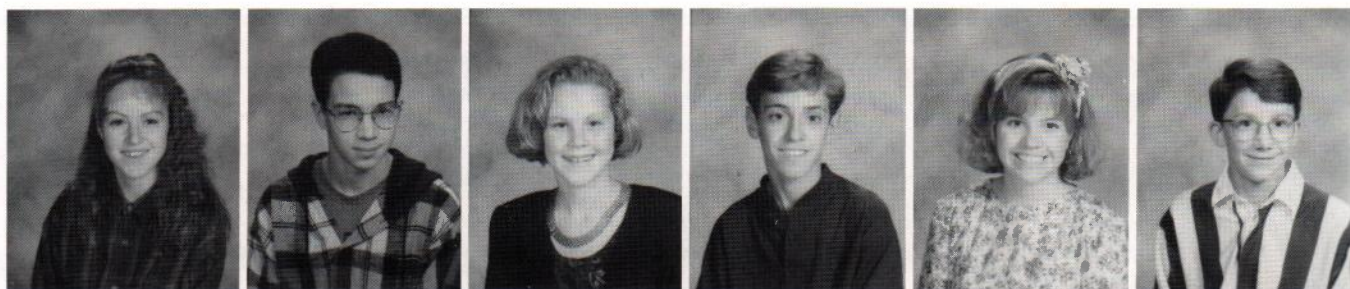
"I hope that I can keep doing as well in high school as I did in junior high," said freshman winner, Joe Shearer.
