Veterans' Day

Veterans' Day, previously known as Armistice Day, was established to commemorate the end of fighting in World War I, on November 11, 1918, and of the signing of an armistice between the Allies and Germany.

This signing took place in a railroad dining car in France and on each November 11th, most of the Allied countries celebrate this event.

The Congress of the United States named Armistice Day as a legal holiday for the United States and changed the name to Veterans' Day in 1954. The United States celebration of Veterans' Day is usually centered at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, where the service men and women are honored.

New Sign to Be Erected

Since the Boone Junior College has moved to its own building, which was a vacated elementary school building, the students and faculty have wanted to dispose of the old 'Franklin' sign engraved on the building and erect a Boone Junior College sign in its place.

Last year, the Boone Junior College Hillbilly Band donated \$25 toward this sign. Contributions now amount to \$75.

This year the college is financially ready to erect the sign.

Dean Heyen has given the Engineering Club, with Orlin Klinkefus as its president, the responsibility of picking the design for the sign. The pattern that was best liked was a rustic, shield-shaped, two-sided sign suspended from an ornamental iron bracket.

The group has tentatively planned a tour for later this year. It is planning to have a number of films and speakers throughout the year. They are also planning a dance and other social activities.


Delta Tau Supper Honors Freshman Members

On Wednesday evening, November 19th the sophomore Taus acted as host to the freshman members of the Delta Tau at a potluck supper, held in the education room.

A business meeting followed the supper. The meeting was highlighted by the presentation, by Mrs. Poyzer, of two patterned, occasional pillows in green and rose, for the women's lounge.

The Taus voted to sponsor Victor Irvine and Pat Donovan as candidates for president and vice-president respectively, for the I. S. E. A. Two delegates will be sent to the state convention at Des Moines, February 5th, 6th. Sally Couch, who represented B. J. C. as a freshman last year, will be the sophomore delegate this year. The freshman delegate has not yet been selected. Roxanne Rose, president of the Delta Tau, chaired the meeting.

After the meeting, the Taus retired to the college lounge for a panel discussion of the 'Ethics of the Teaching Profession.' Those in the panel were: Mr. Harlan Reed, Director of Elementary Education, who acted as chairman; Mrs. Kyle Guiles, Principal at Bryant; Miss Dorothy Loomis, Principal at Page; and Mr. Arvid Stock, Boone High School English and journalism teacher, served as members of the panel.



Early last spring the Board of Education approved a recommendation to remodel the chemistry department which is used jointly by the junior college and high school students. This change not only improved the department, but also it enlarged it, as Room 304 in the high school was converted into a lecture room in which a lecture-demonstration table was installed. Doors were cut into the north ends of the laboratory walls connecting Room 304, the laboratory, and last year's lecture room which is presently being used as a combination storage, preparation, and weighing room.

The lab has new benches with each having its own electric, gas, and water outlets, and a sink at the end of each bench. The furniture and fixtures alone cost approximately \$7,000. This figure doesn't include installation, plumbing, electrical wiring, or shelving. Roughly \$3,000 was spent on supplies which include glassware, hardware, and chemicals.

"Chemistry is only a part of a well-rounded education, and it fits into a general curriculum which includes the other sciences, language (both English and foreign), mathematics, social sciences, and the arts," said Mr. Bruns, when asked what he feels the importance of chemistry is.

At a J. C. teachers' meeting at Ames, the Dean of Engineering illustrated what he felt the importance of science is in the field of engineering. He ranked it third in importance, with English and math preceding it in this order.
