Yearbook Update

BOONE — What happens to NASA scientists and mathematicians when they retire?

Some of them become teachers, which is where Joan Judge Mirabal comes into the picture. The former Boone woman is presently teaching a number of NASA personnel, preparing them for teaching careers. She's also an independent science consultant, a wife, mother and noted educator.

Joan Judge, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.T Judge of Route 2, Boone, was graduated from Sacred Heart High School in 1955 and became a religious nun in the community of the Sisters of Charity of Dubuque.

"During the 13 years I was a member of the congregation, I received religious and scholastic training in Dubuque and Chicago—at Clarke and Mundelein colleges, where I received my B.A. in 1960," she said.

"My teaching assignment was St. John's Elementary School in Seattle, Wash., teaching 67 sixth-grade students. That many students would be difficult to teach today, but at that time all were on grade level or above, none were from broken homes, and everyone did what I asked. Teaching is not the same today," she said.

She continued her teaching

She continued her teaching career at St. Jude's School in Cedar Rapids and at Sacred Heart School in Davenport, where class sizes were in the mid-30s and "much more normal," she said.

In 1969, she was awarded her M.A. degree from Clarke College. She called the program there "extraordinary for in-depth study, which paved the way for later study."

After leaving the religious community, she worked in a special science education teacher training program at the University of Texas, Austin, where she received her Ph.D. in education in 1974. She then had what she termed "an outstanding learning experience" teaching in the education department at Luther College in Decorah from 1969 to 1971 and again from 1974 to 1976."

In 1976, she married Alfonso Mirabal and returned to Austin, where she worked in the public schools. "We moved to Dallas in 1978, and I taught Title I reading programs. In 1980, we adopted a daughter, Maria, and I left teaching for four years," Mirabal said.

When her husband was transferred to Washington, D.C., she began a new career with a textbook company. "I presented science workshops in all of the northeastern states," she said.

"My many experiences in education in so many states on various levels and in different types of schools has given me an insight into the problems that schools face today. It also makes me grateful to have been educated in Iowa, where an excellent educational system exists," she added.

Her list of honors is lengthy. She received National Science Founda-

tion Summer Science Programs for Teachers scholarships in 1966, 1971 and 1975. She was chairman of elementary science teachers for Catholic schools in Davenport and participated on a faculty team from 12 colleges to develop inner city study in Chicago. She served on the governing board at Luther College and developed field-centered college courses for teachers.

She is the co-author of a paper on the status of Mexican-American mental health, which she prepared for President Carter in 1977. She has written reading manuals, published numerous articles and edited a newsletter in her continuing involvement with education.

Her current position, assistant professor of education at George Washington University in Washington, D.C., brings her into the lives of the NASA scientists and mathematicians. She is also an associate professor at Towson State University in Maryland.
