
















Dear Friends







I started school in Boone at Franklin, then Sacred Heart, back to Franklin, on to Boone Junior High, then back to Sacred Heart in my sophomore year. I impressed people later in my life when I told them I graduated ninth (9) in my class. That's right; I did not tell them there were only 9 in my class.

After graduation, I worked on the Chicago Northwestern section gang for the summer. Joined the US Navy and was sent to San Diego, CA. for Boot Camp, then stayed and did 3 month of K.P. I spent the next 44 weeks taking radar and computer courses at Great Lakes, IL. My next two year were on the Cruiser, USS Des Moines, sailing round and round the Mediterranean.

I then attended Boone Junior College and between my freshman and sophomore years married my high school sweetheart, Joanna Lacey,. Then on to The State College of Iowa (now The University of Northern Iowa) where I graduated with honors with a Teaching degree in Social Studies. Our son Tony was born in Cedar Falls. I was unable to get a teaching job in Iowa, so I ended up as a Management Trainee, working for the F.W. Woolworth variety store in Emporia, Kansas, where our daughter Ann was born. After a year, I was offered a graduate assistantship at UNI, so I returned and received a Masters degree in Social Studies.

I received a teaching job offer and moved the family to California, where I taught for a short time in Watts. That did not work out, so I joined North American Aviation in Anaheim, CA. in business management. I pursued more education at night and received a BA in Accounting and worked towards my Masters degree. Rockwell International bought out the company, and then Boeing bought them out. I retired in 1997 after 30 years of various accounting and financial positions.

Joanna and I owned and operated a coin laundry and a dry cleaning business for ten years.

Retirement has been spent with the grandkids, Matt (18), Meagan (13) and Charissa (6) as well as travel, work and golf. I became a consultant and my son, who was the CFO of a company, hired me to run the accounting department of one of their subsidiaries. After he became the VP of another company, I worked

for him creating various financial programs and was in charge of new building expansion.



Pete was born October 24, 1939 to Florence Fleming. He had a younger brother Michael and a sister Linda. During his school years, Pete was active in school, church and community affairs. He was the best student in the class, and you can understand how he became a Jesuit, teacher and leader as an adult. In his later years his interests were gardening, sports, fine arts, dance and cooking.

Pete started with Boy Scout Troop 139 and later joined Troop 199. He became an Eagle Scout in 1953. Of the 120 merit badges available, he had to earn a minimum of 21. Another award was the Ad Altare Dei Catholic youth award for serving as an alter boy for more than 150 masses.

Some of the Pete's activities and awards in 1956 were:

- Top honors in the Boone Jr. Chamber of Commerce's "Voice of Democracy" contest.
- Named to American Legion Hawkeye Boys' State.
- Chairman of the Boone County Junior Young Republicans.
- Served as a Page at the Republican National Convention.

Since Pete's life was dedicated to the church and to education, and since he is not here to write his biography, perhaps we can get a better understanding of his life by seeing which schools he attended, what he studied and what and who he taught. (Jerry Manriquez)

List of Schools and Curriculum

- 1957 Graduated Sacred Heart High School, Boone, Iowa
- 1958 Attended his first year of college at Creighton University, Omaha on an academic scholarship.
- 1958 August 17, entered the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) at St, Stanislaus Seminary, Florisssant, Missouri.
- 1960 August 22, Took his vows
- 1960 -1962 Continued Classical studies in the Society of Jesus, Jesuit College, an affiliate of Marquette University. At the same time, he also served as Assistant Librarian in the Jesuit College, St. Bonifacius, Minnesota.
- 1962 1964 B.A. in Philosophy from St. Louis University, Missouri Philosophical Studies and degree work in English. At the same time, he also served as Assistant Librarian in the College of Philosophy and Letters at St. Louis University, and did pastoral training with minority groups in St Louis, and was a teacher of religion at St. Francis Xaxier

elementary School in St. Louis.

- 1965 M.A. in English From St. Louis University.
- 1968 Started Theological studies for the priesthood at Alma College, Los Gatos, CA
- 1968 1972 (June) M.A. Masters of Sacred Theology. Graduate Theological Studies in the Society of Jesus included: Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, and affiliate of the University of Santa Clara. He had an important role in the establishment of the School of Theology at Berkeley.
- 1971 April Ordained a deacon of the Roman Catholic Church.
- 1971 Sept. 1 Ordained to the Priesthood in the Society of Jesuits, at St. John's College Church, Creighton University, Omaha, Nebraska. Peter officiated at his first mass at the Church of the Sacred Heart in Boone Iowa.
- 1971 1972 Post Graduate work in Language and Theology at Goethe Institute and the University of Berlin, Germany.
- 1987 April PhD in Theology/Church History from Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA His doctoral dissertation, "Chosen for China" documents the history of California Province Jesuits in China from 1928 though 1957.

Ministerial and Teaching History:

During his years of study and teaching, he did extensive writing and book reviews which have been published in the Catholic and secular press throughout the United States and Korea.

1965-1968 Creighton Preparatory High School (for Boys), Omaha, Nebraska

Teacher – English and French - and also moderated the Film Festival and taught film criticism.

Assistant Director of Development (1967-1968) and was active in various educational groups in Nebraska. He established the first Film Criticism Program in the state of Nebraska.

Received a NDEA grant in June 1968 to study Mandarin Chinese at San Francisco State College for eight weeks. The grant was sponsored by the federal government and was provided after competitive examinations and a submission of objectives.

- 1971-1974 Teacher of Theology and Minister Jesuit School of Theology, Berkley CA
- 1971-1979 Spiritual Director and Director of Field Education Jesuit School of Theology, Berkley, CA
- 1981-1984 Visiting Professor of English Sogang University, Seoul, South Korea
- 1987-1988 Visiting Professor of American Culture at Jiaotong University, Shanghai, China.
- 1989-1991 Assistant Professor of Humanities Sogang University, Seoul, South Korea

Pete returned to the Jesuit residence in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in January 1992 because of poor health. He was scheduled to go to Creighton University when his health returned, but passed away on December 17, 1994.

Pete told his family that he was not an easy instructor but that his students here in the US and in Korea had a good relationship with him and appreciated all he did for them.







Duke attended St John's University in Minnesota, graduating in 1961 with a Bachelor's Degree in Economics. He then went to work for Dunn & Bradstreet in Minneapolis, where he met his future wife and love of his life, Mona Jensen. They were married in June, 1965 and moved immediately thereafter to Milwaukee Wisconsin, where Duke assumed a sales position with Symons Corporation, a manufacturer and distributor of concrete formwork and related construction materials. After moving with Symons to Michigan, Iowa and finally Denver, Duke rose to the position of Regional Sales manager. In the late 70s, he took a job as National Sales Manager for Japanese Company selling a revolutionary construction bonding agent. After spending time with the Japanese, Duke went back to his roots and started a concrete construction company in Denver, which he ran throughout the 80s.

In 1992, Duke was named President of Raymond International, one of the nation's largest industrial construction companies. He was hired to manage the company through its Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Filing. He was so successful at guiding Raymond through this difficult period that he was hired several years later by another large construction firm in financial difficulty, MMR Construction out of Louisiana. Duke ran the company during its bankruptcy as well and was recognized by the court, the creditors and the employees and managers of the company for his creative approach to taking care of all of the people affected by MMR's situation.

Following his tenure with MMR, Duke invested in another company coming out of bankruptcy: excavating and boring equipment manufacturer Pengo Corporation, located near Oakland California. Duke became president and majority owner of Pengo and grew the once troubled company into an economically sound, major player in the world of construction excavation equipment market. Before his death in 2000, Pengo had grown into one of the top players in the US market as well as Europe, Asia and Australia. It was a great success, and would have been even bigger had he been around to continue his work.

But Duke was not just a numbers guy. He bought a manufacturing facility for Pengo in Laurens
Towa (a nod to his home state) which employs up to 100 people. He took time to talk to all of


them and find out about their families and lives outside of work. They knew that he cared about them and he made sure they were happy employees and that they felt like they were part of a team. That to him, I think, was his greatest success.

Mona writes:

Life with Duke was always a blast! We had so many laughs - always danced every dance and never missed a party. Together we traveled to Ireland, England, France, Spain (motorcycle 3 week trip), Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, the Check Republic, Hawaii, and South America.

Duke spent his last ten years working or world wide companies in turn around management and eventually bought the Pengo Corp. It was a great move for him; he had offices in China, Europe, Australia, India and Indonesia. He finally made his goal and shared the benefits with so many. His loss left a hole in our hearts.








Picture of Duke's Father, William Conway, Sacred Heart Class of 1926

Tom was born on September 18, 1937 in Boone, Iowa to Thomas John Fitzgerald and Teresa Elizabeth Smith Fitzgerald (both of his parents went to Colo High School). While growing up in Boone, Tom loved to ride his horse with his brother, Mike; go fishing, hunting or shooting; and he always had as much fun as possible. After graduating high school, Tom went on to the State Teacher's College of Iowa (University of Northern Iowa) to earn his degree in teaching.

Tom would also earn his Master's degree from Drake University. Tom taught at several smaller school districts (Ventura, Pella) upon graduation before settling down in the Des Moines School District where he taught for 37 years before retiring. During retirement, Tom continued his part-time job at a local grocery store in Des Moines, Dahl's. Tom was best known as "Fitz" and no matter where he was someone always seemed to know him.

Tom married his wife, Jean E. Woletz, of 39 years on December 27, 1965 in Eau Claire, WI. They made their home in Grimes, IA with their four children. Tom and Jean were very proud grandparents and have 6 grandchildren.

Tom was a very loving husband, father, and grandfather who enjoyed spending as much time with his family as possible. Tom and Jean always put their family first, no matter what. He was always teaching someone, whether through the classroom or through his example of hard work and professionalism at Dahl's.

Most of all, Tom was a family man. Whether it was going to his children's activities (baseball, football, softball, track, volleyball, wrestling, debate contests, or band contests), going to grandkid's birthday parties, traveling to baby-sit his grandchild, or just going to see his grandkids; Tom's family came first.

Tom enjoyed going to his hometown of Boone, IA several times a week to shoot his handguns and rifles. Tom was quite a gun collector throughout the years. When he found the time, Tom enjoyed pheasant and deer hunting with his friends. Tom always had hunting and non-hunting dogs around the house. He always spoiled his dogs by taking them swimming, running, or just spending a lot of time with them. All of his dogs an integral part of the family. Tom also liked to go on fishing trips with his good friends and family to Northern Wisconsin. He always enjoyed a good baseball game, especially when his Cubs where playing, no matter how bad they were.

Tom passed on November 21, 2006 after battling Leukemia. Tom was preceded in death by the love of his life, his wife, Jean in 2005. Although Tom & Jean are no longer with us, their love for each other lives on in their family.




Back to School


The meeting adjourned at 3 o'clock after all present business was discussed.
