Bill Sapp's love for baseball leads to Coaches Hall of Fame

Five Central Iowa Conference titles. Two state championship teams. A 375-165 won-loss record.

Add the above and you have Bill Sapp of Boone, a newcomer-to-be in the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame. What this honor and Sapp's records do not reveal is his love for the game.

Certainly, I love the game," the 50year-old coach said. "I wouldn't still be coaching if I didn't."

Sapp has coached at Boone since 1959, winning state crowns in 1965 and 1967. A third state trophy just missed the Toreadors' trophy case when the 1972 squad placed third.

"Success breeds success," he said. "I can't take credit for everything. We have a small school, but there's been good material and effort by the kids. Everything has just fallen into place.

Including Sapp's philosophy. Prep athletes are amateurs in the truest sense of the word. No financial reward is needed to justify spending tedious hours on the diamond.

Sapp recognizes this. He recognizes the need for the game to be fun for his athletes. If there's one reason behind

Sapp's success, it's this: "My philosophy," he chuckled. "Is whatever is best for the kids is best for the program. If I as a coach can go at my job with 150 per cent effort, I've done my part.

"The kids need to enjoy what they're doing. If they love the game of baseball, it's fun to coach them.

"I instruct my players to just concentrate on the game. A person cannot do more than one thing at a

time. Let the umpires umpire, the fans yell and the coaches coach. The players should play the game."

The philosophy has paid off. On March 12, Sapp will be inducted into the Hall of Fame. Joining him that day will be former major leaguer Bob Oldis of Iowa City, Bill Freese of Wiota and the late John Dorman of Upper Iowa University.

"I was surprised by my selection," Sapp marveled, "I'm pleased that my fellow coaches recognizes me like this.

"It's also a nice feeling to be included in a fine group like Bob Oldis, Dr. Dorman and Bill Freeze.

The path to the Hall of Fame has been long. Included were stops at Hopkinton and Grand Junction. Then in 1959 came what appears to be the final spot-Boone.

There he has worked with the Babe Ruth League and Little League programs. He started the successful baseball program at Boone High back

That's in the past. Now it's time to think of the upcoming season. "We're going to be competitive," Sapp promised, "We were 15-13 and second in the CIC last season. But we can be better

"We lose a catcher, a pitcher and shortstop. But the talent is here for another fine team."

Ames sophs win, 66-60


The Ames High sophomores moved their record to 10-4 on the seaon with a 66-60 win over East Waterloo Friday night.

Sapp's record shows success

Bill Sapp, Boone, coached baseball and basketball for 28 years. Before coming to Boone in 1957, he coached baseball and basketball at Hopkinton and Grand Junction high schools and was a junior varsity basketball coach at Drake University while he worked on a Masters Degree in 1951-52.

From 1957-59, Sapp coached baseball in the Boone Babe Ruth League and worked with others in the Little League program. He started up the high school baseball program, which was absent from the high school's

athletic schedule for several years, in 1959.

"We were better than .500 the first year I coached, at 8-7. All the kids were good ballplayers. We just couldn't get it together and we had no good place to practice baseball," Sapp said.

But the good skin (no grass) infield, and lights, eventually became a part of the Boone baseball scene thanks to Boone volunteers and efforts of

Sapp.

He coached Boone High School baseball through the 1977 season and compiled a career record of 318-190—a .626 percentage. During that era, his teams were summer state baseball champions in 1965 and 1967, placed third in the state in 1972 and competed at the state level in 1970, 1971.

The Boone high school team claimed five conference championships

and was runner-up six times in conference standings.

His "glory years" were from 1964 to 1972, when his teams put together a 193-65 record that included nine sectional tournament championships, six district tournament championships, five substate tournament championships and two state tournament championships.

The conference championship was won by Boone during five of those

eight years.

"I recall during those good years when we didn't lose a game a Memorial Park in Boone for five years," Sapp said.
