The Scrollette

HE first magazine published in Boone High School was "The Review." This was not an annual but a literary magazine which published short stories, essays, and poems, much to the delight of the student authors. It helped to encourage the students to strive toward better form and expression in writing and was interesting and entertaining to the reader. After a few years, however, interest in "The Review" subsided and Boone High School was without a publication of any sort.

To the class of 1913 belongs the credit for publishing the first annual, called "The Scroll." It flourished for many years and was popular with the student body. But in 1934 along came "Old Man Depression," almost forcing the school to abandon a year book altogether.

Nevertheless, the staff and the senior class strove valiantly, and the 1934 "Scrollette" was the result. It is true that it was much smaller, a mere shadow of the old Scroll; but it was well liked and supported far beyond the hopes of the staff.

As different eras in literature have gone from one extreme to the other before reaching a happy medium, so our annual has gone from one extreme to the other in size and form. But a more informal type of annual is emerging and one which may be better suited to the needs of the average high school.

The 1935 staff has done its share toward improving the "Scrollette." More photography arranged in a new style, better literary work, and other features all contributed toward increasing the number of enthusiastic backers. The staff wishes to thank all those who helped make this book possible and to extend its heartlest wish for the success of the 1936 "Scrollette."

Origin of Boone High Activities

HE first outside activities in Boone High School were the Lowell and Everett societies, organized in 1878. These developed into various other literary societies which continued through all the years until 1923, when the Masque and Buskin and Boone High Players took their place. Today these two dramatic clubs have a combined membership of one hundred and ten, and the interest in dramatics continues to grow. Each year the clubs present two plays in assemblies and one public play. This year, under the direction of Miss Harris, the B. H. S. Players gave "Luncheon for Six" in assembly, and Miss E. Harvey coached the cast which produced "Wienies on Wednesday," the Masque and Eurkin assembly play. The two clubs combined in producing "Hot Copy," their public play.

Interest in declam was first aroused by S. L. Moore over thirty years ago when he offered a ten-dollar prize to the winner in each section. For the past two years the prizes awarded in the home contest have been furnished by the "Boone Busine's and Professinal Woman's Club." Between thirty

and forty students have entered the contest each year.

Boone High has always been keenly interested in athletics. In the year 1933 Coach Fisher started a very extensive program with the slogan "Athletics for all, and all for athletics." Every boy in school participated in at least two or more of the many sports, Included in the program were: ice hockey, kittenball, baskct-ball, net-ball, football, wrestling, swimming, cross country hikes, tennis and track. A similar program has been carried out this year.

Our Science Club has not always been known by its present name. For several years before 1928 it was "The Radio Club." In 1928 the name was changed to "The Areo Club" and in 1931 to "The Science Club." Not to be outdone, the girls have their own Science Club which was organized in 1933.

Although the commercial course was introduced shortly before our high school was moved to this building in 1913, the Commercial Club wasn't organized till 1923.

Mr. Quinn, now a teacher in our junior high, was one of the students responsible

WRESTLING: State championship in 1923, 1925.



Clarinet solo, band, girls' sextette placed second in district contest in 1932. Clarinet solo, tuba solo, girls' sextette placed first in sub-district contest in 1932. Cornet solo, clarinet solo placed second in sub-district contest in 1933. Baritone solo, woodwind quartette placed first in sub-district contest in 1933. History of Boone High School

ON 1856 the citizens of Boonsboro erected the first school building in the town.

A little two-story wooden structure known as Union Hall, located on the corner of Story and Seventh streets (the present site of the Crary Hardware Co.) housed the first high school in Boone in 1867. Since this building was used for lower grades also, the quarters soon became so crowded that in 1868 two brick buildings were erected, one in the fourth ward and one in the second.

The building in the fourth ward, known as "Bloody Fourth," which the High School used for several years, again became too crowded and part of the classes were moved to what was then known as Ivis Hall, on the present site of the I. O. O. F. building.

In 1874, the new City Hall was completed, and the school board rented four rooms on the second floor for high school classes. These two halls served as our high school until 1878 when the Washington Building was built. Washington, which is still in use as a grade school, served as the home of our high school until 1913.

No class was officially graduated from B. H. S. until 1880, although 118 students attended before that and some finished the course offered. This first class of 1880 boasted seven members, six girls and one boy. That boy, now a man who still lives in Boone, loved and respected by all who know him, was John L. Goeppinger. He was the first president of the Alumni Association and first graduate to become a member of the school board, later being elected president. He has always taken an active interest in and done much for the advancement of educational opportunities in Boone.

Boonesboro, then a separate town, had its own high school, twenty-nine students graduating from its classes from 1888 to 1894. In the latter year Boonesboro High School, which had been held in the Lincoln building, united with the high school in the Washington building, which served its purpose until the increasing number of students made larger quarters a necessity.

In 1913 the erection of the old part of the present building was begun and on January 19, 1914, the classes were transferred. Still the number of students increased until it was finally necessary to build the present junior high addition. The seventh and eighth grades were then moved to this building and the school has been large and flourishing ever since.

MEMORIES

Dawned the morning of September fourth, and we, the students of Boone High School, suddenly found ourselves starting to get up at eight o'clock instead of the summer's customary twelve. The business of school had started again! And with it came not only work, but also lots of pleasure to be remembered.

SEPTEMBER

Remember way back when Joe Cantlin made that sensational touchdown, running eighty yards to defeat Mason City 2-6? This event furthered the drive that our team had started by defeating Glidden 27-0.

On the fourteenth we had the annual, and somewhat hilarious, tryouts for yell leaders and those who received the best support and gave us the fewest laughs were: Mary Jane Gustafson, Catherine Canakes, Bob Miles, Don Berglund, and Junior Harvey.

The nineteenth brought the beginning of the Bumble "B" campaign which proved to be very successful.

As the month rolled around "Pep" Hunter was elected to lead the senior class, while the juniors chose Richard Benson. Mike Enich was the choice of the sophomores.

On the twenty-fifth, we had the first of our interesting and educational paid assemblies, the Brown-Meneley duo. Since they were accomplished singers and players of organ chimes, saxophone, and piano, they were enjoyed immensely.

September was topped off by an always wel-come vacation, this time due to Teachers' County Institute.

OCTOBER

The Toreadors made October an outstanding month by adding to their victories Indianola, Oskaloosa, and Marshalltown with the respective scores of 14-0, 7-0, 6-0. And the parties and dances afterward will be remembered.

There were outstanding events of another sort also. On the sixteenth we held an assembly to dedicate the beautiful pictures purchased from the Colonial Art Company.

The evenings of the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth were devoted to the musical production, "In the Money," in which the glee clubs and many dancers participated.

The twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh were mem-orable days for several fortunate delegates who journeyed to Ames for the Iowa High School Press Convention.

And to end this busy month, Mrs. Jeannette Mann, State President of W. C. T. U., talked to the student body, giving the views of that organization on alcohol and cigarettes.

NOVEMBER

We started this exciting month by a vacation on the first, second, and third, when the teachers assembled in Des Moines for State Teachers' Con-

The eighth brought the second paramount as-sembly, the Brown Jubilee Singers, who gave us a delightful rendition of negro spirituals.

The next day the Masque and Buskin dramatic lub presented a clever one-act assembly play 'Wienies on Wednesday."

Our basket-ball team won its first victory the fourteenth, defeating Perry 32-13. But our pleasure at this was soon curbed by two defeats from Grinnell 32-13 and Marshalltown 27-20.

On the twenty-first, we heard sweet caroling in the halls; it was the girls' glee club, who an-nually serenade us with their soft, clear voices.

And then, the much-looked-forward-to Christmas vacation ended December with a bang!

The seventh of January, 1935 found the seemingly forever deserted school building again filled to the brim with rested, gay, back-from-vacation students.

On the fourth, previous to our return, the Tor-eadors met with another defeat from Newton, 38-21.

On the eighth, Fort Dodge defeated us 27-24.

The world champion table tennis players jour-neyed to Boone for an exhibition on the four-teenth, and did we ever see some real playing:

On the fifteenth, our basket-ball team went to Fort Dodge and were victorious with a score of 23-24.

Oskaloosa won the game on the eighteenth, the score being 29-16. This date also brought an end to the old semester.

On the twenty-eighth, delegates from Penn College gave talks in favor of world peace in an assembly.

Stanley Brooks, character actor, portrayed several of Dickens' immortal characters the twenty-ninth, and proved to be very interesting.

FEBRUARY

Marshalltown came on the first to defeat Boone 27-22.

On the eighth the declamatory contest was held to decide the winners who were to go to the pre-liminary contest. Victors were: Oratorical, Mary Lyon, "The Jungle Law"; Dramatic, Louise Anderson, "Apple Blossoms"; Humorous, Eleanor Shaw, "The Widow's Mites."

UILL AND SCROLL, international honorary society for high school journalists, was established April 10, 1926 through the efforts of a group of high school supervisors.

It gradually became enlarged until it is now international, having chapters not only in every state in the union, but also in Hawaii, England, China, Alaska, and British Honduras. There are eight hundred chapters in all, and twelve thousand young journalists wear the badge of the society.

Quill and Scroll has, from its beginning, sponsored contests in journalistic work and conducted researches for the purpose of discovering types of publications best suited to high schools.

Membership in the organization may be secured only through a local chapter.

The following requirements must be met by members at the time of their election:

- (1) They must be of at least junior standing.
- (2) They must be in the upper third of their class.
- (3) They must have done superior work in some phace of journalism.
- (4) They must be recommended by the supervisor,
- (5) They must be approved by the national secretary-treasurer.

The Boone chapter was organized in October, 1927, when the National Council, in executive session in Iowa City, granted a charter.

There are five charter members: Catherine Dornan, Helen Sheetz, Vivian Richie, Ruth Bennett, and Anne Shaw.

At present there are twenty-four members in the Boone chapter which meets every two weeks to study current writers and transact the necessary business. Twice each year a banquet is given after which the pledges from Bumble "B" and "Scrollette" are initiated.

National Honor Society

N 1919, the Secondary School Principals founded the National Honor Society. A chapter was organized in Boone High School in 1933, the first officers being: Weldon Brown, President; Gretchen Merrick, Vice-President; Kenneth Mann, Secretary. The 1934 Chapter chose for its officers: John R. Myers, President and Byron Carlson, Secretary. The 1935 officers are: Robert Cooper, President; Joy Edmondson, Secretary.

The society represents the fundamental objectives for which schools are instituted and gives recognition to those who have attained most nearly the desired ends. Those chosen must excel in scholarship, character, leadership, and service, and must rank in the upper third of the class. They must pledge eternal lovalty to the society and its standards. They are then permitted to wear the honor pin with a keystone, symbolizing high ideals, and a flaming torch, the emblem of purpose, emblazoned upon it. This is a constant reminder of the aim they solemnly repeated: "Our aim shall be to hold before the school such motives as shall induce others to aspire to scholarly habits, enlisting in worthy service and leading forth in all things that shall advance the welfare of the school."

A student may achieve many honors in Boone High, but the highest and most cherished one remains that of admission to the National Honor Society. Whenever anyone is seen wearing an honor pin, he is immediately recognized as a representative student and an active all-round person.




