1946 FOOTBALL SEASON

The Toreadors started practicing on the 24th of August. Some familiar faces that appeared were those of Dominic Belmont, Bill Curell, Bob Van de Woestine, Chuck Denning, and Roger Orr. Coach Baldus began drilling hard for the Clarinda game. Friday the 13th came up lucky for the Toreadors as they won over the Trojans to the gay tune of 13 to 6. Chuck Denning, Boone's fullback, looked like a good bid for all-state in this game. Moreover, Ray Mestdagh proved that "for a little guy" he could take a lot of punishment. The whole team played a good first half, but let down a little in the last half and Clarinda scored. With the Clarinda game out of the way the Toreadors put in a rough week preparing for their first conference game with the Oskaloosa Indians.

The next week the Toreadors sent the Indians to "the happy hunting ground" minus their scalps—after a 32 to 0 victory over the Redmen. It is hard to mention the stars in this game because everybody played a good game. The line played a good offensive and defensive game by opening great holes on offense and by holding the Indians to very little yardage.

Another Friday night came around and found the Toreadors playing the Bluejays of Perry. By the superb playing of the whole team in the first half, Boone came out on top of a 12-0 score.

The Toreadors polished their offense and saved themselves the next week for the all-important game with Marshalltown. It was a very fine game on the part of the Toreadors except for one thing—fumbles. Although outweighed several pounds in every position, the Toreadors held the Bobcats scoreless the first half; this was a great tribute to the alertness of the whole team on defense. The loss of Denning by an injury hurt the Boone team considerably. Thus the Toreadors lost their first game, 13-0, to Marshalltown.

After this tilt, the Toreadors took to the road for their next four games. With high spirit they rebounded from their first defeat and prepared to invade the lair of the Grinnell Tigers. However, in a very rough-and-tumble game marked by several penalties, the Tigers outfought the Toreadors and came out on top, 12-0. Boone's offense was good spasmodically but was hurt by crucial fumbles and several injuries. The Grinnell team took advantage of the Boone errors and capitalized to get two touchdowns. The Toreadors worked hard all week trying to rebound from two defeats, and prepared to trample the Ramblers of Jefferson. With the line opening great holes and with Ray Mestdagh supplying the speed and deception, the Toreadors punched over two first-quarter touchdowns and then coasted to give Boone a 14-0 edge at the end of the game. The quickness with which the Toreadors

struck and the general play of the team were outstanding in this game.

After their fourth success the Toreadors traveled to Newton to play the undefeated Cardinals and returned with the short end of a 20-0 score. This brought the Toreadors to the encounter with the Ames Little Cyclones. The Toreadors were honored with the privilege of playing on Clyde Williams Field of Iowa State College. After working hard all week, they met with a muddy field and an All-State quarterback. The result was a poor first half, from which the Toreadors never quite recovered, although the second half

looked different to the spectators. When the game ended, Boone was on the short end of a 20-0 score. They had won .500 of their 8 games. Many people thought the Toreadors wouldn't want to play any more games after the one with Ames. However, they showed the type of football they were capable of playing when they trounced Loras Academy of Dubuque, 14-0. Capitalizing on the errors of the Loras team, Boone made two touchdowns. With several substitutes seeing action, the Toreadors played one of their best all-around games. They completed their season with five wins out of nine games while playing some of the stiffest competition in the state of Iowa.

OUTSTANDING SENIOR LETTERMEN

BILL CURELL—Captain of this year's team, Bill called signals from his end position. A two-letter winner, he always played steady, consistent ball. Bill was awarded a position on the second All-Conference team and honorable mention on I.D.P.A. and the Register's All-State teams.

BOB VAN DE WOESTINE—"Vandy" was one of the scrappiest, most rugged members of the squad. He was a letterman from last year. Always outstanding on defense, "Vandy" received honorable mention on the All-Conference selections.

ROGER ORR—"Wimpy" was another of the lettermen back from last year. Always full of fight and spirit, "Wimpy" was awarded honorable mention on the All-Conference selections and on the I.D.P.A. and the Register's All-State teams.

BOB LEE—"Gus" was one of the smaller men, but this definitely helped him. Combining his size with his shiftiness, he was an outstanding broken field runner. "Gus" received honorable mention on the All-Conference team.

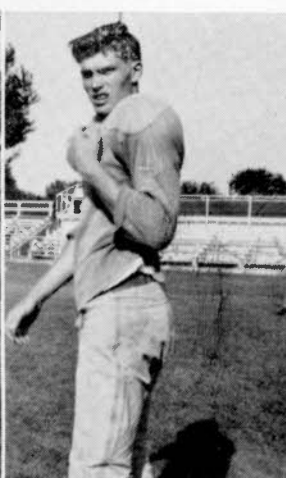
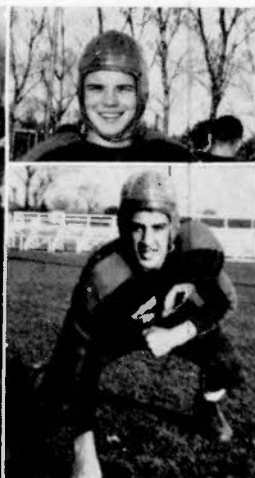

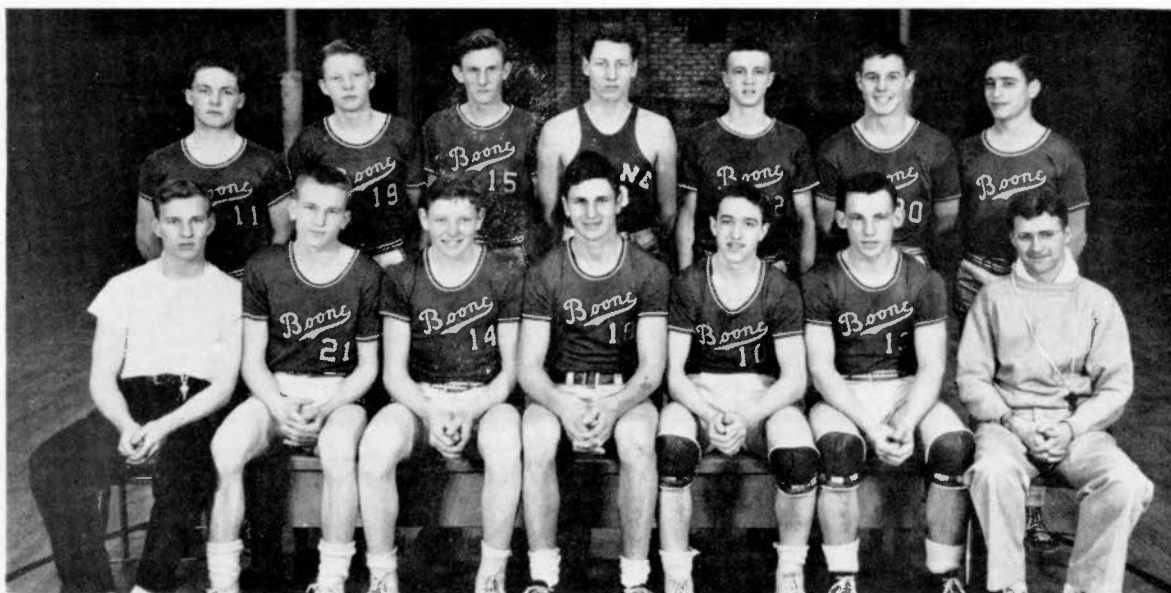

BASKETBALL

With the coming of King Winter and his icy blasts comes basketball, accompanied by wildly cheering crowds and the intense excitement of last-minute victories and stirring exhibitions of skill and courage.

Lady Luck smiled upon Boone High this year as the curtain came down on one of the best Boone cage seasons in nearly a decade. The Toreadors completed their season with the assurance that they had developed a squad which was a match for any five in the state.

Missing the state tournament by only one game and five points, the Toreadors hung up an impressive record of sixteen victories out of twenty-two contests. They were the first Boone team in nine years to advance from the district tourney, and further distinguished themselves by moving to the sub-state finals where they were nosed out by a strong Carroll squad.

The Toreadors opened their season with a decisive 34-12 decision over Perry in a non-conference clash and followed this with a seven-point victory over Nevada by a 41-34 count.

Suffering their first defeat of the year, the Red and Green lost a heart-breaker to Grinnell, 26-25; but they rode on with consecutive victories over Webster City, Oskaloosa, Indianola, Newton, Nevada, and Cedar Falls before dropping a 40-37 thriller to Ames. Fort Dodge stopped the Toreadors, 30-25; but they rebounded to take 30-23 and 23-21 victories over Marshalltown and Grinnell, respectively.

During the only overtime period game, Oskaloosa checked the determined Boone quintet, 42-41. Although the Toreadors threw a scare into undefeated Ames, they again fell in a tempestuous 39-35 contest, which had the crowd on its feet in response to the torrid pace. Snowing under Marshalltown, 60-33, the Boone squad played their best game, during which Bob Lee poured in 27 markers as he set an individual scoring record for Boone High.

Tuning up for tourney competition, the Red and Green took Newton and Fort Dodge in stride, after which, they entered the district tournament as favorites, polishing off Jefferson, 39-20, and Nevada, 49-22.

Boone took a 44-42 encounter from Fort Dodge in the first game of sub-state but dropped a 44-40 battle to Carroll in the finals.

The starting five, which was altered but once during the season, consisted of Jim Johnstone and Tom Grimes at forward, Bob Clifton at center, and Russ Anderson and Bob Lee at the guard slots. Anderson and Grimes were elected honorary co-captains at the end of the season.

Post-season honors were received by several members of the squad: Lee received honorable men-

tion on both the I.D.P.A. and the Register's All-State teams, and a berth on the All-Conference first team. Another squad member, Russ Anderson, received honorable mention on all three of the above teams. Honorable mention was given Clifton and Grimes on the All-Conference team; while Clifton also received honorable mention on the Register's team.

This year marked the return of Frank O'Connor to the coaching ranks of Boone High after several years in the service. Working with only two letter winners, "Bucky" developed a squad which never gave up until the final whistle. Coach Stutzman's reserve team made a good showing in the county tournament and also furnished frequent substitutes for the varsity squad.

Congratulations to Coach O'Connor and the members of the team for the fine record they made during the past year.

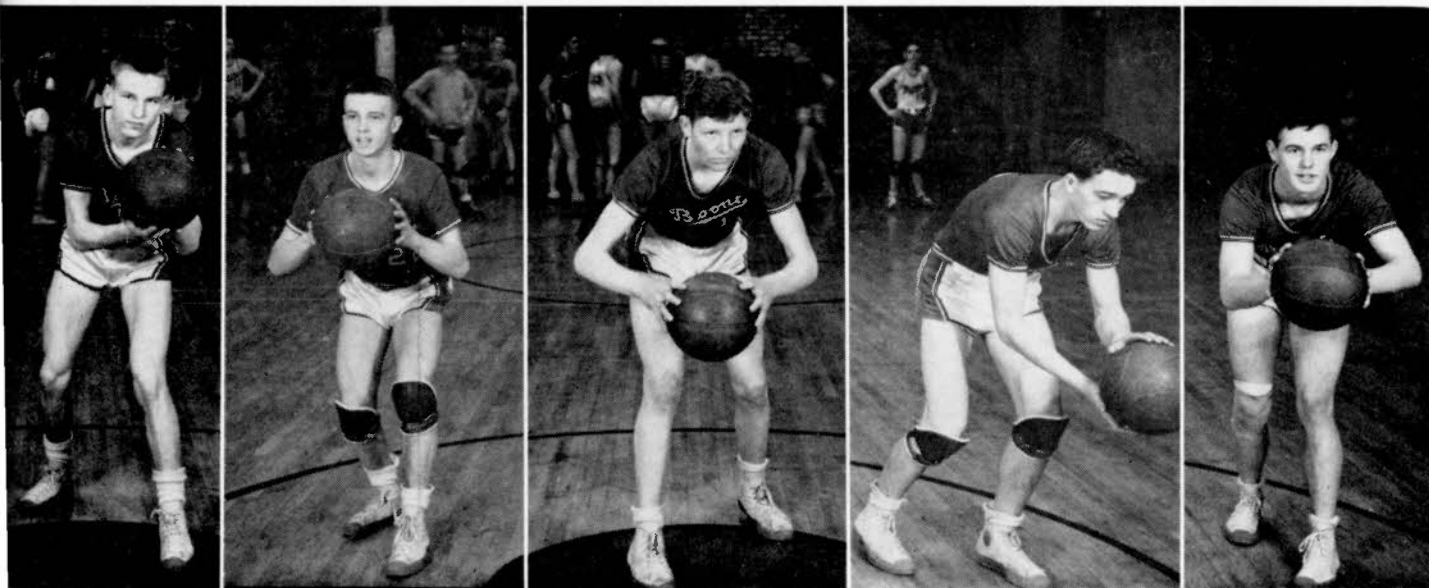

GIRLS' BASKETBALL

The Boone High Toreadorettes, coached by Jan Harken, completed their season very successfully this year with six wins, two ties, and five losses out of thirteen games played. Totalling 440 points to their opponents' 475, they scored a game average of forty points while their opponents made thirty-eight. Bebe Fisher led the team with a total of 243 points and a game average of 20.2. For the second consecutive year the Toreadorettes rose to county champs by defeating Luther,

Pilot Mound, and Napier. The finals with Napier proved exciting, as the evenly-matched teams battled in an overtime for the score: Boone 43, Napier 42. In the sectional tournaments, Boone defeated Blairsburg and Jewel, but lost the finals to Kamrar with a lopsided score of 60-27.

We are proud of our girls' team for bringing home the first place county trophy and runners'-up trophy from the sectional tournaments.

SWIMMING

The Toreador tankmen, in the 1946-47 season, made great strides on their road to glory. During the year they won two meets and were defeated in four, while swimming against some of the stiffest competition in the state.

They opened the season in a dual meet with North High of Des Moines in the home pool. In this meet they were downed by a score of 39-27. Later in the year this was repeated, but they gained their revenge in the state meet by nosing out the "Polar Bears" by one point.

Their other two defeats for the season were credited to Roosevelt High of Des Moines. The Teddies beat them by the scores of 38-28 and 43-23. Roosevelt claims some of the best swimmers in the nation, as was shown during the season.

Both Toreador victories for the year were at the expense of East High of Des Moines. In the first meet against East the Toreadors, who won 47-19, didn't yield a single first place during the entire meet. The return engagement against East was held in the YMCA pool in Des Moines, where they defeated the East High team 42-24.

At the close of the season the local "paddlers" journeyed to Iowa City to compete in the state swimming meet, which was held in the university

pool. Here it was demonstrated that Boone High had one of the top relay teams in the state, composed of Jack Herman, Dave Yegge, Lee Cooper, and John Mallas. This team came in with a photo finish only to be nosed out by the "River Kings" of Clinton. Lee Cooper and Jack Herman placed third and fourth in their respective events, the 100-yard and 220-yard free style. The squad also took a 180-yard medley relay team with them—composed of "Bud" Dahl, Jack Blanshan, and Dick Sovereign—which got a fifth place in its event.

The swimming team will lose only two seniors this year, but they will be missed a great deal. Lee Cooper is one of the team's ace sprinters who was beaten only a very few times this year. John Mallas, the other, displayed his abilities in the 100-yard back stroke and 40-yard free style.

The team has some good individual material returning as a nucleus for next year's team; namely, Jack Herman, who can swim in almost any event and swim it well, and "Bud" Dahl, who has bright prospects in the breast stroke. Others include: Bob Leaverton, diving; Jack Blanshan, back stroke; Dick Sovereign, Jim Berglund, John McEntaffer and Dave Yegge, free style.

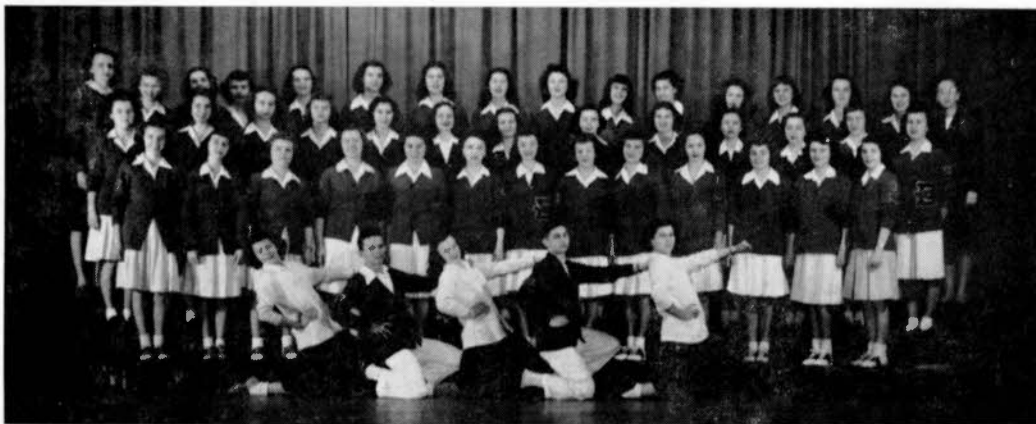

STUDENT COUNCIL

Fellowship and co-operation among the students are the chief aims of the Student Council. Added to these, of course, is full co-operation with the faculty in maintaining the highest possible school standards.

The presidents of each home room are chosen as members of this organization. Membership entails a very definite responsibility, as the students are brought face to face with actual problems which must be solved. For instance, during the basketball season, the large crowds in the first floor halls necessitated some protection for locker holders on this floor. Members of the Student Council volunteered to lock all of these lockers after school on the nights of home basketball games in the gym. Through their efforts much damage to the lockers was prevented.

Corridor conduct and discipline have always been more or less a matter of concern to both the students and the faculty. During the past year the Student Council has taken definite steps toward the betterment of the conditions in the halls. Each homeroom president called his classmates' attention to the prevailing bad conditions. Through the Student Council the students were placed on a temporary honor system with the teachers remaining in the halls, but not for the purpose of 'policing' them. The result was a very definite decrease in the number of disturbances in the corridors before and after school, as well as between classes.

During March the organization launched a drive to raise funds for the "Save the Children Federation." An assembly was held during which the plan was presented to the student body. Through the efforts of the S.C.F., money and other aid is given to the needy children of Europe. The students of Boone High raised enough through personal contribution to sponsor a school located in Fougères, France. This program highlighted the work of the Student Council during the year.



Since the Student Council is composed of representatives of the student body, it presents in itself a miniature democratic government. Its members are given an opportunity to gain experience by actually participating in the functions of this "government."

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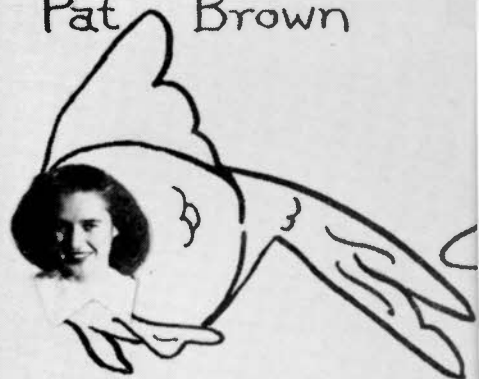

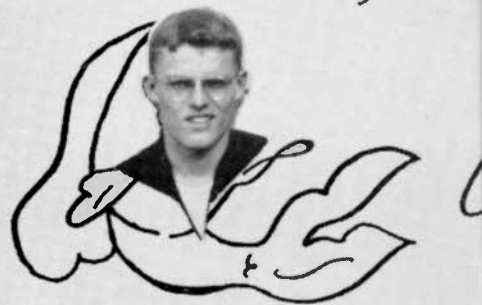

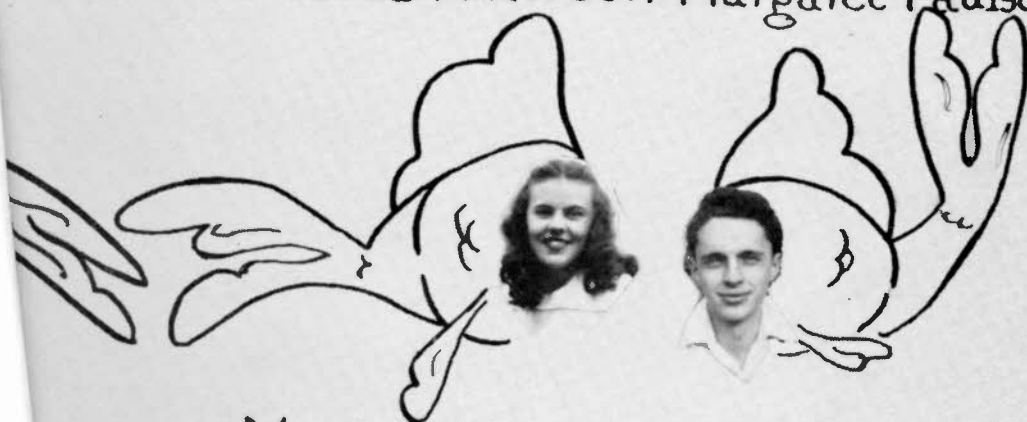
