

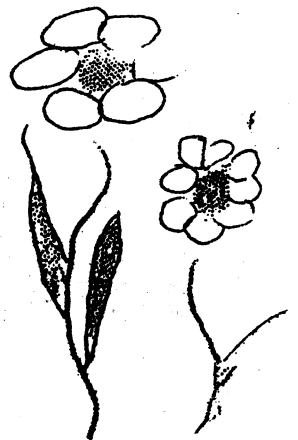
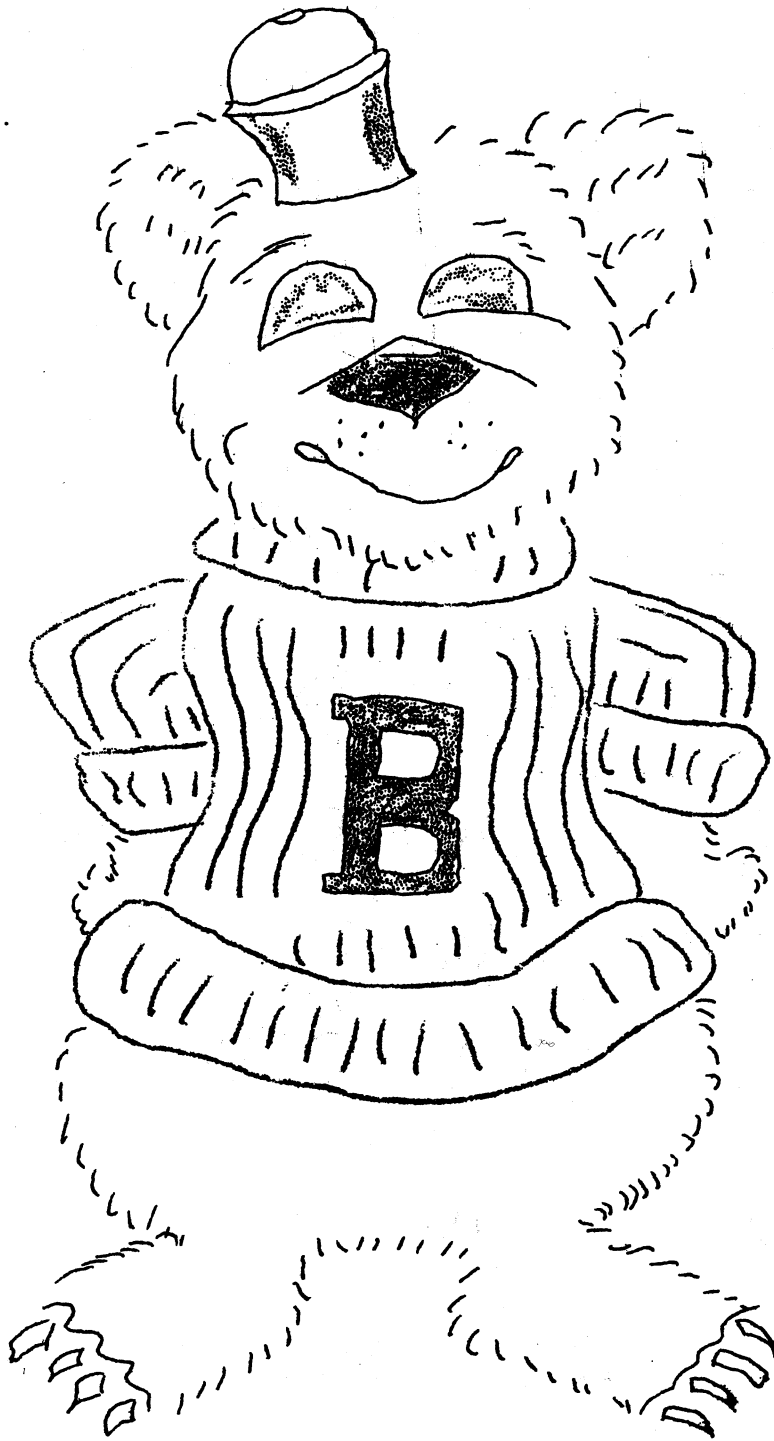

Mr. Donald Seaton, Superintendent of Schools at Boone, has been so very co-operative to the Bear Facts staff during the past year, that we decided to do a feature story on him. He has kept us very well informed on new developments concerning the proposed Junior College.

Mr. Seaton was born in California but since the age of four, has lived in Iowa. He still has a close feeling toward farm life since he was raised on a farm.

High school graduation for Mr. Seaton was in 1919. After graduation he went to Iowa State University (then Iowa State College) for a short while. He was out of college for about two years, helping his father on the farm because of the depression. He then went back to Iowa State and completed three years of schooling, then began teaching at Boxholm in 1924. Agriculture, biology, physics, and general science were the subjects he taught and he was also a basketball and baseball coach. While teaching there he was married to Florence Park, who was also a teacher. He graduated from Iowa State in 1929.

In 1930, Mr. Seaton took over the position as superintendent at Luther Consolidated Schools. While acting as superintendent there, he received his masters degree from the University of Iowa in 1938. 1947 marked a move to Boone and a new position as high school principal. Within two years, he was Superintendent of Schools in Boone.

Mr. Seaton has two sons; Donald Jr. and John. Donald is a 1948 graduate of Boone High School. He then attended the University of Michigan, graduated from Iowa State University and received his masters degree in Business Administration from Stanford University in California. He is now with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Washington, D.C. He is married and has two children. John graduated from Boone High School in 1953, graduated from Iowa State University and received his masters degree in Business Administration from Wharton Graduate School of the University of Pennsylvania. He is now in Management Consultant Services for Arthur Young and Company of New York City. He is also married and has two children.

Although spare time is pretty rare for Mr. Seaton and his wife, they do enjoy many leisure time activities. They have a motor boat they enjoy very much. Fishing is one of their favorite pastimes also. They enjoy traveling but most of their travel is of a hurried sort.

Mr. Seaton and his wife own a lot in Arkansas which overlooks a lake. Their dream for the future is to live there when it is time for retirement.
