

LLOGICAL DEFINED

Reliving World War II became a lesson eighth graders would never forget.

The unit has been in the social studies junior high curriculum for years. However, once the English classes started reading **The Diary of Anne Frank**, the unit began to snowball.

English teachers, Miss Georgiann Hagen and Mrs. Jeanne McElvain put the unit together. The goal was to have other departments tie into the unit.

At the end of the unit, they decided to present projects to parents and the public. The open house showed what all the students did to understand World War II. Each section did something different to show their understanding of the War.

Language arts classes did research. Their final project was to explain it to people at the open house. The art students did charcoal drawings that emphasized the Holocaust. The industrial tech students prepared scale drawings of concentration camps.

The Wall of Remembrance was created to show a diffferent version of a wall from the Holacust Museum. The life prep students

did the wall in their own creative ways after studying the national

Math students worked with proportions to blow a picture up in size, square by square. The picture dealt with the theme of the war.

The jazz band played music that was popular during World War II.

The computer class knew that over a million Jews were killed during this war. They decided to see how many X's could be typed in one period. Their goal was to type one million in order to visualize the reality of how many people got killed. The class only was able to make 6,000 X's.

The open house was on April 30, and had a great turnout. "There was 90% of the students' in attendance. In addition, parents, grandparents and war veterans attended," Mrs. McElvain said.

The program provided students a good way to learn and have fun while doing it.

"My favorite unit this year was the World War II unit because the teachers made it so interesting," eighth grader **Marcy Webb** said.
