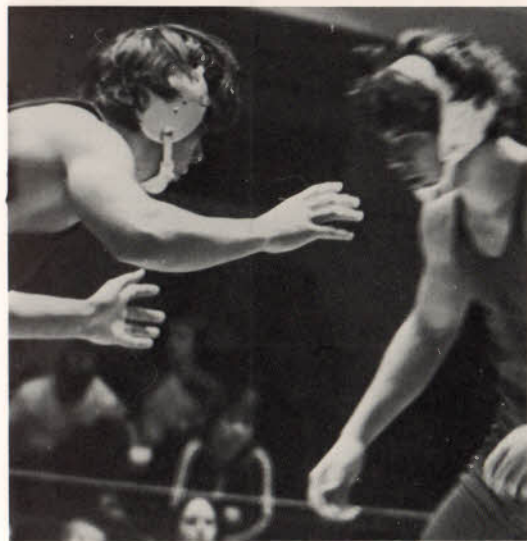


Wrestlers grapple for wins

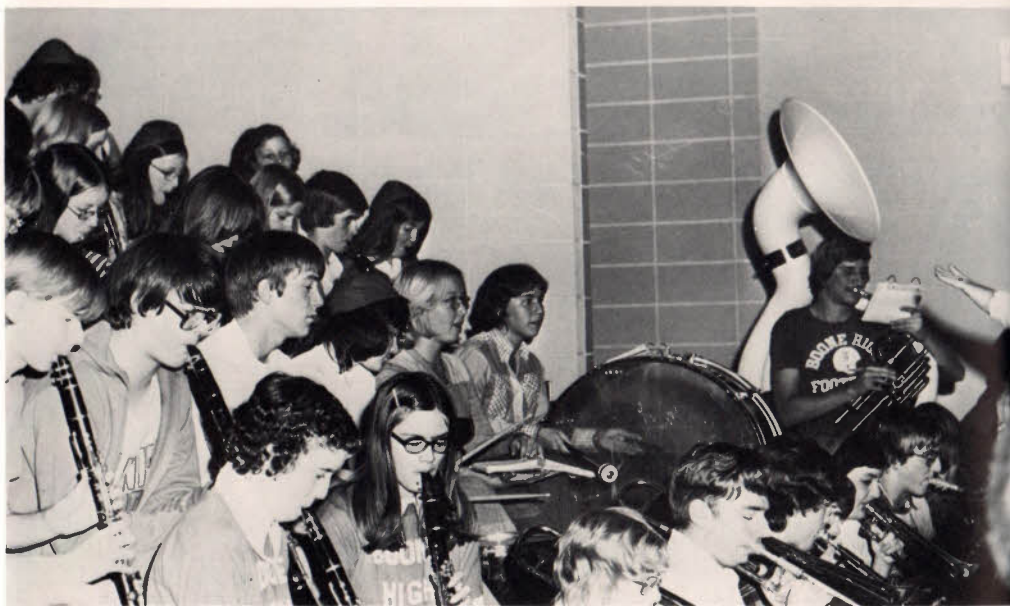

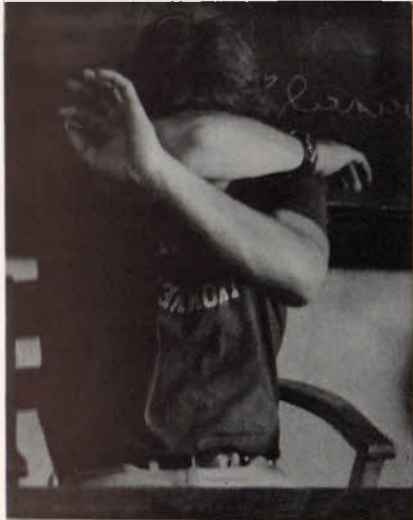


Eleven added to honorary group

Nine out of ten staff members agree that even Adult Strength Anacin cannot relieve the pain, suffering and agony that went into the construction of this book.
