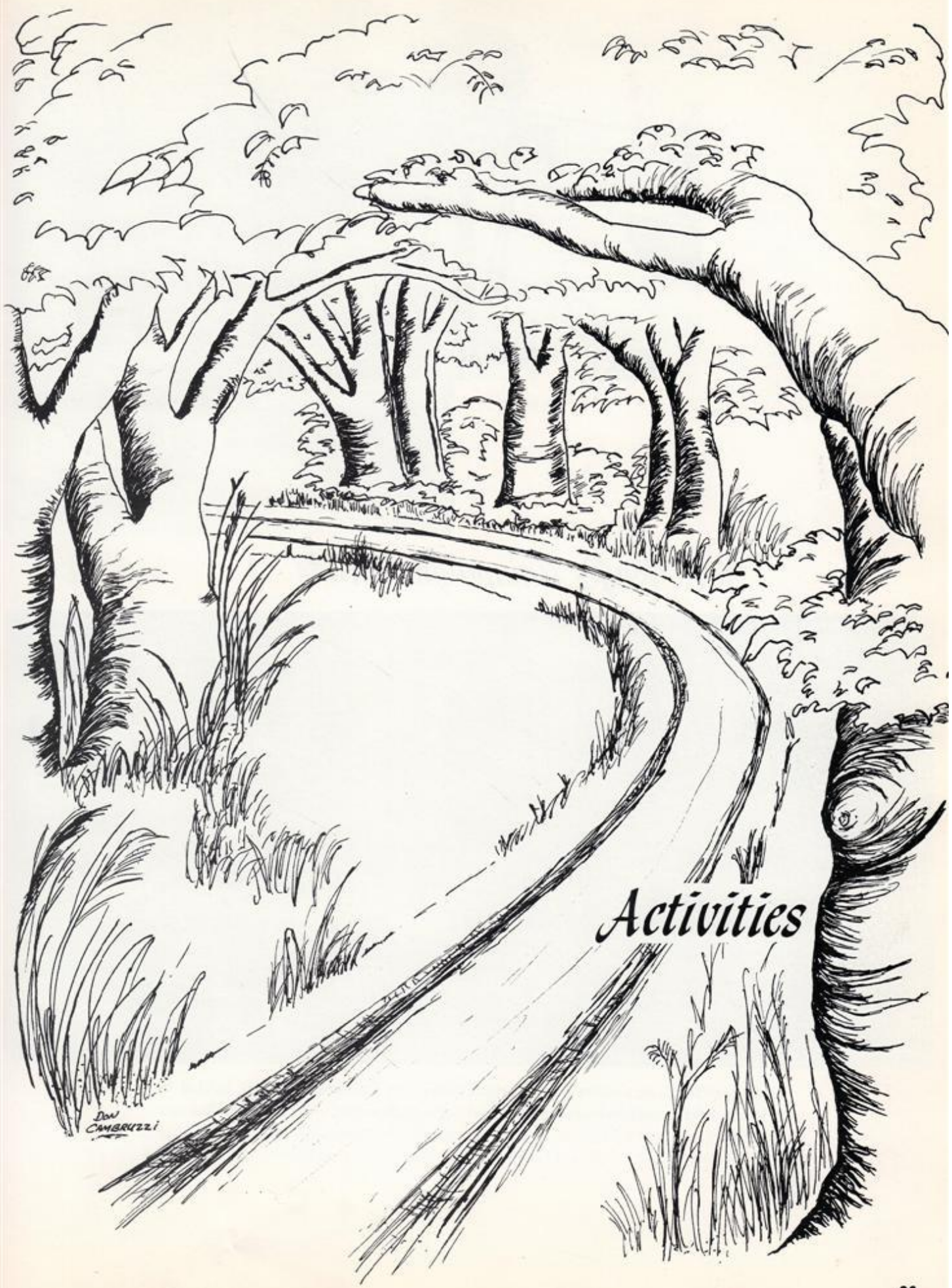

Fall Picnic



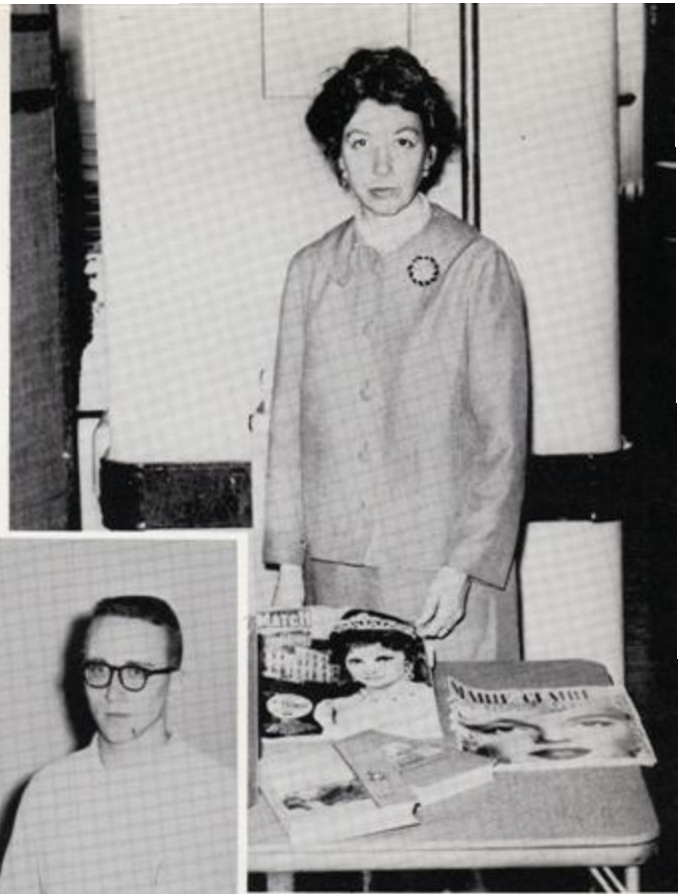

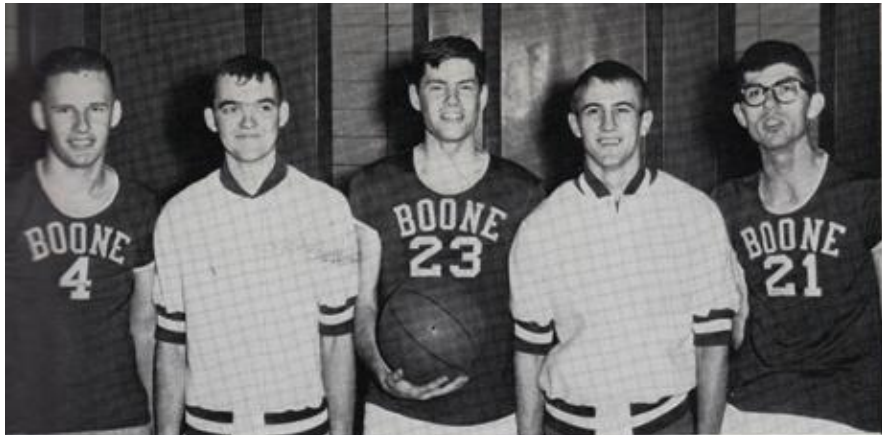

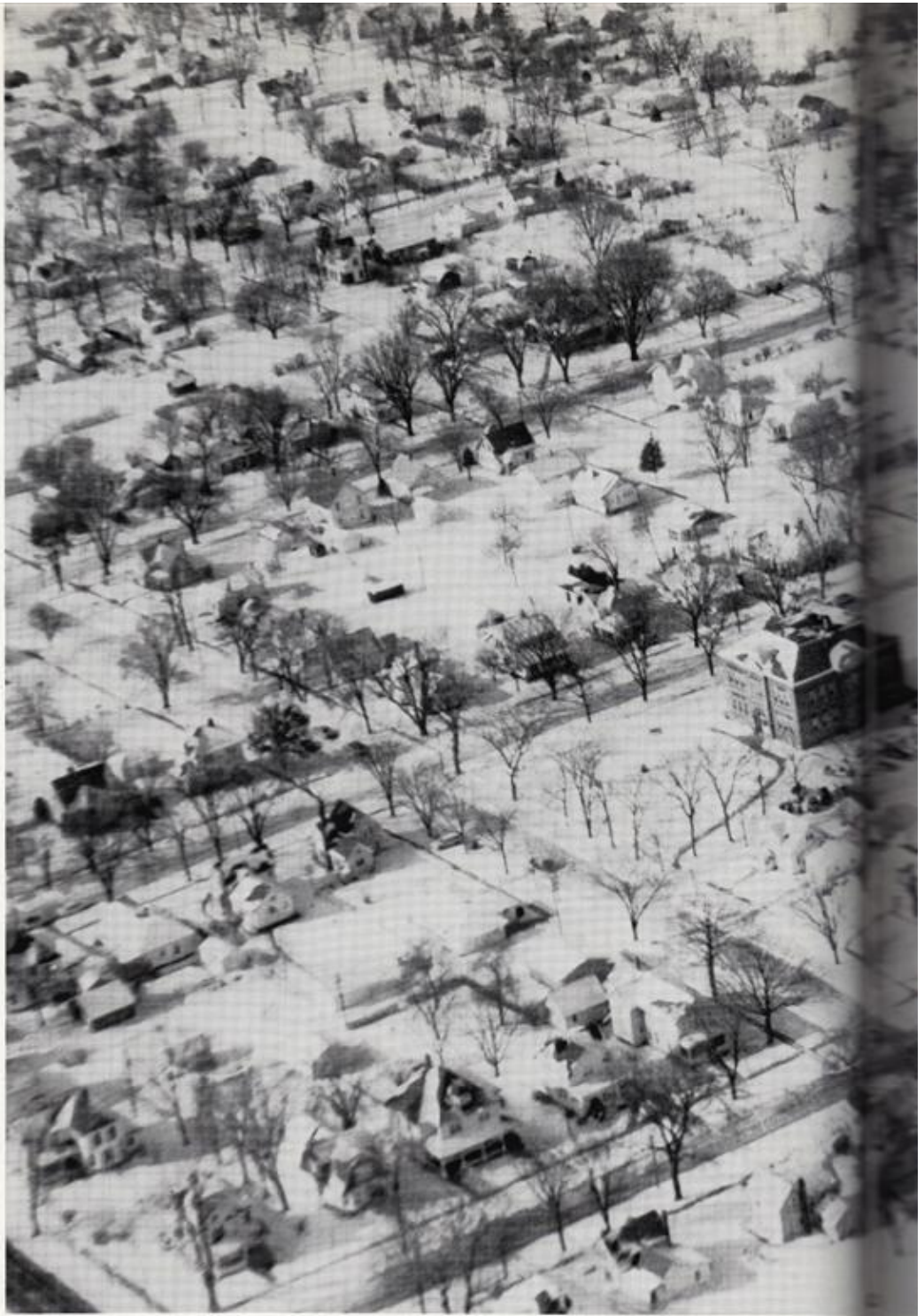
Drama Club in Action

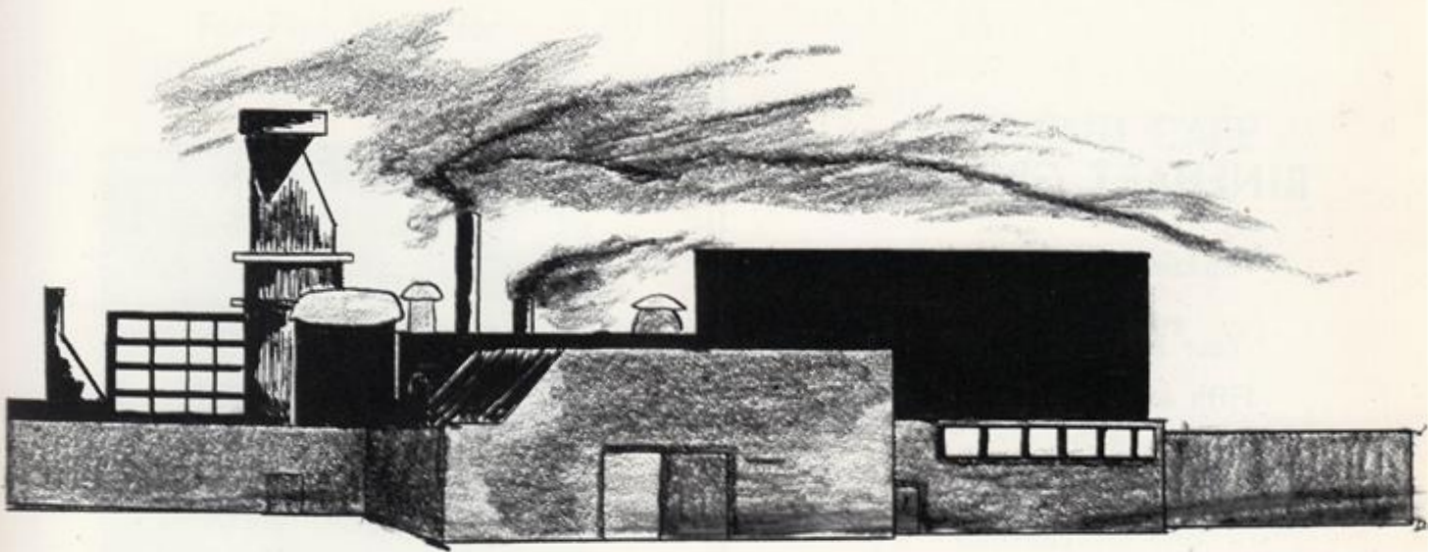

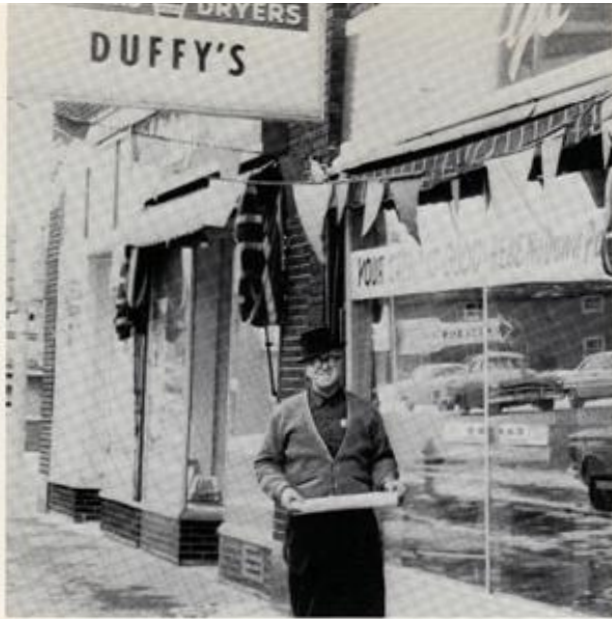
