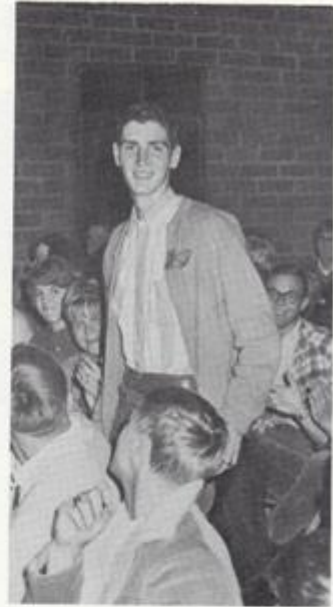

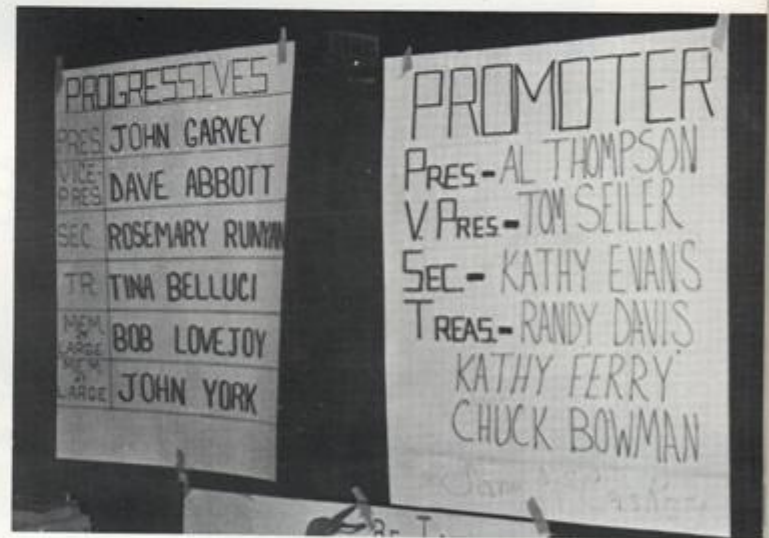

The Y.D.'s also heard several state and local senior party members speak during the year. Several members attended the District Convention at Des Moines, also.

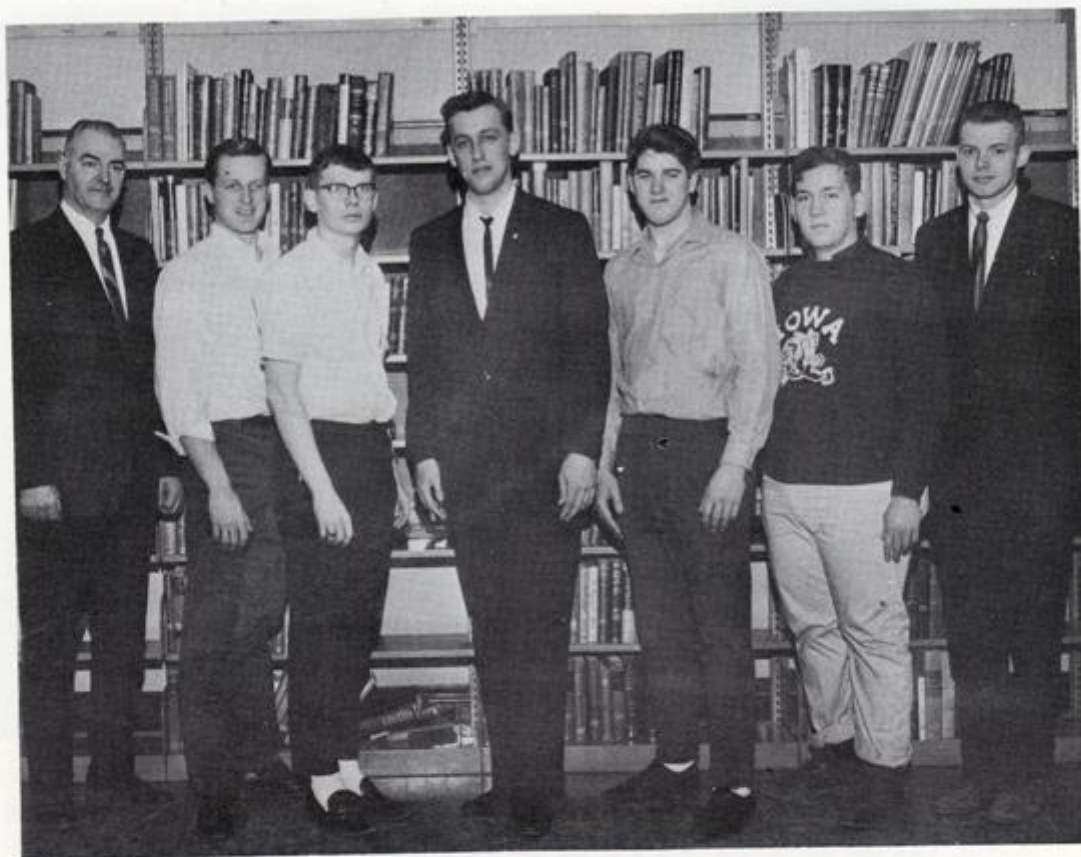
In joint ventures during the year, the political organizations first sponsored a student assembly at which the mayor of the City of Boone, Karl Knodle, spoke.

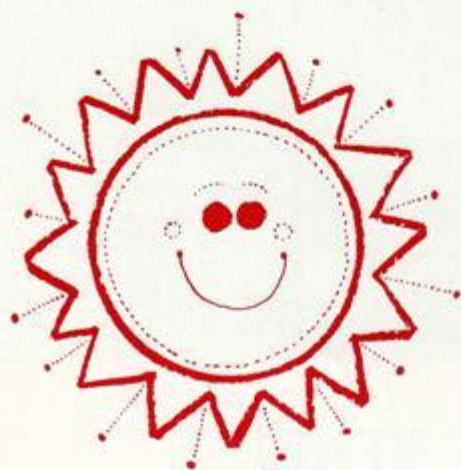
