Fifty years of diocesan basketball

#### Dear Msgr. Tolan,

When I was appointed assistant pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Boone in 1927 the Sacred Heart High School had no basketball team or any high school athletics. A group of high school students came to me and asked if they could have a basketball team. I then asked the pastor Father Edward Masterson, and he gave permission for a team if I would take charge of it.

We had about fifteen boys who wanted to play, but we had no coach, no gym, and no place to play. A young man Joe Duffy volunteered to coach. He was very willing. Colonel Walter Anderson, a non Catholic plumbing contractor, very kindly offered to let us practice and play in the National Guard Armory. We accepted the kindness of these two men. Neither asked for any rent or salary. At the end of each season we made an offering. It was small — not over \$100.00 to each, but it was all we could afford. In those days it was not required that the coach be a member of the school faculty.

Mr. Duffy worked for an abstract company. He coached only one year, then two brothers, William and George Johnstone, volunteered to coach. They both had played basketball at the University of Iowa. They were both non Catholics. They asked for no salary. They were willing to coach for the fun of coaching and being associated with a fine bunch of boys. The first year of team we lost every game. The second year we lost all of our early games. Then the team began to click and we won all of our games in the last part of the season. The season of 1930 was our big year. We won every game in our regular season. We beat Des Moines Catholic academy (now Dowling) twice and also Sacred Heart and Corpus Christi of Fort Dodge. We won the first diocesan tournament which was held in the Fort Dodge Public High School gym. We were an undefeated team. We then went to Davenport to play in the State Catholic Tournament. It was held at St. Ambrose College. Our first game was with Loras Academy of Dubuque. We were beaten. But it was a relief when our string of victories was over. And besides Loras had about 400 students and Sacred Heart of Boone had about 80.

If I remember correctly there were only 13 Catholic diocesan teams when Boone won in 1930. Many small Catholic Schools still did not have a basketball team. Fonda and Danbury were always outstanding teams in those days. Smokey Johnson, the editor of the Danbury Paper, coached the Danbury team, and I believe Lute Sauter coached the Fonda team. William and George Johnstone continued to coach the Boone team for many years. They were very loyal to the school. Their players have never forgotten them. William Johnstone is now dead. His younger brother, George, still lives in Boone, but is not in good health. Of the twelve boys who played on that victorious team in 1930 one became a priest, Fr. George Snell of St. Mary's Church, Tipton, Ia. One, Dr. Maurice Healy became a medical doctor. Another Paul Maggio is now a practicing dentist in Fort Dodge. Another John Mahoney became a doctor of science, and dean of the medical school at Indiana University. Another Robert Gartland became a prominent lawyer in Chicago. The others Regis Duffy. John Masterson, Paul Snell, Ray Duffy, Don Sullivan, James Tournabane and Kenneth Powers all went on to become successful business men. All of these men, I believe have remained loyal Catholics and loyal to their old alma mater, Sacred Heart High School of Boone.

#### Dear Msgr. Tolan,

St. Patrick's Danbury played in the K.C. Tourney in Sioux City in 1927. The writer played in this tourney in 1928 and 1929. I don't remember who won either of these years, but, it seemed that Fonda O.L.G.C. was very strong at that time. My strongest memory of these events was the size of the playing floor and the indoor swimming pool, first such pool I had ever seen. Also staying at a hotel for the first time was no small thrill.

St. Patrick's played in the Ft. Dodge tournament in 1930. We had a good team that year, and as I recall our only loss was to Fonda, during the regular season. If my memory serves me right, St. Patrick's beat Fonda in the semi finals and then was defeated by Sacred Heart of Boone 14-12 in the finals. Came back in 1931 to Fort Dodge, with the tournament, defeating Immaculate Conception, Cherokee 15-25 in the finals. I am not sure of score and not aware of other teams in 1931 event.

Of small floors Danbury played their games in the old opera house which was used for all events: movies, dances, plays etc. It had a raised stage at east end of playing floor, and playing surface in the annex of 40x40. It had a fairly high ceiling, for a redeeming factor. I remember going to Varina to play and shoveling snow off the floor that had drifted through the windows. Very rare to have a shower before climbing into a Model T or Model A and coming home. Three of team mates from 1930 and 1931 teams have passed on (Regrets).

Smokey Johnson, Editor of Danbury Review, was our coach. His favorite expression to referee was "If you're a referee, I'm an aviator". That always went over big.

In a 1999 newspaper article he wrote: "Of the twelve boys who played on that victorious team in 1930 one became a priest, Fr. George Snell of St. Mary's Church in Tipton, Ia. One, Dr. Maurice Healy became a dentist in Fort Dodge. Another John Mahoney became a doctor of Science and Dean of the medical school at Indiana University. Another Robert Gartland became a prominent lawyer in Chicago. The others, Regis Duffy, John Masterson, Paul Snell, Ray Duffy, Don Sullivan, James Tournabane and Kenneth Powers all went on to become successful business men.

Mike Loehrer (BHS 1964) sent this picture, his Father Lawrence Loehrer was on this team. Mike wrote: "The 1938 team played in the Iowa Catholic State Tournament. They won the Sioux City Division Tourney and had the #1 seed in the State Tourney, but were defeated by Dubuque.



Father Skahill was the Assistant Pastor from 1940 through 1944. Coach William "Bill" Johnstone is on the right. I don't know the names of the players, but the names of the seniors that year are as follows: Charles Alden, <del>James</del> <del>Fitzgerald, William Riordan</del>, and Vernon Schell (9). The Juniors that year were: David Deering, Gerald Fritz (manager), Richard Murphy (3) and John Shaw. The Sophomores that year were: Donald DeMouth, Eugene Hamill, John Sandon, Slvester White, and Lawrence Yegge.



Just to make the records complete--Boone Sacred Heart team defeated Luther on Jan. 22, 33 to 9. Yegge led the Boone team with 11 points, while Roberts got 7, McDermott 6, Sandon 5, and De Mouth 4.

The Fort Dodge Corpus Christi team defeated Boone on February 5 42 to 38. The Boone five were behind at the half 19 to 15, but managed to go into the lead in the third quarter. The Corpus Christi five got hot in the fourth quarter and finally won 42 to 38. Yegge dumped in 18 points, White, and De Mouth who was taken out on fouls, garnered 10 points. For the visitors, Smith and Harrington scored 13 and 14 points respectively.

There's a move afoot to bring basketball back to Sacred Heart high school on an interscholastic basis by next season. And the plan is already in motion with a coach hired to teach fundamentals.

Practice began the last of January for some 39 players from the seventh grade through high school. There are only two seniors currently engaging in drills.

Joe Anderson, the former Ft. Dodge Corpus Christi hardcourt great, is currently guiding the efforts of the prospective Sacred Heart cagemen.

The practice sessions are being held at the Lowell school gym with Coach Anderson working with the seventh and eighth graders from 6:30 to 7:30 nightly and with the senior high 7:30 to 9 o'clock.

one high school's gymnasium has been rented for six offnight home games for next season. The home games probably will be on Thursday nights.

Father C. H. Friedman is in the process of drawing up schedule for the parochials. Small schools in the Boone area have been contacted for possible game contracts.

Schools wishing to schedule the Sacred Heart team for next season should contact Father Friedmann at Sacred Heart high school.

Sacred Heart's high school enrollment is 49 of which 24 are boys

The plan is to hire an Iowa State college student with enough practice teaching hours to qualify under Iowa High School Athletic association rules as the coach. Whether the coach next season will be Anderson or not is not known.

Anderson, a member of the crack Corpus Christi team that advanced to the state tournament in 1953, is a junior at Iowa State.




