Msgr. J. J. Ryan To Retire Soon Here

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John J. Ryan, who has served as pastor of the Church of the Sacred Heart parish here for the past 3 years, will retire February 12, as announced this week by the Most Rev. Joseph M. Mueller, DD, Bishop of the Sioux City diocese. His successor as pastor of Sacred Heart is the Very Rev. Msgr. J. Lawrence Bauer, who has been superintendent of Heelan High School, Sioux City.

A native of Lewiston, Maine, Monsignor Ryan attended elementary schools of Lewiston and received his college education in New York State, He attended the seminary at La-Val University, Quebec, Canada, and was ordained to the Holy Priesthood in 1908 at Watertown, New York by the Most Rev. Henry Gabriels, DD. Bishop of Ogdensburg. Following his ordination, he attended the Catholic University in Washington, D.C. for one year, after which he came to the Sioux City diocese and has remained in the diocese more than 50 vears.

Monsignor Ryan was appointed pastor of the Church of the Sacred Heart on June 3, 1931, succeeding the late Father Edward Masterson when he was appointed to Corpus Christi church in Fort Dodge. Father Ryan has continued as pastor since that date.

In 1933, Monsignor Ryan celebrated the silver jubilee of his ordination to the Priesthood and a parish celebration was held in his honor. In May, 1958, he observed his golden jubilee, at which time another parish celebration was held, with many in the community joining in the observance. At that time, announcement was made that he had been named a domestic prelate with the title of Right Rev. Monsignor, by the late Pope Pius XII.



Since coming to Boone, Monsignor Ryan has guided the steady growth and progress of Sacred Heart and St. Mary's parish. In the past 33 years there have been many major improvements and repairs of the church physical properties. The church has been twice redecorated, retaining the many original piantings which were painted by a Spanish artist during the pastorate of the late Monsignor B. C. Lenehan.

In 1951 the new Sacred Heart parochial school, consisting of elementary grades and high school was completed. Next major project was the completion of a modern and comfortable new convent for the Sisters of Charity, B.V.M., instructors at Sacred Heart. Enrollment has expanded in recent years to the extent where new classrooms and an auditorium are on the building agenda for the near future. A three-year fundraising campaign was recently completed as a foundation for this expected \$275,000 project.

In 1950, Monsignor Ryan was one of the priests from the diocese who made the Holy Year

Pilgrimage to Rome and other shrines of the Old World. The trip was made possible for him as a gift from the congregation and friends of the parish.

Before coming to Boone, Monsignor Ryan served as an assistant pastor at the Cathedral of the Epiphany at Sioux City, and served as pastor of St. John's Church at Onawa, Sacred Heart Church at Early, St. Michael's Church in Sioux City and St. Joseph's Church at Salix, where a beautiful new church was built during his pastorate.

Upon his retirement, Monsignor Ryan plans to leave Boone for a vacation in Florida, after which he will return to Boone, and his plans for the future are indefinite, although he will remain in the Sioux City diocese.

A farewell recognition party is being planned for Monsignor Ryan, to be held Sunday evening, February 9th, at 8 o'clock at the Boone Golf and Country Club. The public is invited. Further details will be announced next week.

Monsignor Ryan Dies Sudden At Sioux City

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John J. Ryan, 79, who retired as pastor of the Church of the Sacred Heart Feb. 12, 1964 after serving as pastor since June 3rd, 1931, died suddenly, this Monday morning, Nov. 2, of an apparent heart attack. Death came about 6:30, while Monsignor Ryan was distributing communion at All Souls Day mass he was celebrating at St. Monica's Home in Sioux City, where he had been serving as chaplain since his retirement from Sacred Heart.

Students of Sacred Heart school will attend the mass, which will be sung by the school choir. The public is
