## A 1932 Graduate Returns *The Joy of Easter*

The first person of this series is Dr. Frank Sunstrom, Boone J. C. graduate of 1932. Dr. Sunstrom attended J. C. during the depression. Before going on to school, he sold insurance here in Boone for three years. Upon returning to school, he entered the University of Iowa.

During the summers, he spent his vacations running the Boone swimming pool.

In 1940, Frank graduated from the University of Iowa as a dentist. After graduation Dr. Sunstrom returned to Boone to practice until he entered the service during World War II. After the war he returned to Boone again, only this time with his wife and two children. His office has been in the Citizens National Building ever since.
