Boone football reunion

The Boone High School Treadors had a football scrimmage in 1968 — 25 years ago — that had head coach Merle Harris and his assistant, Lyn Dighton, wondering about the season.

"Defensively? Well, it wasn't too bad. I'll guarantee you, they'll be in for a rude awakening when they go against Ames. The offense was very poor tonight," Harris told *Boone News-Republican* former sports editor Mo Kelley about the scrimmage.

Things did get better for the Treadors. Much better. The 1968 squad became the last Boone football team to go through a season undefeated.

The team set a new scoring average record of 34.1 points per game, breaking the mark of the 1920 Boone football team that averaged better than 33 points per contest.

Members of the squad are coming back for a 25-year reunion to see the 1993 undefeated Treadors play in the annual homecoming game Friday at Goepfinger Field. After the game,

the former players will gather to watch some films of that undefeated season of 1968.

The probable offensive lineup for Boone in that first game of 1968 against Ames was Chuck Jipp, senior, 186-pound left end; Steve Paris, senior, 209-pound left tackle; Ray Greco, senior, 160-pound senior left guard; Gary Sutton, senior, 174-pound center; Brad Clark, senior, 173-pound right guard; Jim Niemants, senior, 192-pound right tackle; Scott Lilly, junior, 157-pound right end; Roger Martin, senior, 176-pound quarterback or Jay Nelson, junior, 174-pound quarterback; Mike Manriquez, senior, 144-pound senior left halfback; Ed Frazier, junior, 153-pound junior right halfback and Paul McIntyre, junior, 163 pound fullback.

The remainder of the squad contributing to Boone's success included Tom Wilhite, Tom Myers, Jerry Hanson, Kim Rinehart, Dave Germer, Mike Goldensohn, Jerry Rusnak, Pat Olofson, Tom Dawdy, John Erbe, Randy Hora, Dan Hall, Monte Anderson, Mike Byriel, Jack Royer, Stan Sutton, Don Myers, Guy

Huddleston, Mitchell Schultz, Tom Hohanshelt and managers Alan Rasmus, Steve Fontanini and Tom Morgan.

Joining Harris in the coaching ranks were sophomore coaches Ralph Carroll and Hal Lyness.

Ames and Boone tied in the season opener, 32-32. Boone had a 12-point lead with about 10 minutes left in the game. However, Ames rallied for two touchdowns that tied the score. Martin blocked the extra point kick tried by Ames with 3:51 left in the game to preserve the tie.

Ames head coach Phil Johnson said he didn't know of anyone else that could beat Boone and felt fortunate to gain the tie. "That Steve Paris is really great and we were very impressed with Boone's line. They outcharged us and we saw lots of mistakes in our line play," Johnson said.

Rich Dickeson, a 148-pound senior right guard and Ron Neely, 150-pound senior right halfback, were inserted in the starting lineup for the next game against South Tama, which Boone won by a 25-0

score.

It was Boone's first win in the new Central Iowa Conference that featured the schools of Urbandale, Grinnell, Southeast Polk, Saydel, Ankeny and South Tama.

Against South Tama, Boone's first score came on a 68-yard bomb from Martin to Jipp. McIntyre finished with 97 yards on 29 carries. In the game, Don Wilhite of Boone suffered a broken leg.

The next week, Boone hosted Southeast Polk and jolted the Rams by a 46-20 score. The Treadors posted a 20-0 halftime lead. After three quarters, it was 33-0. McIntyre rushed for 190 yards and Frazier had 74 yards. Boone limited Southeast Polk to 35 yards of total offense in the first half.

"I think teams will score on Boone, but I don't think anyone can stop Boone's offense," said Rams coach Frank Gilson.

Boone played Urbandale next on the schedule. Urbandale had a 2-game winning streak going for it. The Treadors pulverized Urbandale with a punishing ground attack that

netted 369 total yards for a 34-6 Boone victory.

Boone hosted Saydel for Homecoming 1968. Queen candidates included Corrine Veeder, Barbara Parks, Peggy Johnson, Lynn Moorman (picked as Homecoming Queen) and Sue Albright.

The Treadors made the homecoming a happy one with a 29-12 triumph over Saydel. Ray Greco played an outstanding defensive game as he pulled in a Saydel fumble that set up Boone's first touchdown of the game. Paris and Hohanshelt were also conspicuous on defense and McIntyre gained 143 yards on 26 carries. Neely had 109 yards on 19 carries. Martin hooked up with Manriquez for a 19-yard touchdown pass.

In that same year the Treadors went undefeated, the following were punt, pass and kick winners — Russell Meadows, Alan Knudsen, Donald Meadows, Scott Stowell, Scott Mallicoat, Richard Sebring, Larry Appenzeller, Brad Larson, Louis Greco, Mark Moorman, Mike Hill, Greg Tucker, Dan Walter and

Paul Stone.

Boone expected its toughest game of the season against Fort Dodge St. Edmond, which shut out three of four clubs in the early going of 1968.

Boone won the non-conference game, scoring 20 points in the first 10 minutes of play, on its way to a 27-13 decision.

Martin was 7 of 11 in passing for 106 yards — with Jipp on the receiving end of three passes for 60 yards and a score.

If the Treadors won or tied their final two games, they would be the fifth Boone High School team in 72 years of competition to finish without a loss. The 8-0 club of 1964 (with the speed of Marty Rinehart, Ted Hora, Mike Harris, Don Riker) was the last club to do it.

Boone came one victory closer to the undefeated season with a 40-31 victory at Ankeny. McIntyre rushed for 230 yards on 32 carries. Interceptions were by Manriquez, Martin and Frazier. The win upped Boone's record to 6-0-1 and assured the Treadors a share of the Central Iowa Conference title.

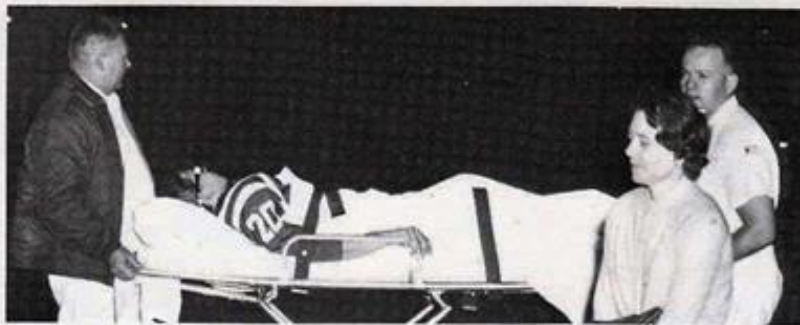

The Toreadors played a near perfect 1968 football campaign and ended with two 10th place rankings and a 12th place ranking in the three football polls. The only mar in the eight game schedule was a 32-32 tie with Ames. The Toreadors captured an outright CIC crown which is only the fourth in BHS history. In addition, the Toreador's total for the eight game card was 273 points, or an average of 34.1 points per contest . . . the best season long scoring average in Toreador history. Six seniors and one junior earned positions on the CIC team. Jim Niemants, Ray Greco, Gery Sutton and Paul McIntyre were awarded positions on the offensive unit, while Steve Paris, Chuck Jipp and Roger Martin were on the defensive unit. Special recognition goes to Steve Paris and Paul McIntyre who received All-State honors. Paris earned a second team rating on one poll and a third team rating on another. McIntyre earned fifth and seventh team ratings. Ray Greco and Gery Sutton made the All-State Honor Roll.

Congratulations to Coaches Harris and Dighton and their Toreadors for a great season.

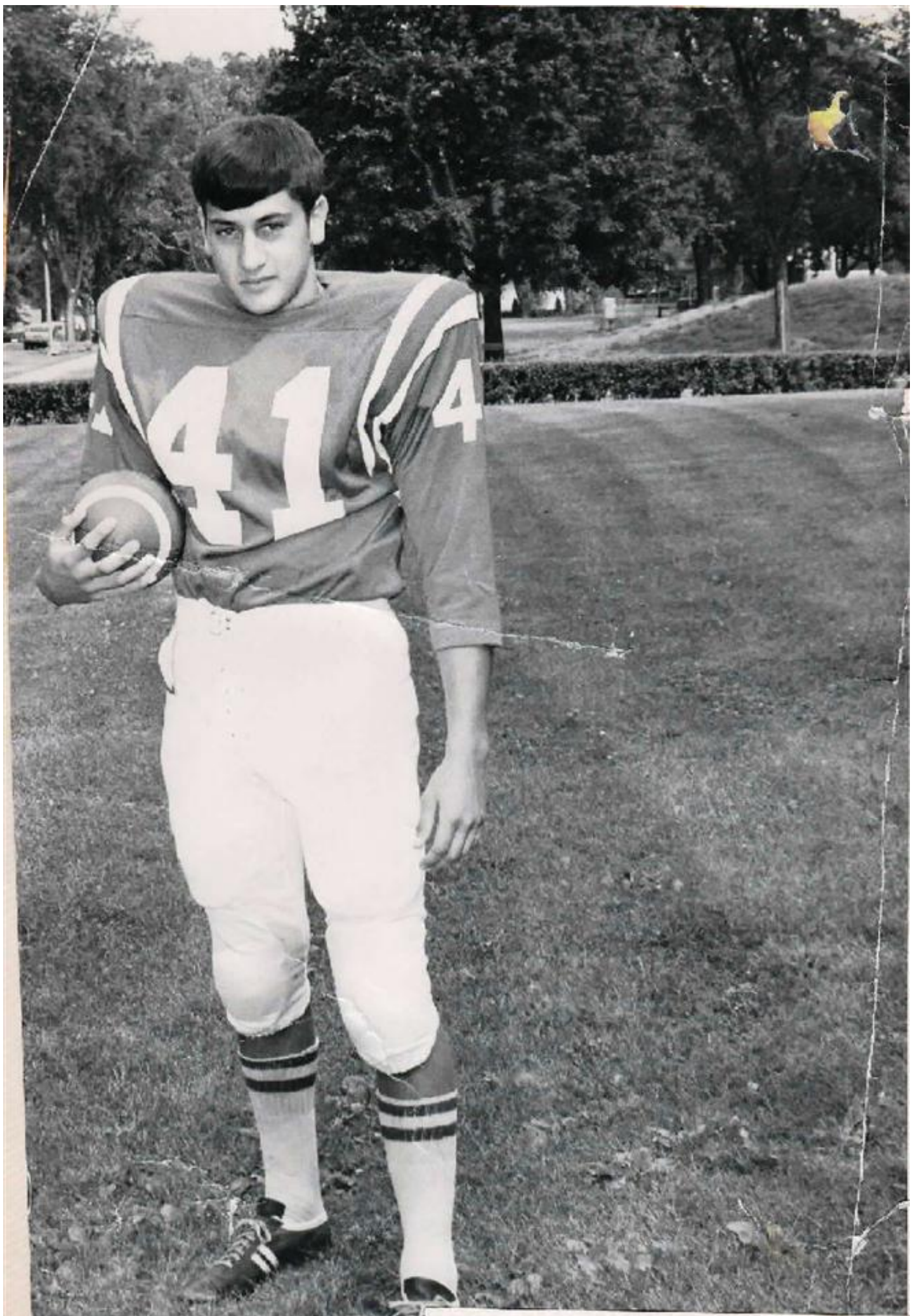

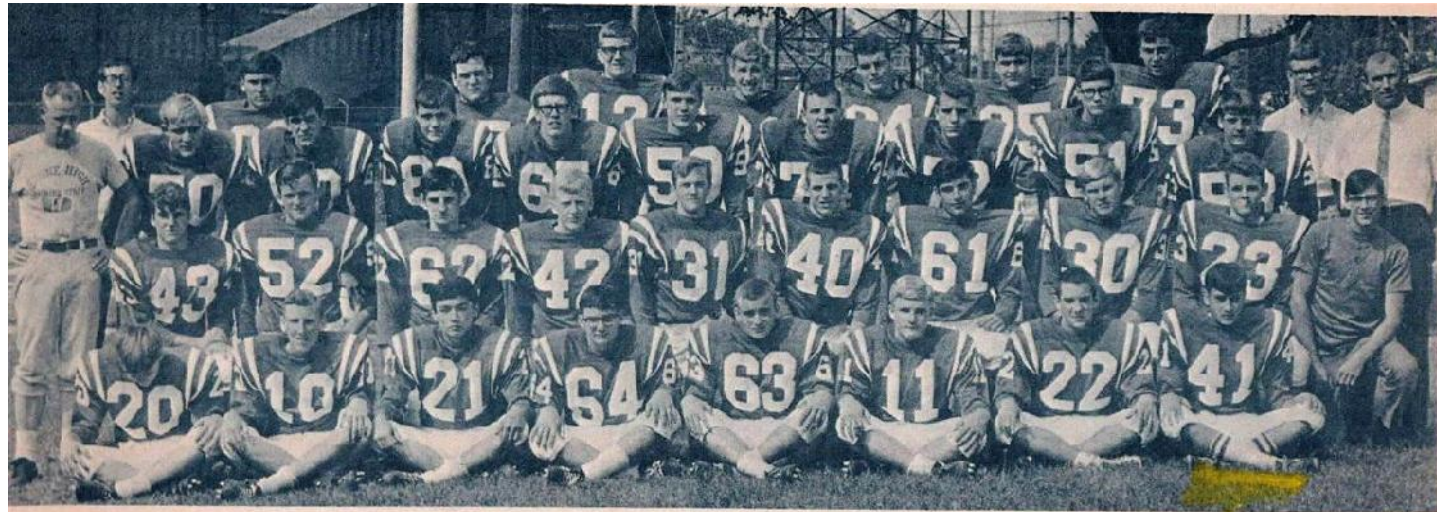

BHS Offense Unimpressive

The Toreadors held a night scrimmage at Goepfinger Field Friday and the results didn't encourage coaches Merle Harris and Lyn Dighton too much.

"Defensively? Well it wasn't too bad but in our practice sessions, our top unit just doesn't get much competition. I'll guarantee you, they'll be in for a rude awakening when they go against Ames. The offense was very poor tonight. Believe it or not, we apparently still have some boys that don't know their signals," Harris stated.

Some injuries have hurt the Toreadors early work. Ron Neely, a regular back a year ago, missed the early conditioning phase of the Toreador workouts because of a kidney infection. Neely was dressed Friday but played very little. He supposedly will be set to go full-steam ahead Monday but as Harris said, "It may take him quite some time to get ready. He missed all those important conditioning workouts and now the squad begins tapering off. Once the season starts, we just don't work too much on conditioning . . . that's already taken care of."

Gery Sutton, a letterman lineman, is also on the injured list. He has a knee problem and when he will be able to return is a questionmark. His loss has forced Harris to make some

position changes. Jay Nelson, a junior, has moved to Sutton's center position and Pat Olofson, another letterman, will also spend more time at that spot.

Tom Dawdy, a senior, has a broken nose and will miss at least half the campaign. "He was pretty enthusiastic and would have played some but he too has missed all this conditioning now and by the time he gets back it will be late in

the season," Harris stated.

ANOTHER boy that has changed positions at least part-time is Rich Dickeson. A senior, Dickeson formerly has been a back but lately has been playing some at guard . . . a position that Harris says is his most questionable.

In closing, the Boone mentor commented, "We've got several boys with good potential if they would be more consist-

ent. Some of them look great one day and completely bad the next. Needless to say, we've got lots of work ahead of us next week."

There are now 34 boys on the squad. The weight list confirms the fact that this will be the biggest Toreador team in quite some time.

Mitch Schultz, a nose guard on the defensive unit, is the heaviest member of the squad at 225 pounds. Steve Paris, an all-conference lineman, weighs 209.

In the 190-200 category are Jim Niemants and Jack Royer while Chuck Jipp, Dan Hall and Guy Huddleston all weigh between 180 and 190.

The Toreadors open their season at Ames Friday night.

It's Been a Long, Long Time - - -

Boone Hasn't Won Game With Ames Since Way Back in '33

Boone high school's Toreadors will attempt to quench their thirst on one of the longest dry spells in the annals of Iowa high school football here Friday night when the Little Cyclones of Ames wander onto Goeppinger field.

The hapless Toreadors haven't out and out won a game with the football team 15 miles down the road since 1933. Boone won that one 7-6.

And the statistics aren't a whole lot better before that time. From 1906 to 1933 Boone won only five out of 23 games.

ACCORDING TO THE best possible sources the series started back in 1906 when Ames blanked Boone 15-0. There were no games played in 1907, 1912 and 1917. The 1918 game was apparently cancelled because of a flu epidemic.

Of the 52 games between the two schools, Ames has held

Boone scoreless 24 of those times. Boone has held Ames without a point five times. Between 1943 and 1947 Boone never found out what the Ames end-zone looked like. During the draught of 1954 to 1957 Ames racked up a total of 123 points to none for Boone.

BUT BOONE'S FORTUNES are not all bad. The 1920 Toreadors have the distinction of holding the largest victory margin in the series that spans more than half a century. Boone thumped Ames 54-0 in that year.

However, it can't be said that Ames hasn't gotten in its fair share of licks. The Little Cyclones beat Boone 52-0 in 1937 and enjoyed a 51 point margin with 1958's 63-12 drubbing.

Perhaps the closest Boone has come since the most recent dry spell set in was last year when Ames eked out a close 9-7 verdict. With the exception of a

couple ties since '33, about the only other time Boone has come close was 1940 when Ames squeezed by 7-6.

Of the 52 games played in the series, four have ended in ties.

Boone scored on a short plunge by Roger Martin with 12-seconds left and a running attempt for the point failed. The score was tied at 6-6.

Second Quarter

Boone scored on a 37-yard pass from Martin to Ron Neely with 11:22 left. The running attempt for the point failed and Boone led 12-6.

Third Quarter

Boone scored on a 20-yard end sweep by Ed Frazier with 10:19 left. A running attempt for the point failed and Boone led, 18-6.

Ames scored on a 59-yard run by Healy with 5:50 left. Dan Craig kicked the extra point and Boone led 18-13.

Boone scored on a 62-yard pass from Martin to Mike Manriquez. Frazier ran for the point and with 5:01 left, Boone led, 25-13.

Ames scored with 2:15 left on a 39-yard pass lateral play from Craig to Conrad Anderson to Don Page. Craig kicked the point and it was Boone 25-20.

Fourth Quarter

Boone scored with 9:55 left on a 15-yard pass from Martin to Neely. Paul McIntyre ran for the point and Boone led, 32-20.

Ames scored with 9:15 left on a 35-yard pass-lateral play from Craig to Anderson to Page. The extra point kick attempt failed and Boone led, 32-26.

Ames scored on a 6-yard pass from Craig to Anderson with 3:51 left. The extra point kick attempt was blocked and it was a 32-32 tie.

AMES . . . It has to rate as one of the wackiest, wildest games in the long 64-year history of Ames-Boone gridiron conflict . . . this 32-32 opener here Friday night.

In one previous meeting, more points were scored but that was in a one-sided affair . . . the Little Cyclones 65-12 win in 1958. Not only did the 1968 contest feature the second highest number of points scored by the teams, it also was the third best offensive performance in history for the Toreadors in competition with A.H.S. In 1920 Boone High scored 54-points in a 54-0 win and in 1964, it was 40-7 in favor of the red and green.

There were just 3-fumbles in the debut contest and Ames lost all 3. For a time, it seemed that would be the big difference but the Little Cyclones, down but not out most of the way, rebounded behind Denny Healy's superb running and Dan Craig's fine passing to remain in contention.

At the end, it was a standoff . . . Boone's ball control and Ames passing attack. Ames finished 10-yards ahead totally but had to gain 271 of their 368 yards in the air over the touted Boone defensive line which did its job effectively against the Ames ground game.

For the remainder of the half, fumbleitis moved to the fore. Paul McIntyre grabbed the first Ames fumble at the Little Cyclone 44 and 15-plays later, Martin cracked over from a yard away to tie the count at 6-6.

On the ensuing kickoff, Healy fumbled and Jay Nelson captured that one for B.H.S. at the Ames 38. Ed Frazier bucked for 2-yards and then Martin, who was actually better than his 5 for 10 record shows, lofted a perfect pass to Ron Neely and Neely carried it in to give the Toreadors a 12-6 margin. That T.D. play was a 37-yarder.

THE THIRD costly Ames fumble was a bit different in that it missed a Little Cyclone

27-yards and a 15-yard penalty against the Toreadors were the key plays as Ames marched to a potential tying touchdown.

At the Boone 13, Craig fired a pass to Mulhall. The speedy Ames back grabbed it at the 5 but was hit hard and fumbled at the 4-yard line. Rich Dickerson pounced on it for Boone and 6-plays later the half ended with Boone still in command at 12-6.

Things looked great when the Toreadors took the second half kickoff and moved 74-yards in 5-plays to build the lead to 18-6.

A pass from Martin to Mike Manriquez worth 47-yards was a big play and then Frazier got wide for a 20-yard T.D. sprint later.

Healy got 59 of his 92-yards rushing in one big swoop a bit later in the period. He got the step he needed and none of the Toreadors had to speed to overtake him. That made it 18-12 and Craig then kicked the point and it was 18-13.

Quickly the Toreadors struck

 AMES, IA. — Conrad Anderson caught a seven-yard pass from Danny Craig late in the fourth quarter to give Ames a 32-32 tie with Boone Friday night. Craig missed the extra point. Craig hit Anderson who pitched out to Don Page twice on plays that covered 45 and 38 yards. Neely scored on a pass from Roger Martin for 34 yards for Boone. Martin hit Mike Manriquez for 63 yards and a touchdown.

The next touchdown play had to be one of the biggest of the night. Faced with a 12-point deficit late in the third period and with a 3-down, 19-yard to go situation staring at them, the Little Cyclones came up with a 'picture play'.

CRAIG, who was successful on 17 of 27-attempts, hit Conrad Anderson over the middle and as the Toreadors converged on him, he pitched a lateral to Page who went the rest of the way. The play covered 39 yards and when Craig kicked the point it was a 25-20 game.

Even after that things looked fairly bright for the Toreadors. They took the next kickoff and marched 76-yards to paydirt. A pass from Martin to Neely covered the final 15-yards and McIntyre's run for the point made it 32-20 with just 9:55 left.

Twice that scoring drive was kept moving in third down situations by the Neely-Guy Huddleston combination . . . Neely blocking and Huddleston running wide.

Against most clubs a 12-point lead with 9:55 left might seem safe but not against a team with Ames' explosiveness. Two plays after Neely's touchdown, Ames was right back in the ballgame and again it was the Craig to Anderson to Page pass-lateral trio that did the damage. This one covered 35-yard and with 9:15 left, it was 32-26.

A bit later Boone was forced to punt and Ames started its march to the tying points at

the Toreador 48-yard Craig's run to daylight was a key play in the move. It was fourth down and 5 at the Toreador 44. Craig went back to throw but saw heavy traffic coming. Somehow he eluded a host of charging tacklers and turned a possible loss into a very profitable 7-yard gain.

Five plays later, Anderson took a 6-yard pass for the tying touchdown. The all-important extra point kick attempt was blocked by Martin and with 3:51 left the scoring action was finally over. Boone had the ball twice and Ames once during those final moments and neither club could do much with it.

Frazier rushed 61 yards in 16-carries and McIntyre had 63 yards in 23 tries for B.H.S. Healy of Ames gained his 92 yards rushing in just 9-plays.

South Tama will be here next Friday to open the Toreadors home and Central Iowa Conference season.

MERLE HARRIS (His Boone club played a 32-32 tie with Ames): "Well naturally we wished our pass defense was better but they actually were doing what they were supposed to do when Ames scored on the pass-lateral plays. We tell them to converge on the ball and our backs were doing that. We got caught that's all. It seemed our defensive line was always just a yard short of getting to their passer. Of course, you have to remember it was the same boys all night long rushing in there and I suppose eventually they might have tired somewhat. Generally speaking, I was satisfied with the game overall. When you analyze our personnel and their's, I think we played perhaps as well as we could. They were bigger and they had that great speed that we just don't have. No, we didn't pass anymore than expected. They used that 7-diamond defense with just 1-linebacker so there was no way possible for them to cover the flats. At the end though, they loosened up making it very, very difficult for us to throw. Then too, every incomplete pass stops the clock. They surely would have been able to get the ball again that way and there explosiveness had already been proven. We weren't about to give them the ball again. Earlier in the game they caught on that put return and that didn't make me too happy. The same thing hurt us last year and we had worked alot on preventing such a thing this fall. We still need more pressure on the passer but then Craig is probably one of the best passers around. We'll meet the same kind of team next week. South Tama is another good passing team and they thumped Grinnell, 41-18."

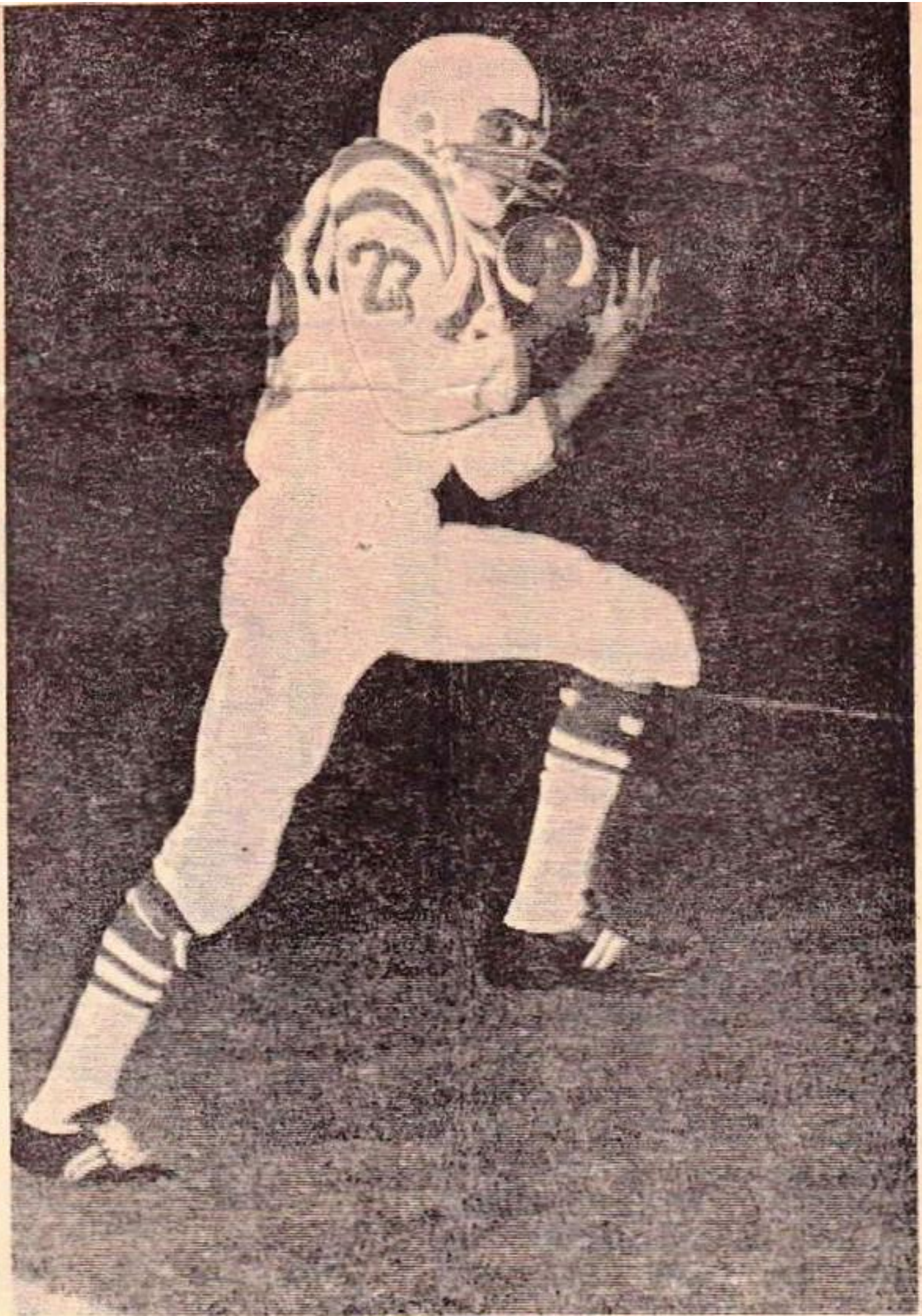
PHIL JOHNSON (His Ames club and the Toreadors played to a 32-32 tie) "It was a game of breaks and mistakes. It could have gone either way and naturally, we're not satisfied with the tie. We spent 6-hours watching the films today and as many errors as we committed, we were probably very fortunate to gain the tie. I really don't know of anyone else that can beat Boone. Yet we were dissatisfied with our defense. We figured Boone would have to pass some and then too, that's our weakest spot . . . the defensive backfield. Healy just suffered a severe cramp but he's alright. Say that Steve Paris is really great and we were very impressed by Boone's line. They outcharged us and we saw lots of mistakes in our line play."

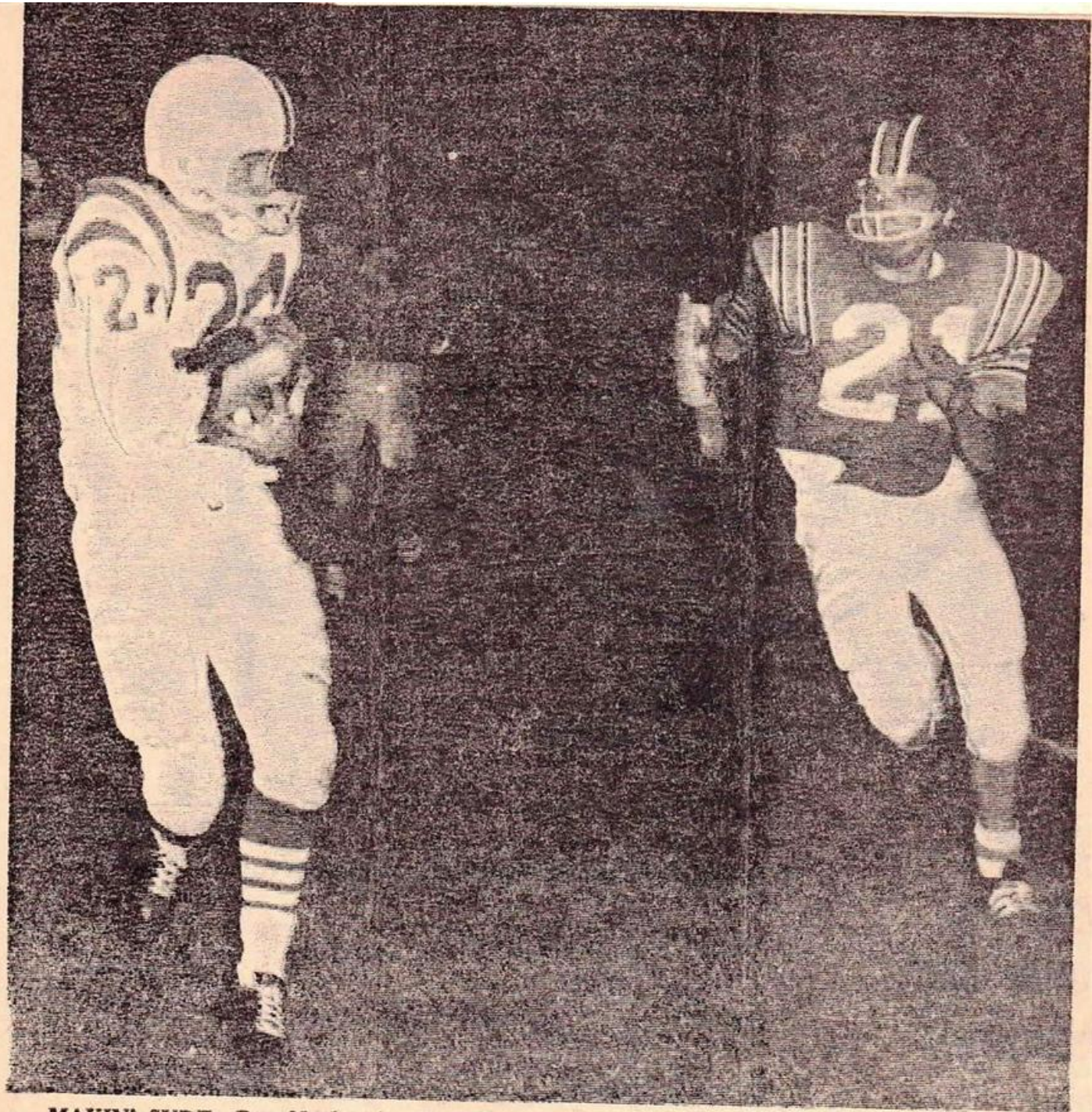

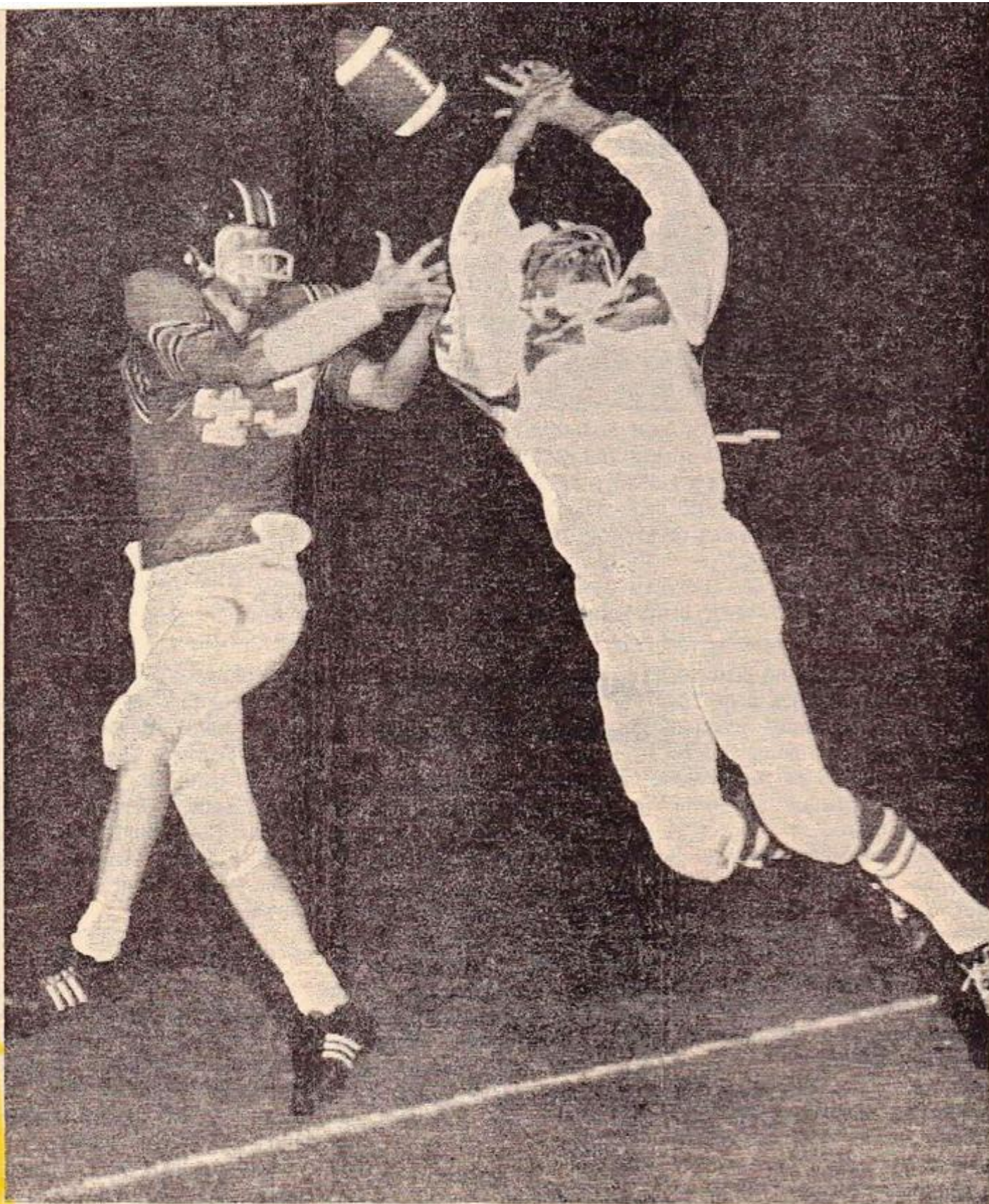


A HIGH STEPPER: Mike Manriquez played an excellent game for the Toreadors Friday night at Ames. Manriquez was



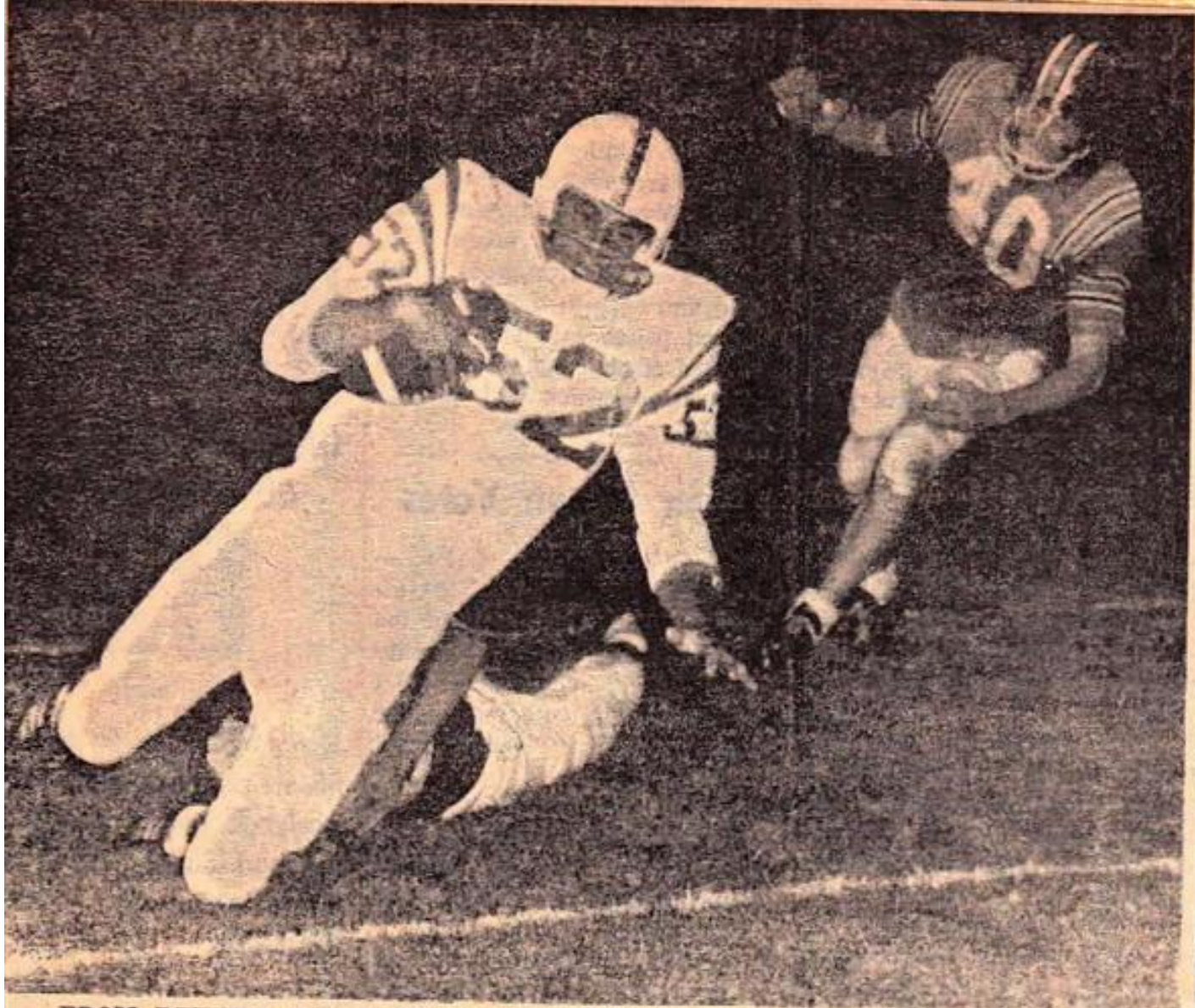

The Toreadors and South Tama, formerly Tama-Toledo, started their gridiron series in 1964.

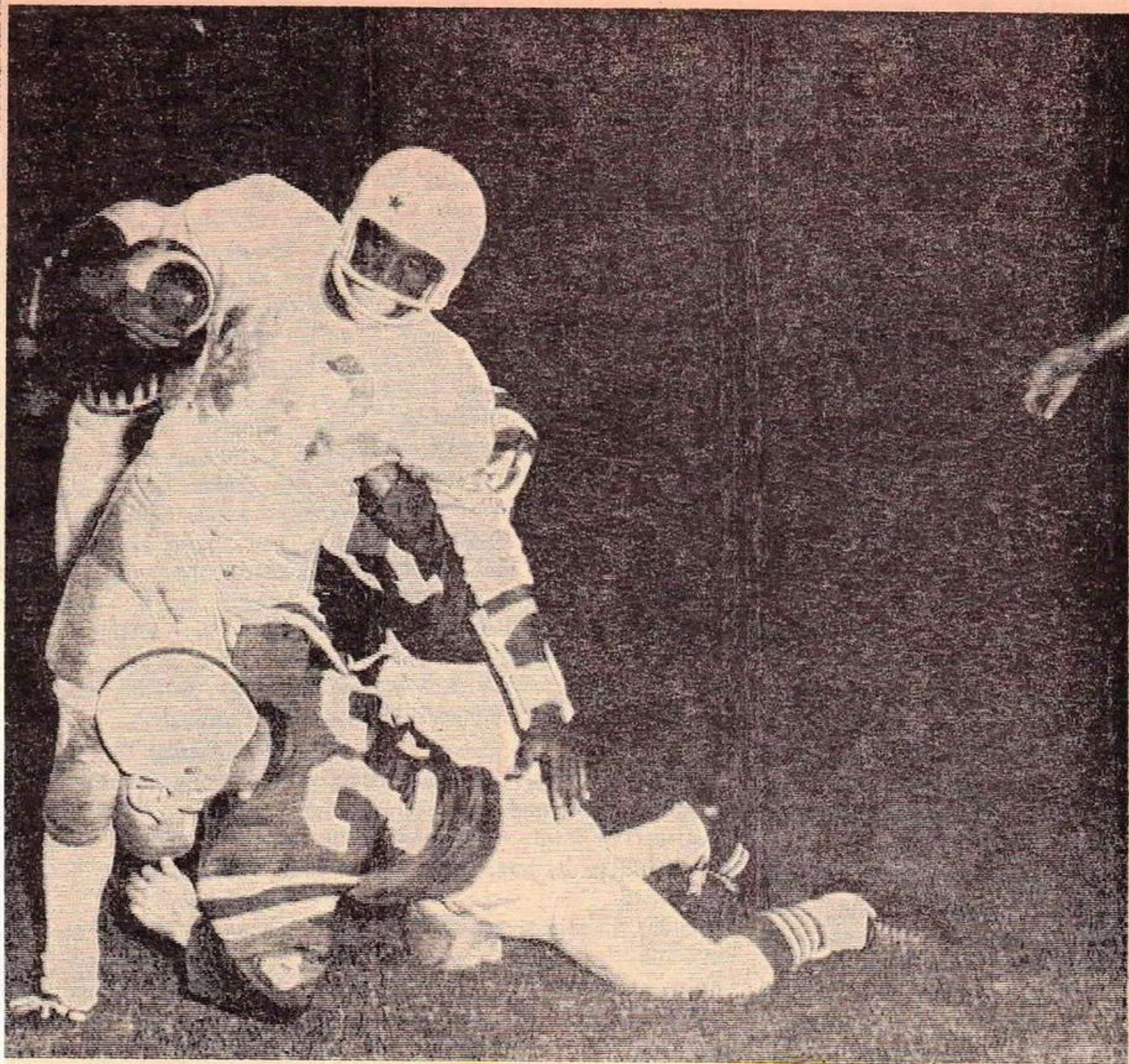

done a good job of installing his offense.

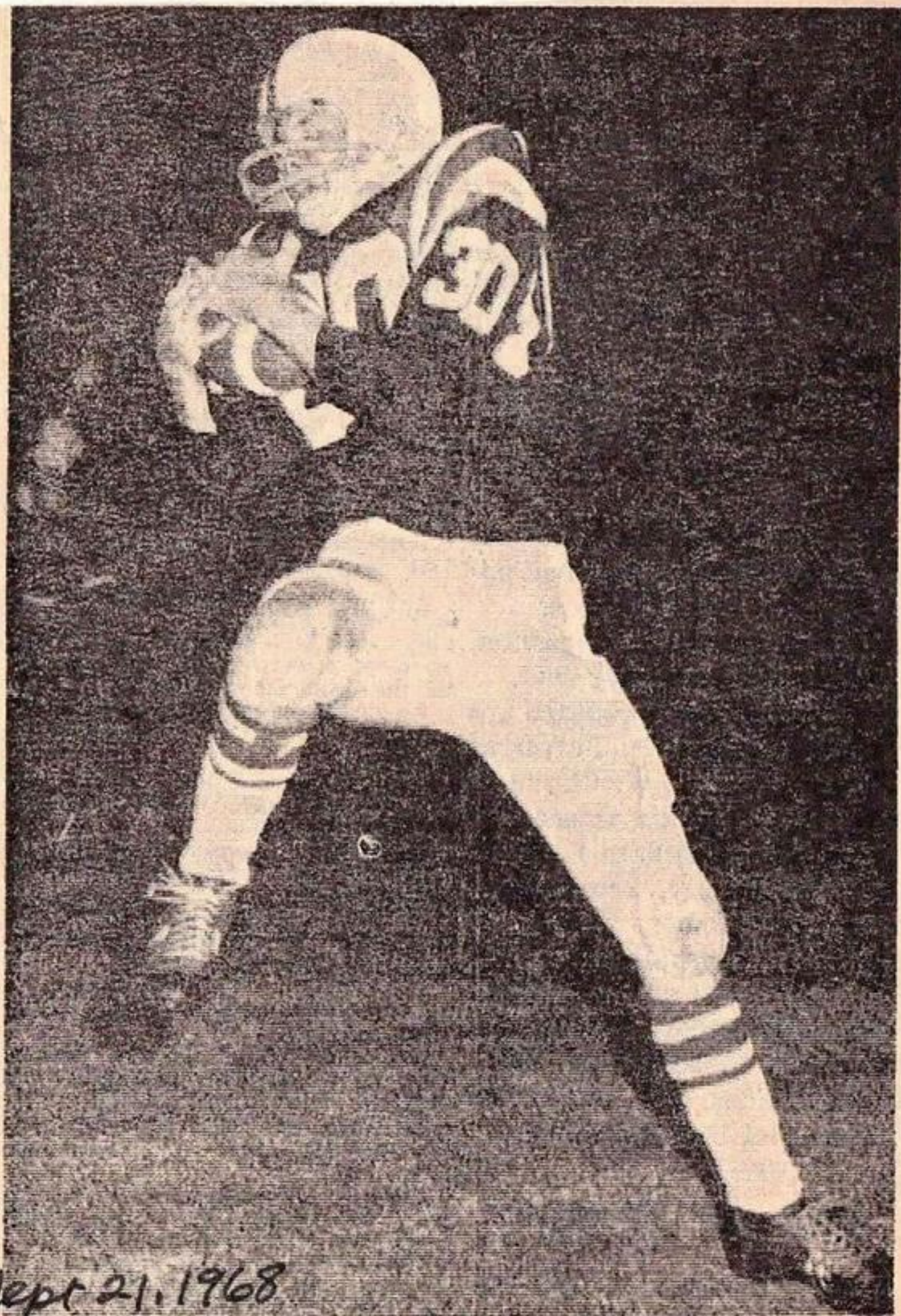

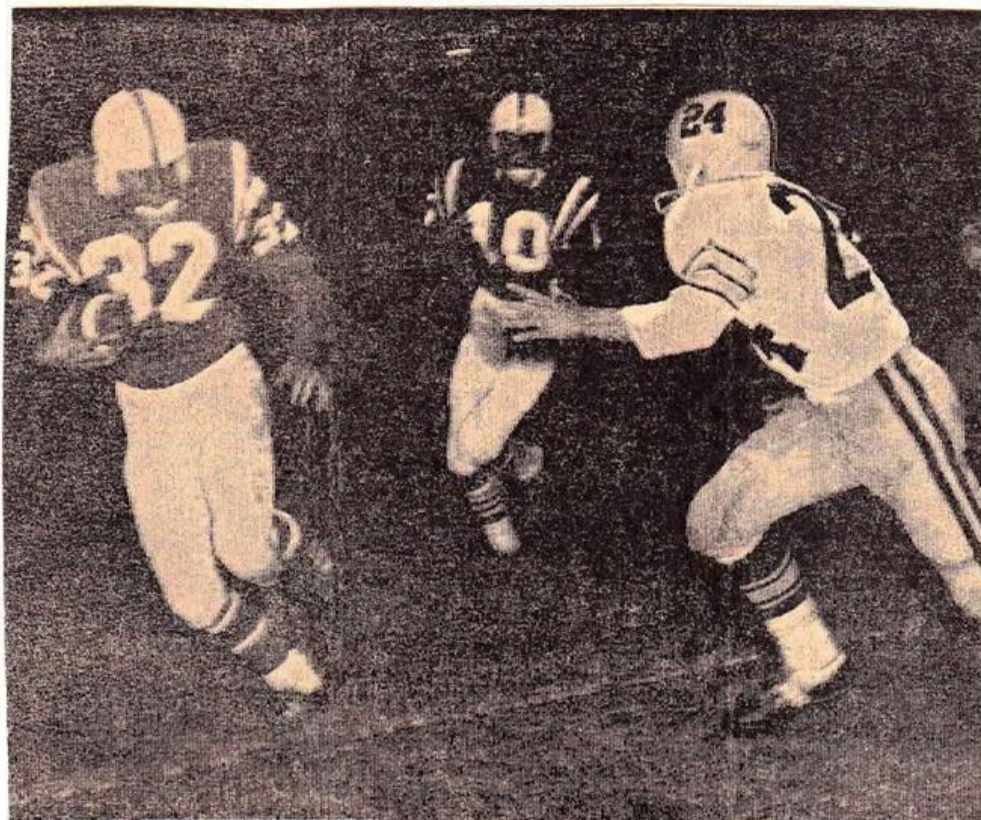

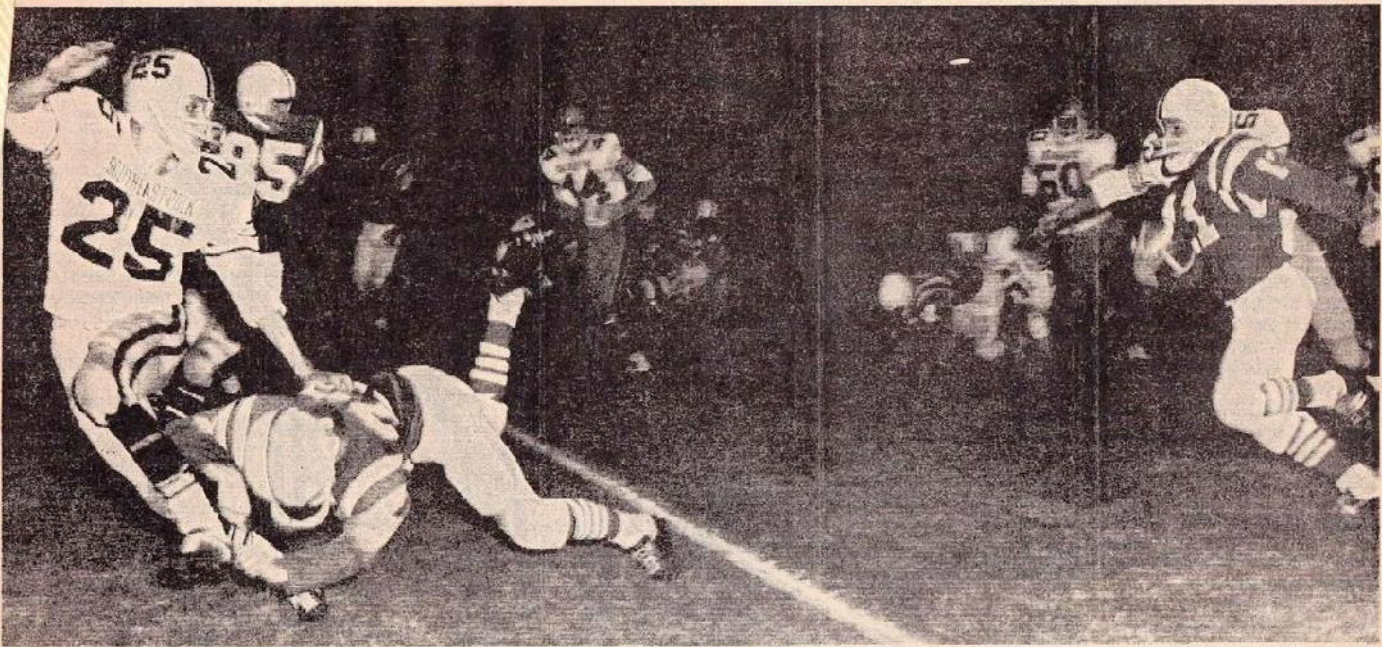

The Toreadors made Homecoming at B.H.S. a happy event with a 29-12 football triumph over Saydel at Goeppinger Field Friday night.

It's the Boone club's fourth straight win after a season-opening tie with highly-ranked Ames and the league triumph kept the Toreadors on top of the Central Iowa Conference standings.

The home team took a 22-0 halftime lead and weren't up to par after the intermission. The spunky Saydel crew, tougher than they were expected to be, showed off two or three fine individual performers and battled back for a pair of last half scores after being limited to just 1-first down and 21-yards rushing the first 24-minutes.

Ed Frazier, who doesn't carry the ball too often but is a productive carrier when he does, scored the first two Toreador touchdowns to pace B.H.S. to a 13-0 first period lead.

Ray Greco, who played an outstanding defensive game, captured a Saydel fumble at the Eagle 31 to set up the first score. The Eagles had just ended a Toreador drive after the opening kickoff. The bobble occurred on their first scrimmage play.

It took 6-plays for Boone to score. Frazier went the final 5-yards with 7:38 left in the period and the running attempt for the point failed.

A short time later, Saydel's attack was stalled and Boone took over after an Eagle punt at their own 33-yard line.

THE TOREADORS moved the

67-yards in 7-plays and Frazier went the final 31 on a wide sweep to make it 12-0 with 3:30 left. Ron Neely, who had a 34-yard scamper during the drive, ran for the point.

Bickford romped the final 19-yards 6-plays later. Another kick attempt failed and with 6:05 left, it was 29-12.

The Toreadors found some tough opposition in the middle of Saydel's line mainly from tackle Ron Holcomb. Jerry Lamb was an all-around standout doing a pretty good job of everything and Dean caught all 6-passes that Saydel completed.

For Boone, in addition to Greco, Steve Paris and Tom Hohanshelt were conspicuous on defense and offensively, McIntyre gained 143-yards on 26 carries, Neely moved 102-yards in 19-trips and Frazier 86-yards in

11-carries.

Penalties slowed the game considerably and most of the violations were charged against the Toreadors. They were assessed 104-yards on 13-infractions.

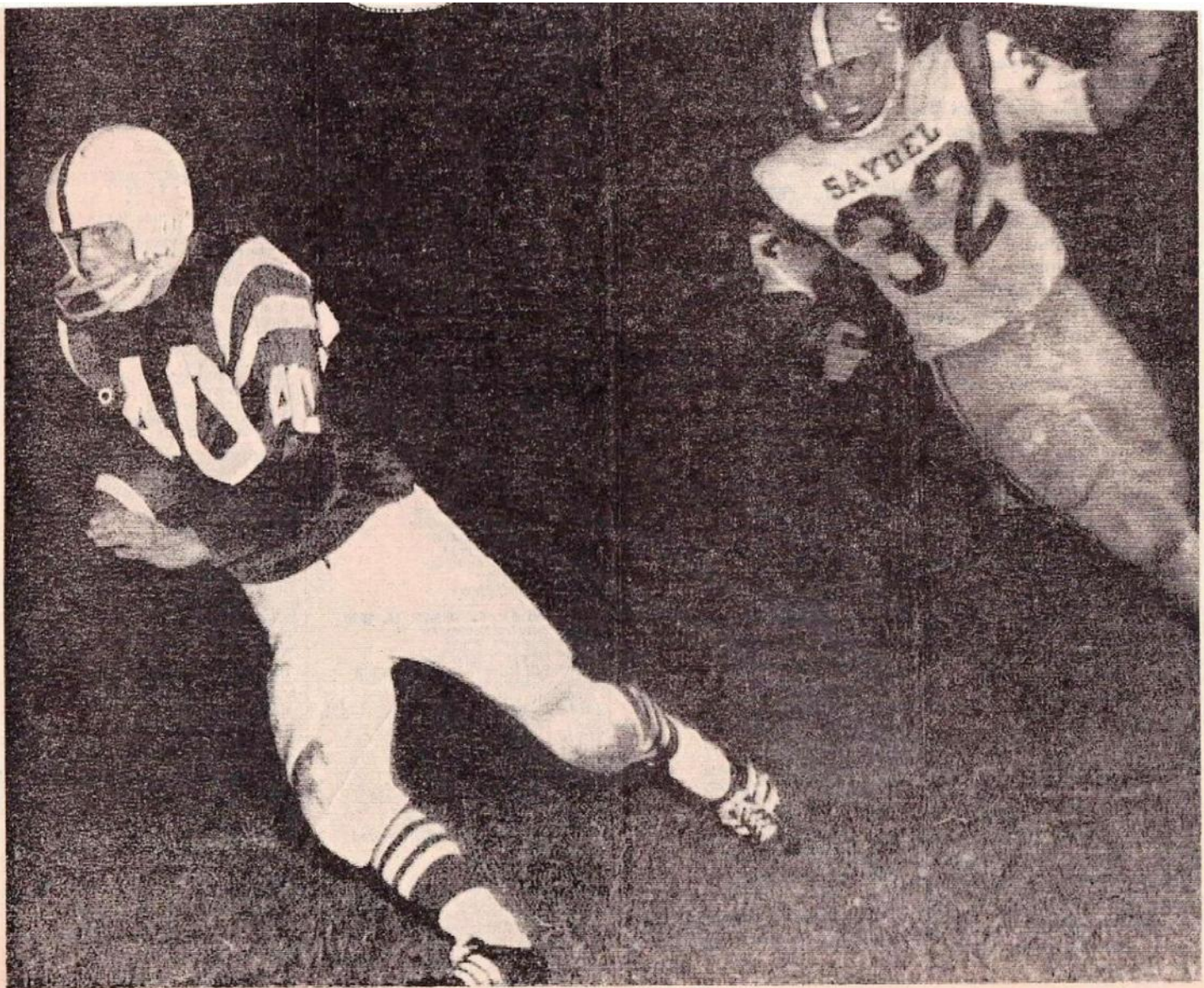

The Toreadors shocked defensive-minded Fort Dodge St. Edmonds with a 20-point salvo the first 10-minutes of play, then beat back a Gael bid for a 27-13 non-league triumph at Goepfinger Field Friday night.

The Gaels had shutout 3 of their 4-victims this season and had yielded just 21-points in 5-games for a touchdown allowance of less than 1-per game (4.2 points per game to be exact).

Later, the visitors proved that their defense was a rugged one but the damage had already been done and it was time for the Toreador defenders to show their wares.

The disappointed Gaels pulled themselves together after the early breakdown, scored twice on passes in the second period to get back in the contest, but then were gunned down by the Boone defense after the intermission.

Things looked to be true to form for St. Eds when they smothered the Toreadors first two offensive plays for losses of 2-yards and 1-yard. Ed Frazier tried to pull the locals from that deficit with a 7-yard scamper on third down but the Harris-men were forced to kick ending that first series.

Fort Dodge couldn't move either and their fourth down

boot sailed out to Ron Neely at the Gael 49-yard marker. Neely and Mike Manriquez executed a criss-cross on the return and Manriquez came away with the football behind a wall of blockers forming down the sideline.

Starting at their own 29 after a fine 38-yard kick by Martin, the Gaels moved 71-yards in just 5-plays for their first score.

A 42-yard pass from Tom Magennis to Dave Cosgrove, the losers first completion of the night, moved the ball quickly to the Boone 25.

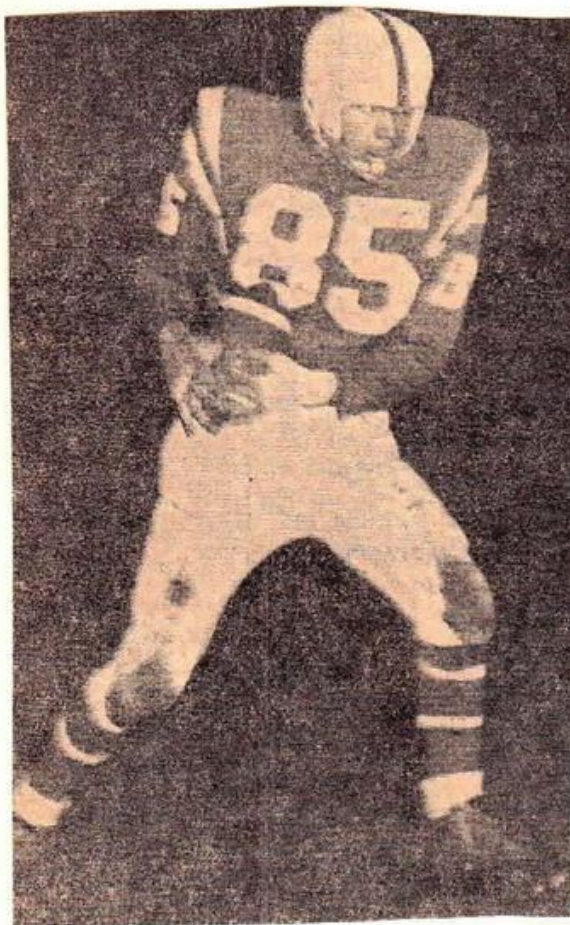
A pair of running plays netted just 2-yards total and then a pass fell incomplete and it appeared the drive may fizzle. Then, on fourth down, Magennis hit Joe Cahill with a 23-yard scoring pass and 237-pound lineman Gary Schmitz followed with an extra point kick to make it 20-7 with 9:05 left.

A good kickoff combined with a poor Boone reception pinned the Toreadors back at their own 4-yard line. A pair of running plays gained just a pair of yards, then Martin boomed a third down quick kick out to the B.H.S. 43.

On the next scrimmage play, Magennis hit Cosgrove with a 33-yard aerial to setup the second Gael score. Once again, it looked like Boone may hold but the St. Eds club came up with a big play.

With a third and goal situation at the Toreador 9, Magennis hit Cahill with a screen pass and the 183-pound back followed good blocking to the Toreador end zone. The kick attempt for the point failed and it was 20-13 with 6:31 left.

Boone threatened late in the half with a drive from the Fort Dodge 49 to the Gael 16. A pair of penalties plus a lack of remaining time stymied the move.

DEFENSIVE back Jerry Hanson intercepted a pass to stop a Gael march early in the third period and then a bit later, the Toreadors muffed a good opportunity.

A Boone punt was accidentally touched by Cosgrove and the Toreadors recovered at the Gael 18-yard line. A penalty and then a 12-yard loss on a running attempt by Frazier stopped the Boone bid on this occasion.

Just 2 plays before the end of the third period, St. Edmonds again completed a screen pass... Magennis to Cahill. It was good for 36-yards and carried to the Toreador 7 where Manriquez made the saving tackle.

A Cahill running attempt was foiled, then the Gaels failed on 3 straight pass attempts and the losers had muffed their final scoring attempt of the night. They had the ball twice more but not in good field position and were unable to put any offense together again.

Boone's insurance score came with just 2:12 remaining as McIntyre romped 28-yards to climax a time-consuming 76-yard foray. The biggest gainer, aside from the touchdown play, was a 21-yard pass from Martin to Jipp. Frazier added the point on a run and it was 27-13.

St. Eds relied on the pass for both scores and 173 of their 224 yards. They had a minus 8-yards on the ground in the first half.

Despite their aerial yardage, the visitors had a poor completion average. Magennis hurled successfully just 4 of 10-times the first half and 3 of 17 times the second half. Cosgrove received

4 of the passes for 105-yards. Cosgrove was also the Gael rushing leader with 47-yards total and it all came on one jaunt.

For Boone, McIntyre was far and away the leader with 106 yards in 22-tries. Martin passed well with 7 of 11 for 106-yards and one touchdown. Jipp caught 3 of the passes for 60-yards and a score.

Next Friday, the Toreadors travel to Ankeny.

Area Coaches' Comment

MERLE HARRIS: (His Toreadors were a 27-13 winner over Fort Dodge St. Edmonds): "I'd say that St. Edmonds was probably the second best team we have played this season. Ames, of course, has been the best. I thought we had quite a letdown in the second quarter after that quick 20-point lead. Any team that throws alot is going to hit some passes but generally speaking, I felt we did a pretty good job against their passing although its hard to say since I haven't seen the films yet. Martin did a good job of throwing for us especially when you consider there were times he was rushed pretty hard. I was real pleased about our last ball-control drive. I wasn't even concerned about scoring then. That was an extra bonus. I just wanted us to hold on to the ball as long as possible. That screen pass or two helped us. It prevented their linebackers from shooting so often. We had some trouble on the pitchouts for the first time this season. I don't know exactly what did happen. We're healthy so far as I know except for Mike Goldensoph. He was injured in the junior varsity game Saturday morning. Ankeny is another good defensive team and they have some real big kids. They don't score much but they don't give up many points either."

BILL KIBBY (His St. Edmond's team lost to the Toreadors 27-13): "I felt we played as well as we have all year those last 3-periods. We were all disappointed of course in that first quarter but we've had this problem all year. We've worked hard to try and lick it but for some reason we just always get off to a real slow start. I'm proud of my kids for not folding up and calling it quits after that early deficit. They battled back real good and were mighty disappointed about the outcome especially after they had come back so well. Boone is the best team we've played. They always seem to capitalize on their opponents mistakes. We tried to run but after awhile we just quit trying. That Boone defensive line was just too tough for us to run against. We knew McIntyre from a year ago and he's a real tough back. I think they had more speed than us and that hurt. Once, early in the third period when we were down just 1-touchdown, Cosgrove got loose for us but was caught. If he had just a little more speed he might have tied it up for us. I think the turning point came when we got down to the Boone 8-yard line in the fourth period and couldn't score."

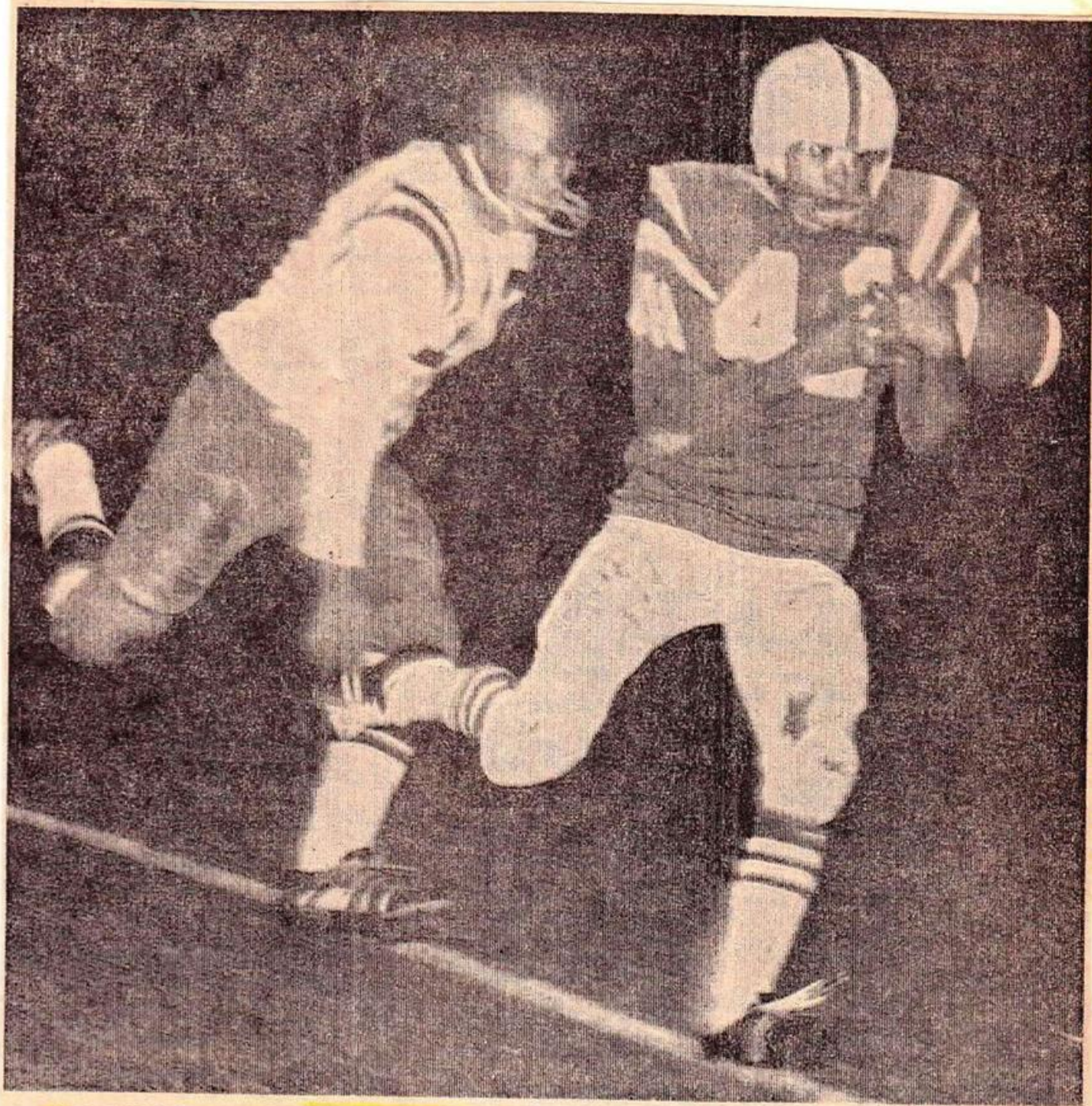

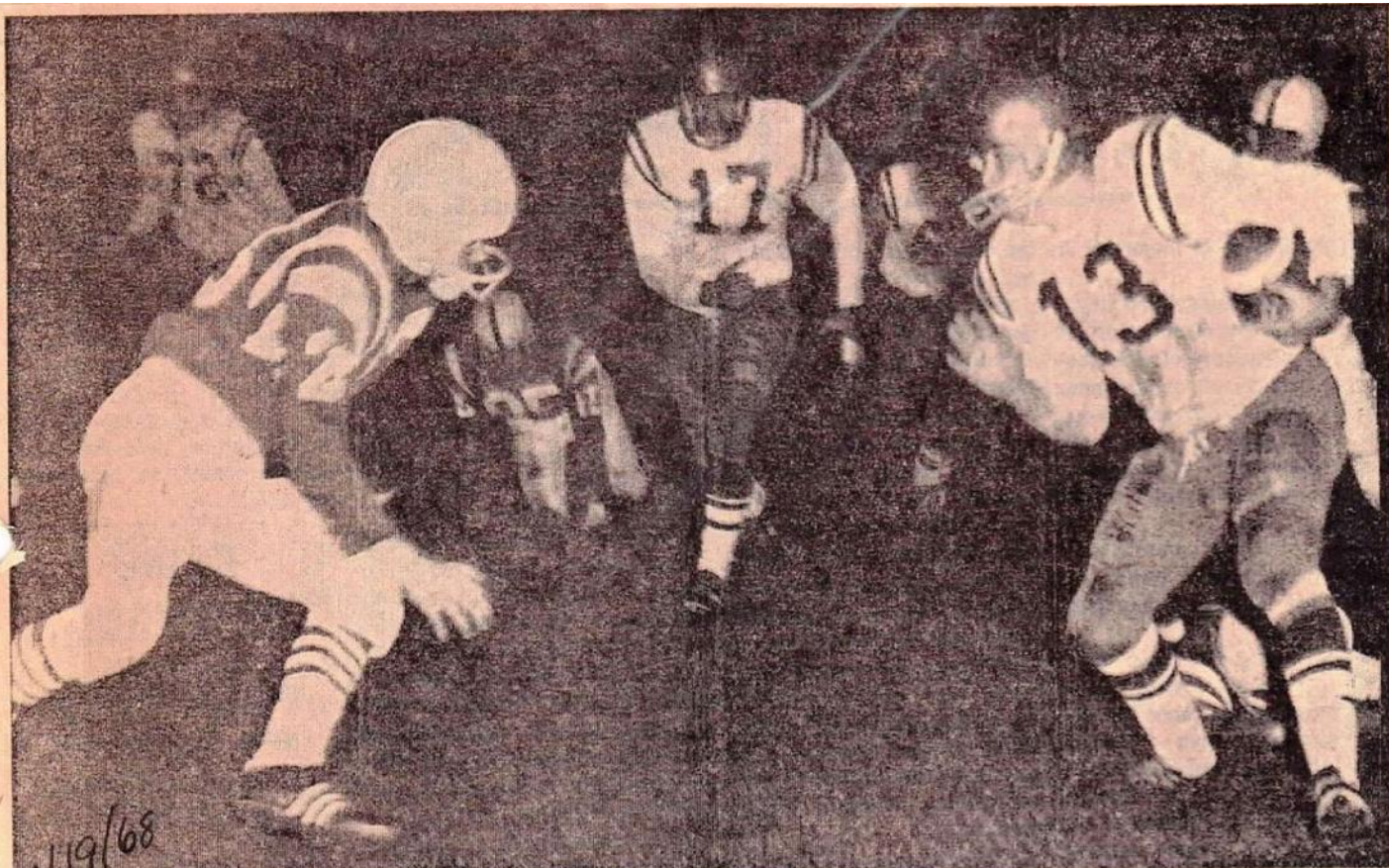

GRINNELL . . . The Toreadors finished a near-perfect 1968 football campaign here Friday with a 40-0 shellacking of the Tigers.

The win wrapped up a 7-0-1 season . . . one of the best in Boone High history and it produced an outright Central Iowa Conference crown, just Boone's fourth in history.

In addition, the 40-points scored boosted the Toreador total for the 8-game card to 273-points or an average of 34.1 per contest . . . the best season-long scoring average in Toreador history.

The records probably don't end there either. Paul McIntyre, already one of the best backs in Boone High history and with another year of competition remaining, may have set some rushing records although no official marks for such things are recorded. Certainly his 340-yards gained must be an all-time record.

The 163-pound junior, fresh from a 240-yard harvest a week ago, continually bombarded the Tiger line and came up with 150-yards on 23-tries in the first half alone. He added another 190-yards in 18-carries after the intermission.

Mac's longest efforts carried him 26 (twice), 19 and 17-yards in the first half and 55, 30, 25, 14 and 13-yards in the second half. He scored 4-times.

Nothing was new on what proved to be a long, long night for the Tigers. The Toreadors frustrated their rivals with ball-control tactics that gave them 65 running plays, 6 pass attempts and 1-punt.

MOST of the runs were directed straight ahead and the results were profitable. Boone High finished with 20-first downs and 440-yards gained on the ground.

Grinnell, with a limited number of tries offensively, bobbled several of them away with fumbles and a pass interception.

Boone took the opening kickoff and proceeded 51-yards to paydirt. Ron Neely went the final yard and it was 6-0 with 9-minutes left. A short kick attempt on the boot-off had given the Toreadors excellent field position.

Grinnell was held in check, the Tigers punted and Boone launched a 60-yard move to the Tiger end zone. Roger Martin went the final foot this time with 4:24 left in the period.

In the late stages of the frame, Grinnell was stalled again and Boone took over at their own 32. This time the Toreador attack failed after moving to the Tiger 19.

Grinnell, apparently inspired by their defensive effort, came roaring back to piece one of their best offensive moves of the night together. It began at the 19 and reached the Boone 15 before Mike Manriquez pass interception in the Toreador end zone ended the challenge.

From their 20, the Toreadors launched their third touchdown drive. A penalty slowed the Boone club temporarily but on a crucial third down, 11-yards to go play, Martin hit McIntyre with a screen pass good for 25-yards and the T.D. Ed Frazier ran for the point and it was 19-0 with 3:22 left in the half. It was still 19-0 at the intermission.

How good was this unbeaten 1968 Toreador football team? How did they compare to the undefeated 1964 unit? How would they have fared in the 'old' Central Iowa Conference?

These questions are a favorite table topic for Boone High football fans these days. Some think the talent was there and the calibre of competition wouldn't have mattered too much. Others think this year's unit was a fine one but simply had the benefit of playing teams very inferior to those clubs met in previous campaigns.

We posed the questions to Toreador coach Merle Harris at our annual season-ending get-together Tuesday and from all indications, the veteran football boss here thinks perhaps the competition wasn't quite as strong this season but also thinks there were some very talented individuals on the '68 club . . . performers that could have at least held their own with any others he has coached.

When Harris speaks of football, you've got to listen. Its hard to dispute the facts and here are the facts: In 17-years of coaching now, his clubs have racked up 85-wins against just 43-losses and 10-ties. That's a winning percentage of .652.

Boone High had a 6-25-1 record in 4-seasons prior to Harris' arrival here in 1958. In his first season here, the Toreadors were 2-6. Even including that reorganization year mark, the Webster City native now has an 11-year B.H.S. record of 53-27-7 for a winning percentage of .649.

He's had 3 unbeaten campaigns . . . 1957 at Maquoketa, 1964 and 1968 here and those two undefeated seasons here are 2 of just 5-unbeaten campaigns since 1896. He has also guided Boone High to 3 of its 4 Central Iowa Conference titles in history and has produced 8 all-stars here . . . 4 of them first team selections.

Harris began, "Despite the fact we didn't have near the speed this year we had in 1964, this year's club was superior offensively mainly because of better line play. Man-for-man, our backs this season weren't as good but the linemen were better than our front men in 1964. Defensively, we were weaker this season than '64 once again because of that lack of speed especially in the secondary. Our boys this season didn't have near the speed that Marty Rinehart, Ted Hora, Mike Harris, Don Riker and those had."

HARRIS was probably lavish in his praise of MORE individuals this year than usual. He knows realistically that it would be impossible for 5-Toreadors

its a sincere choice and normally speaking, he'll have just one or two of his own performers on the list.

Senior lineman Steve Paris and junior back Paul McIntyre would seem to have the best shot at an all-state berth and because he is a senior and a lineman, Paris will probably end up with the most recognition.

"Paris main attribute is probably the fact that he works so hard. He'll do anything to improve himself. He's real tough and doesn't get fooled very often," Harris commented.

About McIntyre, the Boone coach stated, "Mac does an excellent job of finding the hole. He's not real fast but he's extremely quick and when he does get to the hole, he's moving at his top speed."

Harris compared McIntyre favorably with former all-state back Terry Ferry although he said Ferry had more open field speed. McIntyre gained some

Guard Ray Greco, back Ron Neely and center Gery Sutton also drew plaudits from the Boone coach. "Greco has great quickness and was a fine offensive player a year ago. This season he became an outstanding defensive man as well. Neely is a fine receiver and runner and an excellent blocker... one of the best blocking backs we've had. Sutton is the best blocking center I've coached and had tremendous desire. Gery would have been a top-notch defensive man too but after his knee injury, I didn't want to take a chance with him defensively. I was afraid he would get blocked on that knee and then we'd lose him offensively too."

Harris praised Greco, Neely and Rich Dickeson for their outstanding blocking on the Toreador sweeps and said the reason Sutton was so effective was the fact that he always kept his feet when throwing his blocks. "He was a key blocker on McIntyre's runs up the middle," Harris said.

Some Harris comments about other Toreadors:

DICKESON: "He was real

quick and a real surprise for us. He started as a back this season but we moved him to guard and he was a tough one for us even though he weighed just 145 and was bucking 210-pounders alot of the time."

MIKE MANRIQUEZ: "Mike was a fine receiver and a pretty good football player for just a 140-pounder. He made alot of tackles in the secondary this year that prevented opposition touchdowns."

JIM NIEMANTS: "Jim was as tough as anyone on the squad. We played him as our monster man on defense but he actually would have been better as a defensive end if we could have afforded to play him there."

ROGER MARTIN: "Roger was an adequate quarterback but his strong suit was his defensive play. I really think his height helps him defensively. He can see plays develop well and is a real good hitter. He didn't really want to play quarterback. He would have rather played tackle."

PAT OLOFSON: "Pat was a real good linebacker for us. Another tough kid and a good hitter."

ED FRAZIER: "Ed really improved as a runner. Early in the year one arm would bring him down but at the end of the season, he was a tough man to tackle. He came a long way this season."

CHUCK JIPP: "Chuck was a pretty good player for us. He doesn't stand out but gets his job done. Because he's bigger than most of the ends we've had, I'd rate him one of the better blocking ends we've had here. We always moved him to

BRAD CLARK: Clark got hurt in the middle of the season and lost his job but he came back strong late in the year.

TOM HOHANSHELT: "Tom is real strong and a tough one. His only drawback was his lack of speed."

JERRY HANSON: "Jerry did a pretty good job for us considering the fact he lacked speed."

JAY NELSON: "Jay was not real consistent this season. He had his good days and his bad. He runs hard though and will be a good football player."

GUY HUDDLESTON: "Guy added some speed and size to our defensive unit at the end of the year."

Harris says there will be some position-switching next year and the Boone club will need help from some of this year's sophs. "Nelson, Frazier and McIntyre were the only juniors that played consistently this season. Others will letter but they really didn't play much. Nevertheless, I think some of these boys will be good football players next year. We'll have boys like Mac, Frazier, Mark Johnson, Jerry Rusnak, Mike Goldensohn and maybe Tom Wilhite at the

running back spots with Larry Harris and Tom Myers at quarterback. Then in the line, Nelson will probably move to an end with Scott Lilly going to a guard. Don Myers will be a real good center next year, Mike Byriel came on strong at the end of this season and should make a good tackle and I think Stan Sutton will be a good lineman. Jack Royer was

rather inconsistent and Dan Hall can be as good as he wants to be. Hall has good physical ability and those two should be fighting for line berths too."

Harris added, "Generally speaking, I think we can have a real good first unit again and we'll be a good offensive team again next season."

"I was well-pleased with the season," Harris concluded. "I really didn't think we could stay with Ames because of their great speed. I knew St. Edmonds would be strong but I wasn't sure about the rest of the teams on our schedule. Our biggest worry at the start of the year was the fact that we couldn't seem to get outside. We started putting a man in motion after the South Tama game and that helped our outside game a great deal."

The Boone coach commented, "This squad had excellent conduct and worked hard. They knew what was expected of them in this new league. They knew they were supposed to be the team to look up to. They were ready for the challenge. I'm sure our opponents were a little apprehensive . . . they didn't really know how well we played. We consistently marched right down for a score after getting that opening kickoff and I'm sure this was discouraging to them right away. Had our squad not been ready to prove they were best, we may have had some tough games."
