Fond Flashbacks

A brief look back at specific events in years gone by. This time we take you back 43 years to the fall of 1950.

Names in the News: Worried by the dangers of atomic war, gossip columnist Elsa Maxwell announces her retirement. "I can't add all that trouble to those that already exist," Maxwell explains...Hollywood movie mogul Sam Goldwyn predicts that television will cut movie production by 70%. "Why," asks Goldwyn, "should people go out to see bad films when they can stay at home and see bad television?"...In San Antonio, General Jonathan Wainwright receives a check from the government for \$1,200—\$1 for every day he spent in Japanese prison camps after the capture of Bataan during World War II. "I'll use it to pay my income tax," says Wainwright.

Sports: The Brooklyn Dodgers win 12 of 15 games to pull within two games of Philadelphia's "Whiz Kids". The teams meet for the last two games of the season at Ebbets Field. The Dodgers win the first game 7-3, but in the final game, Dick Sisler breaks a 1-1 tie with a homer in the ninth to clinch the National League pennant for Philadelphia...In the lowest-scoring World Series ever, the Phillies are swept in four straight games by the New York Yankees.

Movies: *Panic in the Streets* remains popular through the fall. The movie is a realistic thriller about a manhunt for a criminal who's an unwitting plague carrier. The movie features Richard Widmark and Paul Douglas...a new technicolor musical, *Tea for Two*, stars Doris Day, Billy De Wolfe and Gordon MacRae.

Radio: Radio's four major networks have a new rival in the Liberty Broadcasting System. In 3 years, the network has grown from one station in Texas to 240 stations nationwide by concentrating on one specialty: bringing major league baseball to people beyond the reach of big-city stations. The games are re-created via Teletype reports by announcer Gordon McLendon, 29, who, despite his age, refers to himself on the air as "the old Scotchman".

Music: With movie and nightclub offers rolling in, 22-year-old singer Eddie Fisher's career appears to be taking off. Fisher says that he credits his unsophisticated singing style to "Helping Dad hawk fruits and vegetables from a truck when I was a kid".

Humorous News Items: A man in Columbus, Ohio explains to a judge why he'd given a waitress a worthless \$10 check, saying, "I wanted to do something nice for her"...In Illinois, a traveling preacher runs an advertisement in the *Decatur Herald and Review*, describing how his crusade had "caught fire". The next night his tent burns down...A St. Louis man arrested for making phony \$10 bills explains to Secret Service agents the reason he turned to counterfeiting: "Good engraving just intrigues me."

A brief look at specific events in years gone by. This time we take you back 45 years to the winter of 1950.

Names in the News: President Truman tells members of his cabinet that he'd prefer they not make any plans to run for political office in 1952. It's reported that he wants to keep his team together because of his intention to run for the presidency again in 1952...When his car skids into a tree near Palm Springs, comedian Bob Hope dislocates his shoulder and has to cancel a million dollars' worth of personal appearances...With the century half over, humorist James Thurber is asked for his prediction on what the next 50 years will be like. His response: "Women, of course, will be stronger and more numerous, and there will not be many men around. The dog appears to be holding his own."

Sports: In his first appearance after nearly dying in a car accident last year, Ben Hogan does well in the \$15,000 Los Angeles Open. At the end of regulation play, he and Sam Snead are tied for the lead. Snead eventually wins the title after an 18-hole playoff...Racehorse "Citation" wins the Santa Anita Handicap, bringing his career earnings to \$867,750. Many expect the champion to soon become the first "million-dollar horse" ever.

Movies: Ads for *Whirlpool* caution moviegoers: "WARNING—If you are easily hypnotized, don't see it alone." The movie stars Jose Ferrer as an unscrupulous hypnotist who uses an innocent Gene Tierney to carry out his evil schemes.

Television: Producers of *Kukla, Fran & Ollie* report that Colonel Crackie, Ophelia Oglepuss, Beulah Witch, Fletcher Rabbit, Clara Goo Goo and other cast members of the popular puppet show are receiving 8,000 letters a week. Seen at 7 p.m. weeknights, the show has ratings said to approach those of TV's most widely watched hour, *The Milton Berle Show*.

Music: Upon learning that advance ticket sales for his *South Pacific* have topped the \$700,000 mark, a humble Oscar Hammerstein remarks, "It's just something people want to see. The show couldn't possibly be that good."
